Dear Friends,

Nature offers me a reminder each year that Easter is just around the corner. As Easter approaches, I hope you will be able to find blessing and meaning in this Holy time of year and make it a time of celebration of the new life that God has given us all through the resurrection of His Son and our Saviour and Lord, Jesus Christ.

KIRK SESSION – WHAT DO THEY TALK ABOUT?

The Kirk Session met on 7th February with 56 members attending and they discussed a wide range of issues.

Worship: Gillian Foy was thanked by the Moderator for agreeing to take up the post of Prayer Promoter. The choir had a very successful and well attended Nine Lessons in Carols service although there was great sadness at the death in January of long standing member, Florence Denholm. An appeal was made for new members to join the choir – if you would like more information contact **Peter Howard**. Messy Church continues to flourish and Karen Martin has replaced Gill Hunt who has assisted for a number of years. Reports were also received from the Saturday Morning Book Club – details of their meetings can be found in the Order of Service.

Outreach: The Kirk Session received updates from representatives of a large number of organisations that members of Greenbank support including Glasgow North East Foodbank, Christian Aid, Clarkston Community Choir, Williamwood House, The Kwenderana Project in Malawi, and The Lodging House Mission where members of Greenbank are actively supporting a new initiative to allow the Lodging House Mission to open on a Saturday. Finance: The Financial Position was updated but it was too early to comment on the income trend for the year to date. The proceeds of the fabric element of the reappraisal were £9,355 from 220 returns compared with £10,095 for 217 returns last year. Since the last report contributions have been received from the Friendship Café, Tea Dance, 2nd Clarkston Brownies, The Guild and Ladies' Afternoon Badminton Club. External organisations continue to generate useful income – approximately £20,000 this year compared to £10,000 in 2015.

Fabric: The fabric report advised that essential repairs had been carried out to the gutter on the front elevation of the church, that carbon monoxide and smoke alarms were shortly to be fitted to all our church buildings and that paint markings would be put on the tarmac near the hall entrance to deter drivers from parking there. It was emphasised that fabric maintenance is being restricted to that which is absolutely essential given the work of the Legacy Group to establish future plans.

Safeguarding: The Kirk Session was reminded of the importance of safeguarding issues and the continuing need for training and recordkeeping to ensure we are compliant with the latest requirements. The safeguarding committee is currently reviewing this.

Halls Convenor: Val Scholfield has been appointed Halls Convenor and the Moderator thanked Chris Adam for his work over the past years in this important role.

Fellowship : Thanks were expressed to the organisers of the Christmas Film Night . It was noted there are a number of proposed social events throughout 2017 including a “New Look” Stated Annual Meeting of the congregation in June – see Order Of Service , Website and Good Neighbour for details.

Youth: In view of the research carried out by the Conversations Group and in consultation with Voluntary Action East Renfrewshire the Kirk Session's Youth Committee identified the need for a youth club in the local community. The Moderator expressed her gratitude to GoForit for funding for a year's pilot of the proposed SNAP community youth club, which will be set up to cater for the primary 7 to Secondary 3 age group. The Kirk Session approved the setting up of the Youth Club Management Committee and a remit that included the recruitment and appointment of two sessional paid youth leaders. Reports were also received from 1st Clarkston Guides and Sunday Club.

Legacy Update: A progress report was given to the Kirk Session on the Legacy Project and an appeal was made for members of Session to make suggestions on how the project should be managed.

Other Matters: The Kirk Session dealt with a number of other routine matters: attestation of the Roll at 31st December 2016, allocation of the Fulton bequest income to Fergus Cook our Student Minister, notice of Inspection of Records in March, the Safeguarding Statement of Compliance, a Review of Data Protection Policy, approval of Helen Howard as our Presbytery Elder for 2017/18 replacing Alison Allan who was thanked for her past work in this role, the Easter Services, and a discussion on the Stated Annual Meeting in June. In addition it was highlighted that as an ECO congregation the Kirk Session were no longer buying paper cups for the use of church organisations and that use of existing crockery was encouraged.

Tribute read in Greenbank Parish Church on Sunday 12th March 2017

FLORENCE DENHOLM

Florence Denholm, one of our elders, died on the 21st of January 2017.

Florence May Denholm was born on the 1st June 1945 in Dennistoun to parents Colin and Effie Carmichael. Her brother Colin was born four years later. Florence's schooling took place in Glasgow and Crail before the family moved to Clarkston in 1957 where she completed her primary education at Carolside, before going on to secondary education at the then Eastwood High School in Seres Road.

After school, Florence went to Jordanhill College to train as a Primary School teacher. After qualifying she became a teacher at Eaglesham Primary School where she remained for thirty years, eventually taking on the role of Music teacher. She inspired many children to become involved in music and the school choirs won many competitions. She is remembered fondly by many of her pupils.

It was at school that Florence formed many lifelong friendships including that with her pen pal in Australia. Florence inherited her love of music from her parents and it should be no surprise that she became heavily involved firstly in the school shows at the end of term, then with the East Renfrewshire Operatic Society, of which she was a founding member in 1965. During the 1970s she had starring roles in a number of well-known musicals and she received a fifty year membership badge two years ago. When she retired from appearing on stage, Florence took on the role of Musical Director with a number of amateur clubs including the Pantheon Club at the King's Theatre.

In 1975 Florence met Jack and their romance blossomed through EROS. They were married at Greenbank Church in October 1979 and set up home in Clarkston. Florence had been married previously and had had a tough time bringing up Alan on her own, an experience that enabled her to later offer support to others going through similar problems. When Florence told her 8 year old son, Alan, that they were getting a new addition to the family, Alan asked hopefully "Are we getting a dog?" but instead he got Jack; Alan has since got over this. Their son Michael was born in 1982 to complete the family.

Florence was a keen golfer and curler and in both sports was rewarded by winning a number of cups and trophies, as well as making many friendships. She was also an accomplished artist. She and Jack loved to travel and went on holidays all around the world visiting family and friends.

Florence was someone who liked to try things. She was a people person who was unafraid to speak her mind. Florence and Jack were convivial hosts, not only at their dinner parties, but also when they had guests from all over the world to stay.

Florence was ordained an elder in Greenbank Church in 1996 and was District Elder for Queensberry Avenue for many years. She was a long standing choir member and helped Peter on countless occasions and he says he has lost count of the number of times Florence told him to "show the teeth" when things weren't quite as tuneful as they were meant to be. She led the praise band, "Age Gap", for a number of years, and regularly played the piano for the Sunday Club as well as helping with their Christmas nativity plays. She served on the new members committee and a number of groups looking at the future of the church. Florence was keen to see the church move forward positively into the future within the Clarkston Community and recently she helped at the new Bookbug morning here at the church for parents and toddlers. She was a great advocate of the Boys' Brigade and was the first female officer in the 223rd Junior Section here at Greenbank, encouraging her sons, Alan and Michael, and grandson, Daniel, to become members.

Above all else in her life Florence's affections were always firmly focused on her family. As a mother, Florence was encouraging, loving and generous but firm. She was a devoted grandma to Daniel and Poppy and loved spending time with them. Florence Denholm had a great enthusiasm for life – a life that was filled with laughter. Her faith gave her strength and comfort. She stoically faced many challenges during her lifetime with courage and determination and with the words "Well, we'll just have to get on with it".

Today we give thanks to God for the life and service of Florence Denholm, a loyal and loving woman, who has left a huge gap in many lives, most especially in the lives of Jack, Alan, Michael, Daniel, Poppy and the wider family whom we commend to the love and care of our Lord Jesus Christ.

A LEGACY FOR FUTURE GENERATIONS

By the time this edition of Good Neighbour is delivered, the presentation to the congregation on the Session's plans for the future will have taken place. The purpose of that meeting had been to bring you up to date on the Kirk Session's thinking and provide much more detail than had been possible in the various Good Neighbour updates over the past fifteen months. Three property options had been explored by an external architect and the presentation looked at each one, the pros and cons and the costs and concluded with the reasons why the Kirk Session had settled on its preferred option of a new church on a new site.

Those who attended on the 27th March were provided with written information to take away that summarised much of what was covered in the presentation. If you were unable to attend and would like a copy of the leaflet then please speak to your elder and they will be happy to provide this for you.

There is now plenty of time for reflection as there is no immediate rush to make a final decision. To help that process of reflection, there are four further opportunities to meet and discuss the plans on April 11th and 13th at 2.30pm and on 20th and 25th April at 7.30pm.

Looking ahead, an important step in the process comes with the publication of the revision of the Local Development Plan by East Renfrewshire Council due in September or October of this year. That Plan will help clarify some of the current uncertainties around the use of the preferred site.
