Dear Friends,

Harvest is still commemorated annually by a church service here at Greenbank despite the fact that the days when communities came together to bring in the harvest have long since disappeared. Most produce is available in shops throughout the year, so the society we live in has lost the concept of a 'harvest season'. Yet, as Christians we should never take all the good things we have in our lives for granted. A spirit of thanksgiving to God ought to be our response for everything we have been given, alongside a deep concern for those whose lives are under threat because they have so little.

Our 2019 Harvest Thanksgiving took place on the 22nd September and, as in previous years at this Service, everyone was invited to support the work of the Lodging House Mission through the donation of foods and money. Thank you to everyone who gave so generously to ensure that the stockrooms and bank balance of those who care for the homeless people in our city were well resourced for the winter months ahead.

This Harvest Thanksgiving, Greenbank also took part in the 90kg rice challenge to give a helping hand to Malawian farmers and their families. Malawi is one of the world's poorest countries and less than 1 in 4 children are able to attend secondary school. The 90kg rice challenge was inspired by the fact that, if farmers can sell just 90 x 1kg of Kilombero rice at a fair price, they will be able to send a child to Secondary School for a year. By taking part in the challenge Greenbank showed that by simply making changes to the way we buy food, we can help to transform the lives of some of the world's poorest people. Amazingly, every single bag of rice was sold after the service and I want to thank everyone who purchased it, hopefully this is something that we might do again in the future.

Harvest Thanksgiving is a reminder that this world is not as God intends it to be and that, within creation, there is more than enough for everyone if people would only share from the plenty that they enjoy. This year, we made a very small beginning, by sharing from our plenty to try and bring justice and hope to the vulnerable homeless in Glasgow and to farmers and their families in Malawi. Perhaps at mealtimes when we sit down together, we might remember them and give thanks, not only for what we have, but also ask God to make us aware of more ways we can give from our plenty, to try and ensure a safer tomorrow for everyone. So may we be counted among those people who tried to ensure a good future for generations to come and as the Apostle Paul reminds us, "not become tired of doing good; for if we do not give up, the time will come when we will reap the harvest." (Galatians 6:9)

Hi Guys,

Did you know that October is National Pizza month? (National Pizza Day in February.) No I didn't either. To me you can eat pizza any month of the year!

The pizza was first "invented" in 1889, the same year as our church first opened its doors. It is commonly believed that pizza originally came from Italy. The word 'pizza' is Italian for pie. It was made for King Umberto and Queen Margherita (hence the name of the most popular pizza) on a visit to Naples. A pizza maker made the dish and decorated it with tomatoes cheese and basil to represent the red, yellow and green in the Italian flag. Pepperoni is the most popular pizza topping in the UK and Oxford is the city which consumes the most pizza. In 2006, a Romanian, Cristian Dumitru, ate 200 pounds of pizza in a single week – that's more than his entire body weight - and New Zealander, Josh Anderson. He devoured a 12-incher in just one minute and 45 seconds. Skills. Pizza artist Domenico Crolla, from Glasgow creates incredible portraits of celebrities from the Mona Lisa to Justin Bieber, using only dough, tomato sauce and cheese. Five billion pizzas are sold worldwide every year and around three billion of these are in the US. That's a lot of slices!!

MAKE YOUR OWN PIZZA!

It's dead easy and a lot of fun. You could even add some of the top ten favourite toppings

Homemade Pizza

1 hour 15 min **Serves: 2** 250g plain flour 1 teaspoon dried active baking yeast pinch salt 300ml water 1 tablespoon olive oil

Toppings - tomato puree, mozzarella cheese, sliced or grated ham, mushrooms, peppers, onions, pepperoni, pineapple, sweetcorn

Method

Prep:30min > Cook:15min > Extra time:30min resting > Ready in:1hr15min

Whisk together the flour, yeast and salt. Stir in the water and olive oil, adding more flour a little at a time if the dough is too sticky. Form the dough into a ball, cover and let the dough rest for 15 minutes.

Preheat the oven to 200 C / Gas 6. Spread the dough onto a generously floured baking tray. Spread the tomato puree over the pizza base, layer on the mozzarella cheese and add other ingredients as desired.

Bake in the preheated oven until the pizza base is puffed and golden, about 15 minutes.



90KG RICE CHALLENGE

Please support the 90kg Rice Challenge! Greenbank is joining hundreds of schools and faith groups who have been participating in this challenge for a number of years. We have 90kg of fairly traded, Kilombero rice, hand sown and grown in the rich soils of Northern Malawi, to sell to our congregation, families, and friends. 90kg is significant as a Malawian farmer has to sell 90kg of rice in order to pay for secondary education for one child for one year. Climate change means that there are now seasons when the rice harvest fails and therefore raising enough money to pay for education is increasingly difficult. In light of this, it is more vital than ever to get behind the farmers in some of the poorest communities in the world and show them our support in enabling them to reap a good harvest, feed their families, and create food security.

Kilombero rice has won a Great Taste award and is the most ethical rice on the market according to Ethical Consumer magazine. I have used the rice to prepare sweet and savoury dishes, and can confirm that it is easy to cook and tastes delicious!

KIRK SESSION – WHAT DO THEY TALK ABOUT?

The Kirk Session met on 3rd September with 57 members attending and they discussed a wide range of issues.

Worship: The Kirk Session noted the busy schedule of September Services and activities including the Worship group leading the service on 8th September, Harvest Thanksgiving Service on 22nd September, Saturday Morning Book Club, Messy Church, and the resumption of choir practices on the 5th September.

Outreach: Reports were received from Glasgow North East Foodbank; Christian Aid, whose sponsored swim takes place on 5th October; Lodging House Mission, where £975 was raised by Greenbank participants in a Sponsored Cycle; and Clarkston Community Choir which restarts on 18th September. The minutes of the Kwenderana Partnership meeting were noted and the Kirk Session approved a new Covenant/ Partnership Agreement between the Ekwendeni Congregation in Malawi and the four Church of Scotland Congregations of Busby, Giffnock South, Greenbank and Williamwood.

Finance: The Financial Position was updated and it was noted that Offering Income had decreased by 3.2% for the 33 weeks to 18^{th} August which was a slight improvement on the May position. Fabric expenditure for the current year totalled £17,476. Since the last report contributions have been received from the Friendship Café, Lunch Club and Bible Study Group. External organisations who use our halls continue to generate useful income towards the upkeep of our halls and enquires for new lets are received regularly. The retiring collection for Crossreach totalled £369 and we received a Church of Scotland Youth Grant of £250.

Fabric: The Kirk Session approved additional unbudgeted electrical safety work of £1,336 and additional work to treat damp in the manse costing £2,784. During July the painting work in the Fraser Hall, Cowley Hall and Hall of Friendship was completed.

Fellowship: The Kirk Session received reports on the successful Community Fun Day in August which raised over £400. Church organisations are now resuming after the summer break; including The Guild, which has good numbers and an interesting new syllabus; Time Out which continued to meet over the summer; the Lunch Club which resumes on 27th September, the Friendship Café, and Cosy Café for schoolchildren; and Snap Youth Club, which is still looking for a paid leader. There are a number of social events in the forthcoming months: Saturday 5th October – 135th Celebration Night, Saturday 16th November – Clarkston Christmas Extravaganza, and Saturday 23rd November – Greenbank Christmas Fair.

Liaison Report

The Kirk Session received a very comprehensive report on the 31 church and user organisations visited by the Kirk Session. Jeanette Mackay, the new Liaison Convenor, was warmly thanked for her hard work in organising this important task.

Legacy: The Kirk Session received an update on the legacy project and approved continuing work on the option of redeveloping the current site. Subsequent to the meeting an update letter has been sent to all members of the congregation.

Other Matters: The Kirk Session dealt with a number of administrative matters including the following:

New members, transfer of members who have not forwarded change of addresses to the supplementary roll, November Communion arrangements.

The resignations of Jim Harvey and Neil and Val Scholfield from the Kirk Session were accepted, as they were all moving away from the district. The Moderator warmly thanked them, not only for their faithful years of service as elders, but also for the other tasks they had carried out in Greenbank.
