Dear Friends,

I can't believe that we have reached May already. It feels like we have gone from Christmas to Easter at an alarming rate this year. Whilst the months seem to be speeding ahead, some plans that I had at the beginning of the year seem to be moving very slowly, much slower than I had anticipated. Perhaps that's because nowadays I am so used to immediate results, like taking photographs at events and celebrations that I can share with friends and family straight away, or sending text messages expecting an immediate reply. However, making and achieving plans doesn't always work out like that and there will always be times when they don't happen fast enough, or in the way that I want them to.

Over the years that I have been a Minister, there have been times when I have thrown up my hands in frustration and confusion and added my voice to that of Moses, Jeremiah and other workers in God's church over the centuries, who have questioned why circumstances haven't turned out as they planned or imagined. I know that I am not alone in these thoughts, for everyone has times in life when the circumstances they plan for don't become the reality they hoped for. In the end, I believe that God will always come to my rescue, sometimes through the words of a bible passage or through the words of another person, to remind me that He has a plan and that those moments of frustration and confusion are part of the process of discovering His plan for me and for His church.

This has made me wonder if we might try, in this month of May, to recognise the things going on in one another's lives; the unfulfilled plans or changes of direction that we cannot possibly identify without digging a little deeper. The normal response to the question, "How are you?" is often "Oh, I'm fine!" and once these words have been exchanged we usually get on with whatever we are doing. It's a sad state of affairs if we are among others who could benefit from our care and concern and to whom we do not respond properly. Perhaps, we might take the time to ask the people we meet a different question, like, "How is life with you right now?" Of course they might just reply "nothing much happening", which really won't change the conversation. However, it could lead to a different kind of conversation that lifts someone's spirit and reminds them, and us, of the God who comes close, to assure us of His loving presence in all circumstances, the God who asks us to trust in His plan for our lives:

"For I know the plans I have for you," declares the Lord, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future" [Jeremiah 29:11 NIV]

So may trust and blessings abound in this month of May and our conversations help make God's promises a reality in our lives and in the lives of others.

EASY CHEESY SNOWMAN GARLIC PIZZA BREADS



Ingredients:

3 English muffins, 1 clove garlic, 20g butter, pinch finely chopped parsley, 60g grated mozzarella, 3 mini Pepperami sausages, 1/4 orange pepper.

Method:

- Preheat the oven to 180°C/350°F/Gas Mark 4.
- Split all three English muffins in half.
- Peel and crush or finely chop the garlic clove, then mix with the butter and parsley until well combined.
- Spread the garlic butter over the cut sides of the muffin halves and top with the grated mozarella.
- Slice the mini pepperoni sausages into rounds. Cut 6 triangles from the orange pepper. Arrange them on the top of each muffin to form a snowman face design.
- Bake in the oven for 5-10 minutes until the cheese is melted and bubbling.

LEGACY UPDATE

An update in February let you know that the Kirk Session had come to the view that proceeding with its preferred option of creating a new church on the site opposite Williamwood High School was likely to result in a high risk of delay and too large a funding gap to make it feasible. It went on to say that the Session had gone back to the other options in the original feasibility report, i.e. building a new church on our existing site, probably on the manse site, or re-designing the current sanctuary building to increase its flexibility, replacing the old halls with a modern extension to the sanctuary building. An architect has been appointed to examine these two options in detail, assess what we

might be able to do with remaining parts of the current site and to open discussion with the planners. We hope that the architect's report will be ready by the summer and once the Session has studied it, the intention is to pass as much information as we can to you in order that we can come to a decision about the best way forward. We remain committed, as I am sure you are also, to creating a sustainable, worshipping congregation for future generations and this work will help determine how best that might be achieved.

SPECIAL NOTICE

We have had notification of bogus workmen operating in the Clarkston area recently so we thought it would be useful to advise everyone (whatever your age!!) of a few simple steps you can take to protect yourself from becoming a victim. It is unusual these days for reputable companies to go around knocking on doors looking for business so treat each caller with a huge dose of suspicion. **NEVER** agree on the doorstep to any work being done for you. **ALWAYS** tell the caller politely that you'll think about it and will talk to someone else before making a decision (this normally deters bogus callers). **NEVER** pay money up front unless you receive a proper invoice (check that there's a VAT registration number - the absence of one is a tell-tale sign that things aren't quite right) and never accept a lift to the bank to withdraw money. **ALWAYS** try and get the name of the individual and/or company - you can easily check them out by phoning East Renfrewshire Trading Standards on 0800 013 0076 (confidential helpline). It is always a good idea to pause and take time before making a decision. If possible ask a family member for their advice or phone a friend in Greenbank for their advice.

LODGING HOUSE MISSION

ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

The Annual General Meeting of the Lodging House Mission took place at 7pm on Wednesday, 3rd April. The meeting was opened with a prayer and welcome by Rev Roger Sturrock.

The annual report and accounts were presented by Ewen Mackie, Chairman. It was noted that LHM is now open 365 days per year, and that 21 churches now participate in the rota to provide Saturday opening. The contribution made

by churches was acknowledged. The period of the Winter Night Shelter has now ended. In the past year there has been improvement work carried out on the front of the building, and there are plans to install access for disabled visitors.

Existing Directors Ewen Mackie, Ranald Findlay, and Gus Smeaton were re-elected, and Wylie and Bisset were reappointed as auditors/independent examiners.

There were three further speakers - Stephen Mitchell, who has been employed at LHM for almost a year in the role of assistant manager, spoke of his first impressions and thoughts as a newcomer to LHM; Fergus Cook told us about his experiences as a volunteer at LHM; and Raymond, who is a guest at LHM, shared his story with us.

The LHM choir, "Mission Voices", entertained us with their singing.

GUS SMEATON

Gus has been performing the role of Manager at Lodging House Mission for five years as a volunteer. His commitment to LHM is exceptional. Gus has decided that the time is right for him to retire from this role, and Stephen Mitchell will assume the role of Manager from 1st May. Gus will, however, continue to support LHM as a Director and as Treasurer.

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
