

Dear Friends,

Despite the fact that it is now February and Christmas 2017 is now becoming a memory, I do not want to let the opportunity pass to express my sincere thanks to everyone who made Greenbank's Christmas services and events possible. There are too many people to name personally, but I want to thank everyone who willingly used their gifts, abilities, time and presence to strengthen the mission and ministry of this congregation. The lovely atmosphere you created was noted by many and you not only made it a happy and blessed time for this congregation but for the people and families who came through our Church doors at Christmas time.

Not much more than seven weeks after Christmas, this is one of the years when Easter falls early. This means that Lent begins this year on 14th February. Since early times Lent has been a time of preparation for Christians as they look forward to Easter. It is often a time when people 'give things up', often treats, such as chocolate, cakes, sweets or alcohol, but sometimes it is something. Some people give up watching television or driving the car when they can walk or buying any material possessions. The idea of giving something up for Lent is a way to identify with the fasting Jesus experienced in the wilderness for 40 days as his time of prayerful preparation before his public ministry. Giving things up in our culture of plenty is a valuable thing to do; it reminds us of what is truly necessary and it reminds us of how blessed we are to have lives with so many choices.

Alongside giving something up, some people also take the opportunity to take something on, or to do something new during Lent that helps them focus on the central event of the Christian faith, the death and resurrection of Jesus and what it means to them.

So, this year, in order to help us do that, I wondered if we might give House Groups a try here at Greenbank and to use them as a way to get close not only to the Lord who died for us, but also to one another. This would mean that in addition to the Greenbank Saturday morning group [meets in Room A at 8.45am for breakfast and a 9am start] and the Wednesday night House Groups normally associated with Greenbank, which meet at various venues [to be intimated] we would need some more volunteers to host house groups on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday nights during Lent. If you feel that you [or a group of people] could host one of these House Group evenings please leave your name with Jane at the Church Office [644 1841]. Please note that you don't need to have been involved in a house group before or have any special qualifications to participate, nor do you have to have a vast bible knowledge, you just have to be yourself!!! When a list of venues is known, everyone will be invited to sign up to a particular House Group, through the Sunday Moring intimation sheet and the church Facebook page. You can also leave your name at the church office saying which night you would prefer to attend, or put your name on the sign-up sheet in the Centenary Chapel in the Church.

The bible study material being used during Lent has been compiled by 'Churches Together in Britain and Ireland', partnered with the HOPE organisation. This clear and accessible material will provide House Group participants with the opportunity to walk with Jesus, and with one another, through Lent, learning from Mark's Gospel and from the lessons prisoners, ex-prisoners and chaplains have learned. There is also an accompanying booklet called '40 Stories Of Hope', which is a collection of 40 remarkable testimonies from prisoners, ex-prisoners and prison chaplains who speak powerfully about life-changing encounters with Jesus. The 40 faith-inspiring stories can be read daily during Lent and, with the accompanying weekly House Groups, will offers us all the opportunity to explore how we can find hope in Jesus, no matter who we are.

In each study and story there is much to draw on to refresh and encourage faith. I hope that you will join me in taking on something new, by creating space in your life during these 6 weeks to journey through Lent in the company of others in a Greenbank House Group.

ALISON DICK

Alison Dick, one of our elders, died on 15th November 2017.

Alison was born in Pollokshields on 28th September 1946 and she was brought up with her older brother Neil, by her father Sydney and mother Jean. When she was a teenager her family moved to Clarkston where she was a pupil at Eastwood High School. On leaving school, she had a number of secretarial jobs including working for Anderson's of Newton Mearns and Clydeport.

Alison met her husband, Wallace, at Greenbank Youth Fellowship and they were married 43 years ago on 16th March 1974. Their first home was in Newton Mearns before moving to Giffnock and then to Sundale Avenue when their daughters, Gillian and Pamela, were older.

It was through Wallace and his parents that Alison got involved in the Trades House, both through the Incorporations, becoming Queen of the Wrights and through Wallace's involvement in the Trades House Masonic Lodge, where she was Mistress of Trades House Lodge. Alison was extremely supportive of Wallace and this meant a lot of entertaining which she immensely enjoyed. She was a very convivial hostess, with a keen memory for remembering people's names and being able to recall what people had said and done. Alison was made Presses of the Grand Antiquities Society at Trades House in 2007 and she was very proud of her work as an active member for three years on the Draper's Fund, which supported children's welfare. Alison worked in the cafe and gift shop of Trades House from 2002 until she moved to the offices at Trades House from 2004- 2009.

Alison was baptised in Greenbank by the Rev Archie Fulton and became a member when she was 18 years old. When she was 21 she joined the Congregational Board and in 1991 she was ordained as an elder. She was district Elder for part of Newton Mearns and was a Free Will Offering Registrar. When Alison was part of the Sunday morning duty team, at the front door of the church, it is fair to say that there was always a very light hearted friendly and welcoming atmosphere.

Alison's affections were always firmly focused on her family, on Wallace and on her girls, Gillian and Pamela. Alison was the kind of mum who got involved in her daughters' lives and was very welcoming to all their friends who loved visiting her home and to whom Alison was a confidante. Alison always saw the big picture. She was fiercely loyal and protective, not only of her daughters, but also of all their friends. She was a devoted Gran to her grandsons and one of her great sadnesses was knowing that she would not be around to see them grow up.

Alison Dick led a very full and busy life. She was very brave and stoical in illness and more concerned about the effect it was having on her family than on herself. She was a sociable, friendly, bubbly, loving and unselfish woman who will be deeply missed by her family and friends.

Today we give thanks to God for the life and service of Alison Dick and commend Wallace, Gillian and Pamela and the wider family to the love and care of our Lord Jesus Christ.

GREENBANK CHURCH - NOW WE'RE LISTED

Last August we received a proposal from Historic Environment Scotland to list our church property (excluding the halls, manse, Church Officer's house and link building). This proposal has since been ratified meaning that the church is now a Grade C listed building which signifies it as having architectural or historical interest within a "local" context. (Grade A is the highest grading offering national importance, Grade B offers regional importance.)

Many of our neighbouring churches are listed and it almost seemed an anomaly that Greenbank has not been listed to date.

Greenbank has been listed because it is "a good example of a Gothic Revival church built for a small parish [!]. Although modest in terms of scale and design, it is little-altered with some good detailing to both the interior and exterior" and "the main body of the church has been little altered since construction in the 1880s, and the chancel addition has undergone minimal change since it was added in the 1930s. Later interventions are relatively minor and do not detract from the overall character of the building."

All **External Alterations**, with some minor exceptions, will now involve us in formal applications to East Renfrewshire Council on each and every occasion. (Historic Environment Scotland will only be required to become involved if the local authority need expert advice on the listing). Historic Environment Scotland advise "we probably will not need listed building consent if we are replacing old materials for new on a 'like-for-like' basis and the repair work won't affect the character of the building".

Internal alterations - Whilst a church still operates as a church, internal alterations to a Church are covered by the Ecclesiastical Exemption. This exempts us from requiring listed building consent.

LODGING HOUSE MISSION

The Lodging House Mission is extremely grateful for all the ways that the congregation of Greenbank continues to support it. The list below gives an indication of how our congregation has shown support recently:-

To celebrate the centenary of the Junior Section of the BB, the Junior Section of our Boys' Brigade Company has been doing 100 challenges. As part of this the boys collected a large quantity of tea, coffee and sugar for the LHM.

Ladies attending the Age Concern Eastwood Dementia Project, which meets at The Stables in Eastwood Park, put together a beautifully decorated basket containing boxes of chocolates, which was much appreciated by the LHM.

First year pupils from Armadale Academy donated a large quantity of items, including toiletries, tinned food, sweets and a sleeping bag. They had been learning about homelessness in their personal and social class with their teacher, Maureen McAughtrie.

Sincere thanks to all who have donated sugar to the LHM. They use a lot of sugar at LHM, and are always very grateful for our donations.

Many thanks to all who supported the Lodging House Mission by purchasing Christmas cards. Card sales this year totalled £825, and you purchased a total of 237 packs! Thanks, also, for responding to the Christmas Appeal for cash donations.

News

The Glasgow Winter Night Shelter is in operation again, running from 1st December 2017 until 31st March 2018. This offers safe and warm refuge to rough sleepers during the harshest winter months and has a capacity of 40. Many of the overnight guests stay on at the Lodging House Mission the next day to partake of the free shower facilities, food and support services offered. At least for the duration of the Night Shelter, the Day Centre will be open 7 days a week to offer continuous daytime shelter, too.

Saturday opening at LHM continues to be supported by 15 churches in Glasgow Presbytery who provide a team of 4 people each Saturday on a rota basis. We are fortunate to have 12 people here at Greenbank who support this, and thank them for doing so. Our last date was Saturday, 16th December, when David Dowell, Elizabeth McKenzie, Anne Muir and Susan Wilkie were on duty. The next date for Greenbank will be Saturday, 31st March, when Jeanne, Bill Stein, Susan Johnston and myself will form a team. If you would like to be involved with this, please let me know.

The Lodging House Mission was open on Christmas Day to provide a 3 course Christmas meal and a small gift to around 100 people. A carol service was included in the Christmas Day programme.

All are invited to attend the Homelessness Sunday Service, which will take place at the Lodging House Mission, 35 East Campbell Street, on Sunday, 4th February at 6.30pm. The guest speaker this year is the Rt Rev Dr Derek Browning, the current Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland. There will be an opportunity to have a chat over a cup of tea or coffee after the service. I will have some space in my car if anyone requires transport.

SLEEP IN THE PARK 2017

A mass sleep-out to end homelessness in Scotland. For Good.

On 9th December 2017, four undaunted Greenbankers, Jeanne Roddick, Alison Allan, Annrose Bisset and myself, braved the elements of a cold winter's night by sleeping out at sub-zero temperatures (-6 degrees centigrade). Why did we do this you ask? Organised by the charity, Social Bite, with the aim to eradicate homelessness in Scotland within a 5 year period, we joined over 8000 people who voluntarily slept under the stars in Princes St Gardens. The charity not only raised huge awareness of the enormity of the problem of homelessness in Scotland, but also managed to raise a massive sum of £4million, which will be invested in a nationwide jobs programme for the homeless; new housing and accommodation models; addiction rehabilitation facilities; and Social Bite food provision - all measures to try to end homelessness in Scotland.

Thanks to the generosity of many people in Greenbank, in the community, friends, family and work colleagues, the four of us raised £4437.50 including gift aid. This is tremendous support. Knowing we had this support behind us got us through the coldness of the night.

GLASGOW NORTH EAST FOODBANK

The foodbank would like to wish all at Greenbank, a little belatedly, a Happy New Year and thank you for your support over the past year.

Greenbank has now been supporting this foodbank for four years and has donated a massive 1094Kg of food over that time. This does not include toiletries or Advent Calendar donations. This breaks down to providing 3280 meals for people in the east end of Glasgow and the assistance of the several volunteers who come along to help.
