

#### Dear Friends,

Next weekend, Ryan Air permitting, I am going away for a few days with friends I don't get to see as often I'd like to, given our very different lives. I met these friends at a church young women's group over thirty years ago and I am look forward to relaxing with them, talking about the history we share, having some fun together and sharing the things that matter to us. The thing about these friends is that they know me really well, and they still seem to want to spend time with me and I love that about them.

In life we can have many different levels of friendships. There is the kind of friendship that says, hello and is warm and friendly even if we don't know, or don't remember a person's name; then there is the kind of friendships where we know the person's name and can chat for a while and then there are those friendships where we spend extended times together and perhaps have dinner or go away on holiday.

As I write, I am preparing to speak to the Guild at their opening meeting for their new session. The bible reading on which the Guild has chosen to focus is taken from John's Gospel 15:9-15, where Jesus says that we are His friends if we do what He commands. Jesus' words prompted me to reflect on the friendships I have with others and the friendship I have with God in Jesus Christ; hence my thoughts here!

In calling His disciples friends, Jesus was trying to expand his disciple's understanding of their relationship with Him. In the 1st century, calling someone a friend meant that they had a place of honour in your life. On the night before His death, Jesus therefore made it clear that He viewed his disciples as faithful and trustworthy friends whom He loved and valued. The events that followed that night reveal the difficulties the disciples had in living up to the honour of being called Jesus friends. Yet they persisted with that friendship and eventually became bearers of that friendship to others.

Like Jesus disciples before us, for 133 years, Greenbank Parish Church has tried to share the friendship of Jesus Christ in the Parish of Clarkston. This friendship has survived wars, disasters, economic crisis, recessions, good times and bad times. This friendship has been a sign of hope and love and light in dark times. This friendship has been shared in many ways and made real by those who volunteer, visit, make phone calls, write encouraging letters, bake, pray together, or even sit in silence as they care for others – especially at the most vulnerable times of life.

Many, many people have been thankful for these friendships just as I am thankful for the good friendships I have in my life. Above all though, I am thankful for the friend I have in Jesus, who has promised never to leave me; who focuses on my potential rather than my failures and who is gracious and loving towards me in ways beyond what I could ever deserve. I pray that you might know that friendship too.

In whatever comes your way in the days ahead, may you not only know the love and support of good and faithful friends, but above all may you know the love and grace of the Lord Jesus Christ in you and working through you!

#### **LEGACY**

At its June meeting the Kirk Session continued its deliberations on the legacy we want to leave for future generations. This followed on from the series of open meetings earlier in the year at which members of the congregation were able to contribute their own thoughts and ideas. As roughly only a quarter of the congregation attended one of those meetings, a leaflet explaining the legacy work was distributed to every household with the June Good Neighbour.

Much of the discussion so far has been focussed on issues to do with buildings. At its June meeting the Session asked itself what leaving a legacy for future generations really meant and came to the view that the imperative is to ensure that we leave a sustainable and worshipping congregation of God's people for generations to come. This sharpens our thinking and gives a very clear yardstick against which to assess the decisions we need to take now, on property and other matters, to secure that future. Clearly the wise stewardship of all our resources is a part of this but the main driver for all our thinking is to ensure a sustainable and worshipping congregation well into the future.

What now? We had thought that the outcome of East Renfrewshire's Local Development Plan would have been published sometime in the autumn but we now understand that due to a number of factors, including the Local and General Elections earlier this summer, it is likely the Plan will not emerge until the spring of next year. The importance of the Local Development Plan to our thinking is that we hope it will indicate whether or not the site opposite Williamwood High School, the site for the Session's preferred option of a new Church, is likely to be freed up for development.

Historic Environment Scotland has been in touch with us to say that they believe the church building is of local interest and are considering it for a category C listing. The Session sees no reason to challenge this as it underlines our own commitment to retain the building.

In the meantime there is still work to be done and the Session established two groups that have been meeting over the summer, one looking at how the property options should be defined in clearer detail and the other preparing projections of future member numbers and church finances.

The Session has set aside a day in November to consider the work of the two groups. This gives you time to contribute your own thoughts. We are at an important point in the life and witness of our Church and if we truly believe in the importance of leaving a sustainable and worshiping congregation of God's people in our community for generations to come, it will take **all of us** to think deeply and prayerfully about what that means. Please let us know how best you think that we can secure that lasting legacy. Your contributions will help the Session in its work.

#### **LODGING HOUSE MISSION**

#### Sponsored Cycle

Mark Allan, Heather Allan, and Bill Stein took part in the 18 mile sponsored cycle on the rather wet morning of Saturday, 26th August. The route took them from Glasgow Green to Clydebank and back to the finish at the LHM. Thanks to their participation and the generous sponsorship of the congregation, £781 was raised by Greenbank for the LHM. This amount will increase with Gift Aid. This is a wonderful amount, and the LHM was extremely grateful to receive the money. Thanks to all who took part in, or supported, this event.

#### Saturday Opening

Saturday opening at the Lodging House Mission continues, thanks to the support of churches in Glasgow Presbytery who provide a team of 4 volunteers each week on a rota basis. The 4 volunteers are in addition to two paid sessional workers and volunteer chef. There are currently 15 churches, including Greenbank, on the rota. Greenbank has been on duty on 5 Saturdays since the rota commenced in December 2016. We have a total of 12 volunteers from Greenbank, and all have found the experience to be very worthwhile. Duties include serving tea, coffee and lunch; helping with food prep; operating the dishwasher; and cleaning and hoovering. If you would like to become involved with this please let me know.

#### **BUSHIDO KARATE CLUB**


We have had some new beginners starting their journey in Karate and we look forward to coaching them as they progress up the grades.
