

At our Christmas watchnight service it was wonderful to be reacquainted with the many familiar [and now adult] faces of so many of the children who have attended our Sunday Clubs during the time that I have been the minister here at Greenbank. Hi Guys

Happy Setsubun Day! What, I hear you ask is Setsubun Day? Setsubun (22) in Japanese means "season boundary" - the day before the beginning of each season. The Spring Setsubun is called Risshun (22). Some of the older people in the congregation will be pleased to hear that it is celebrated in Japan as the last day of winter. This happens on the 3rd or 4th of February each year as part of the Spring Festival (22, Haru Matsuri). The word Setsubun especially means the day before the first day of Spring, as Spring was considered to be the beginning of a New Year. Japanese people chant "Oni wa soto! Fuku wa uchi!" while throwing soybeans (mame). They do this to chase away the evil Oni (2 ogres, evil spirits). After Mame-maki (22) the bean scattering) is over, everyone eats the same number of beans as their own age. It is believed that by doing so, people will not be unwell during that year.



Special sushi rolls called *Eho-maki* (22) ("lucky direction roll") are eaten on Setsubun. They are eaten whole in one go while facing the yearly lucky compass direction, This year's lucky direction is west-southwest. Sushi is made from raw fish and seaweed. Still think I prefer haggis!!

GLASGOW WINTER NIGHT SHELTER

The Glasgow Winter Night Shelter is currently in operation. This is a joint initiative run by Glasgow City Mission and Lodging House Mission, at the LHM premises at 35 East Campbell Street. The Night Shelter runs from 1st December 2018 until 31st March 2019, and offers people a bed for the night during the coldest months of the year. People sleep on mattresses on the floor of the main hall.

HOMELESSNESS SERVICE

All are invited to attend the Lodging House Mission's Homelessness Service, which will take place at their premises at 35 East Campbell Street on Sunday 3rd February 2019 at 6.30pm. The Guest Speaker will be the Right Rev Susan Brown, Moderator of the Church of Scotland. Refreshments will be served after the service when there will be an opportunity for fellowship and discussion of homelessness issues, and to see how the Glasgow Winter Night Shelter is being hosted and supported. Following a sustained period without a chaplain in LHM, a good attendance would be valued to demonstrate to the service users how much the church community in Glasgow cares for them. MEARNSKIRK HOSPITAL MEMORIES

Mearnskirk Hospital was located in open countryside and opened as a children's TB hospital in 1930. It subsequently became a general hospital and at its peak had more than 500 beds.

Services led by churches were begun in 1933 by the then minister of Newton Mearns Parish Church, along with Mr James Rodger of Maple Evangelical Church.



Stamperland Church's involvement with the hospital began in 1958 when 2 members of the congregation joined in the services, then the

church became more fully involved in 1960 conducting short services in a number of wards every Sunday.


Mr Rodger continued as leader for 40 years until just before his death in 1975 when Mr Alex Muirhead of Victoria Hall succeeded him as leader until he retired in 1981.


At that time the late Jack Fraser of Stamperland took over as leader.

Many local churches readily joined the rota over the years to regularly lead services Sunday by Sunday, some also being similarly involved at the Victoria Infirmary. Several churches such as Clarkston Baptist, Greenview Church, Kingspark Baptist, Newlands South, Newton Mearns, Victoria Hall, Maxwell Mearns, Mearns Parish, Giffnock Park and Crosshill Queens Park played their part but later dropped out.



The hospital closed in the 1980's with the exception of two wings at Mearnskirk House which continued as a long term care unit.





A huge thank you to all those who have participated over the years bringing God's message to the patients. You, the Sunday singers and musicians, may have been the only visitors that some patients may have had.
