#### **Dear Friends**

I do hope that you have had a good summer and it was a time of rest and relaxation. Whether you managed to go further afield or spend some free time at home, I hope you benefitted from it. With people away, the summer weeks at Greenbank were a bit quieter but it didn't stop Sunday mornings being blessed by the attendance of people of all ages at every service. I especially enjoyed the fact [and I know many others did too] that everyone – adults and children were able to worship so happily and comfortably together. Hopefully the services affirmed the fact that Greenbank is not just a building but a group of people of all ages who belong together as children of the One God.

2018 has been designated by both the Scottish Government and the Church of Scotland as The Year of Young People. This provides an opportunity to give thanks for the presence and the gifts of young people in our midst. However, in a church where it is often said that children and young people are the future of the church, I am convinced that the decisions and attitudes that adults make with respect to them and their families, will determine that future.

This month, we start a new session in our church's life. We have already moved away from the Summer Holiday type of service with Sunday Club and JAM resuming on 19<sup>th</sup> August. On this Sunday, I spoke about the Church without Walls Report published by the Church of Scotland in 2001 which, at the time, urged its adult members in churches to focus on creating friendships with the next generation. The report stated that churches were failing to keep promises made to children at baptism by their failure to create nurturing friendships with children and their families. It went on to suggest that these friendships could only begin when every adult in a church knew the name of some of the children and young families in their congregation – 17 years later - how many names do you know?

The SNAP Saturday night Community Youth Club has started back again and most youth organisations start back this month and there are many ways in which you can help with this work of befriending young people without making a weekly commitment. I warmly encourage you to make contact with one of the leaders listed on the 'What's On' sheet accompanying this Good Neighbour to see if you can help. On the afternoon of 8<sup>th</sup> September Greenbank is hosting a Community Fete for all the family, in the church, halls and grounds [weather permitting] which will again provide many befriending opportunities not only with children and young people and their families in our church but with those in the surrounding community too. Please put the date in your diary and come along to what promises to be a fun day for all ages –further details about the event are in this edition of Good Neighbour.

Although the work of Greenbank's Legacy group has seemed a little quiet over the summer months, I very much hope to see firm progress with the proposed plans for Greenbank's future over the next six to nine months. I am encouraged by the General Assembly's decision to urge its congregations to face up to decline and to bring forward robust, sustainable and radical plans for the future. I find this affirming because this exactly what Greenbank's Legacy Group and Kirk Session have been working towards in the last few years. However, I also believe that everyone has a part to play in ensuring a good and sustainable future for Greenbank through the friendships and positive attitudes that they adopt towards those around them – young and older alike.

So may all ages know the presence of God's love and blessings in this new session for Greenbank and in the future plans He has for us all.

### **TRIBUTE TO CHARLIE CAIRNS**

Read in Greenbank Church 8th July 2018

Charlie Cairns, one of our elders, died on the 30<sup>th</sup> of May.

Born in Leith on 16<sup>th</sup> October 1925, Charlie was the eldest of six children. His father was a coal merchant and Charlie used to feed the horse which pulled his father's cart, tend chickens and kill the chickens for dinner ---which put him off chicken for life. Charlie attended Hermitage Park Primary School then Norton Park Secondary School. He was also a member of the Boys' Brigade.

When war broke out in September 1939, Charlie left school and was employed by Bruce Peebles, an electrical equipment manufacturer, where he undertook a 5 year apprenticeship as a toolmaker. The factory manufactured war equipment so, when he turned 18, he wasn't "called-up" as he was in a reserved occupation but Charlie did his bit with overnight Home Guard duties. At the end of the war he served his National Service in the Fleet Air Arm. His church involvement in the navy began when he realised that by attending church on a Sunday morning he would be excused from deck cleaning duties. From this began his adult involvement in the Kirk.

When Charlie was 17, his father passed away, leaving Charlie as the main breadwinner. He helped support his family until he married Wilma in July 1952 whom he met at a motor cycling club dance. Charlie, as well as being a keen dancer, was a keen motor-cyclist and owned the first Norton Dominator in Scotland. Charlie and Wilma set up their first home in Leith where John and Norman were born. When Charlie moved to Clarkston he became works director of Tulliallan Fabrics in Rutherglen. In this role he helped the company achieve the Queen's Award for export; during this time Angela was born. In 1980, rather than move to Bradford, he took a job as a sales rep with Ashton Brothers and from this he made many friends all over Scotland and Northern Ireland. Many Greenbankers benefitted from Charlie's towel samples, nappies and baby bedding products up until he retired in 1992. Family holidays were spent in Kingsbarns in Fife and later further afield in Devon and Cornwall before he and Wilma started going abroad, particularly to Austria, a place Charlie loved.

Charlie was ordained as an elder of Greenbank in 1974 and served on the Fabric and Grounds committees. He was a faithful District Elder for Daleview Drive until he transferred to the Retired List in September 2003. Charlie received his 30 year Service Certificate in 2004. He participated fully in the work of the Kirk Session and was a faithful attender at Kirk Session meetings and church activities.

Charlie was a hardworking, practical man who loved his family. He was a keen gardener and enjoyed growing tomatoes in his greenhouse and giving them out to friends and neighbours. He helped his children with DIY and decorating. He always wanted his own children to do well and was so proud of all their achievements. He loved all his six grandchildren and enjoyed spending time with them.

After Wilma passed away in 2009, he did remarkably well on his own and was fiercely independent, in a nice way. He was very grateful for the support of family, friends and neighbours.

Charlie Cairns was a man who didn't seem to worry about anything and he never held a grudge. He would speak to anyone and made friends easily. He liked everyone, except the doctor who took his driving licence away from him! Often unconsciously funny and non p.c., he was a kind, generous, endearing, friendly, warm hearted man, who will be sorely missed by all who knew him and loved him.

Today we give thanks to God for the life and service of Charlie Cairns and commend John, Norman, Angela and the wider family to love and care of our Lord Jesus Christ.

### KIRK SESSION – WHAT DO THEY TALK ABOUT?

The Kirk Session met on 5<sup>th</sup> June with 51 members attending and they discussed a wide range of issues.

**Worship:** The Kirk Session received a report on the Saturday Morning Book Club which will continue to meet over the summer months. The Kirk Session expressed thanks to those who volunteered to provide services in local care homes throughout the year and to members of the worship group who led morning worship on a number of occasions during the year.

**Outreach:** The Kirk Session noted that Christian Aid raised £3,800 from door to door collections and £527 from the Big Brekkie. The Craft and Card sale and weekly sales of cards had raised £300 for the Lodging House Mission. The Greenbank Team was on duty at the Lodging House Mission on Saturday 14<sup>th</sup> July. The Glasgow North East Foodbank continued to be used by ever increasing numbers of people and there was an ongoing need for donations.

**Finance:** The Financial Position was updated and this showed 2.5% increase in offerings for the period to 20<sup>th</sup> May. Since the last report contributions have been received from The Guild, Friendship Café, Timeout, 1<sup>st</sup> Clarkston Guides and 1<sup>st</sup> Clarkston Rainbow Guides. Enquiries from external organisations for hall space continue and current lets generate useful income towards the upkeep of our halls. The Craft Sale raised £279 and the Holiday Club £125. The additional publicity given to retiring offerings had improved the level of donations to these worthy causes.

**Fabric:** The Kirk Session approved the redecorating over the summer of the entrance vestibule of the Church, and the Session House, Kitchen and Toilets and some corridors in the halls. Approval was also granted to treat rising damp in the Manse and dampness in part of the Church Officer's house. Concern was expressed about damage done to internal decoration in the halls and leaders of organisations were asked to engender an ethos of care for our buildings amongst their group members.

**Fellowship**. The Kirk Session noted the success of the Easter Holiday Club with about 40 primary school children attending. Reports were also received from Timeout where the membership is approximately 20 and on The Guild outing to Dumfries House. The Guild is also distributing their usual sunshine bags for the summer months.

**Youth:** The Kirk Session received a report on the SNAP Youth Club which caters for young people in P7 to S3 on a Saturday night. An appeal was made for further volunteers to help on a Saturday night between 6-30pm and 9pm. This need only be on an occasional basis: **if you can help contact the minister.** Volunteers are also required on a Friday afternoon to help run Cosy Café from 2-45pm till 4pm for young people after school. This rota is once per month in term time. **If you can help contact the church office.** The Kirk Session offered congratulations to the 4 Boys Brigade boys who gained their Queen's badge this year.

**Other Matters:** The Kirk Session dealt with a number of administrative matters including agreeing the Retiring Offerings for next year. A number of members have moved and not left forwarding addresses. Members who have moved are asked to ensure they give their new address to the church office or their elder. Jim Guy, one of our long serving elders, was thanked by the Moderator for his past work as a District Elder and former Fabric Convenor on his transfer to the retired list.

The Moderator reported on the recent General Assembly in which a proposal had been put forward by the Council of Assembly for a ten year plan for the church. The proposal had been rejected by a 77% majority in favour of more fundamental action and the Council was instructed to return to next year's Assembly with a more radical plan.

These items of confectionery were enjoyed by the service users at LHM.

Bill Stein, Susan Wilkie, Elizabeth McKenzie and I formed a team helping at the LHM on Saturday, 14th July. It was a busy day, with lots of time spent in the kitchen serving teas, coffees and breakfasts; operating the dishwasher; preparing lunch; and clearing and cleaning. All of this under the capable and watchful eye of the wonderful weekend volunteer chef, Sharif. Sharif is a great teacher in the kitchen, judging quantities with amazing precision. We helped him prepare a delicious mixed fish biryani, made using 5kg of rice, which was very well received by the diners.

There are now 16 churches on the rota for Saturday opening at LHM. The next date for Greenbank is Saturday, 27th October. Please let me know if you would like to be part of the large team of volunteers from Greenbank.

The next fundraising event is the sponsored cycle, part of the annual fundraising day, on Saturday, 25th August. Dear Friends,

Greetings from Shetland

For anyone who is unaware of what I have been doing recently, let me fill you in. After I finished my placement at Claremont Church in May, I came up to the Shetland Islands for five weeks of work experience. Shetland is the most northern part of the United Kingdom and the locals have a very distinct idea of identity. You realise this very clearly when you hear them talking about "visiting" Scotland.

Contrary to the impression that might be given by Douglas Henshall and the makers of the TV series 'Shetland', the islands are not fluttering with crime scene tape or covered with bodies being protected by forensic tents on various beaches and moors. Indeed, if you speak to the locals about the show, the islanders themselves seem a little bemused by the programme. The reality for them is that they have not had a murder since 1952, they have only six police officers for all of the 151 islands that make up the Shetland Isles and most of the time, when you see a film shot of a car driving on a road, the person driving ends up at a completely different location from where they should by following that road.

I wonder if this last observation is a metaphor for times in our own lives when we take ourselves down certain paths but end up at an unexpected location. There are other metaphors to be found here in the islands.

Something you are constantly aware of in Shetland is the boats. We arrived on the car/passenger ferry from Aberdeen to Lerwick but there are many other harbours here and many different types of boats: fishing boats, mussel boats, pleasure boats, working boats hauling goods such as oil and materials and lifesaving boats. There are even boats the sole purpose of which is to help other boats, whether as a pilot to guide a big cruise ship or as a taxi to get people and goods from ship to shore and back again.

Another thing they are not short of in Shetland is churches. The Church of Scotland has 33 buildings, excluding manses, throughout the islands and, if you look at other Christian denominations, there are 15 listed in the centre of Lerwick alone! Speaking from my recent experiences in the presbyteries of Glasgow, Falkirk and Hamilton, Shetland seems just like the rest of Scotland with regard to ageing and reducing congregations. As a denomination, we, in the Church of Scotland, seem to be obsessed with our buildings. There is great resistance to change and many people seem intent on keeping on the road that they have always been travelling on. Although small by Glasgwegian standards, the churches here all appear to be beautifully maintained and looked after even if the congregation is, in one case, around three people and there is a service only once a month.

En route and whilst here, I have been struck by the comparison between the people of God in a church and a ship in a harbour. Any sailor will tell you that a ship needs regularly to go to a harbour for maintenance, to be refreshed and filled with fuel and supplies. However, this visit to a harbour is so that the ship can carry out its true function when at sea. Similarly, we, as Christians, need to go to Church regularly for our spiritual maintenance, to be refreshed and fuelled with the Spirit of God. However, that visit to church is so that we can carry out our own true function in the world.

There is a real danger that some people are so comfortable in their harbour that they rarely venture out. So rarely, in fact, that even the thought of venturing to another harbour becomes a big issue. They seem intent on sticking to the road they are on but, as I have mentioned regarding the TV series earlier, the road we think we are following doesn't always lead us to where we expect. I have certainly found this to be true as, up until a short while ago, I would never have expected to find myself, even if only temporarily and for a very short while (as Shona is at pains to remind me), in the beautiful Shetland Islands.

### **BUSHIDO KARATE CLUB**

Just before the summer break we had a number of students who achieved their Black belts so huge congratulations to Hilary Carswell, Douglas Carswell, Iain Cherry, Araceli Clark, Scott Grindlay, and Stathis Voukelatos who achieved his 2nd Dan and finally to Orla O'Shea who achieved her Junior 2<sup>nd</sup> Dan, a first in our club history. They all showed great skill during their grading (exam) which is down to their hard work and commitment to the art.

#### A reason to join our great club - COGNITIVE IMPROVEMENTS


A study in the Journal of Sport and Health Science, which included 89 older women and men, average age 70, looked at the possible cognitive benefits of karate training versus a more general fitness programme. The participants were randomly assigned to one of three groups. One group practiced karate twice a week for five months. A second group did traditional fitness activities twice a week for five months, including running, strength training, gymnastics, and other activities that build coordination, balance, strength, and body awareness. A third (control) group just continued their normal activities. Only the karate group showed improvement in attentiveness (as measured by the ability to divide attention between two tasks), reaction time, and mental resilience under stress (which involved a computer test that required the user to react to rapidly changing colours and sounds). It's not clear why karate would produce better cognitive results than the other types of exercise, but the authors cited other research suggesting that karate's specific blend of aerobics, balance, and coordination may have a particularly beneficial effect on the brain.


