

Dear Friends,

On the final Sunday of 2019, I referred to the song 'So, this is Christmas' by written by Yoko Ono and John Lennon in 1971. The song like the other Lennon song "Imagine" was a protest song against war and terror but it was also a song of hope which asked people a vital question "What have you done?"

"So, this is Christmas And what have you done? Another year over And a new one just begun"

"What have you done?" is a question many ask, as one year closes and a new one begins. The closing days of 2019 testified to this as the media focused on that question and, as a result, showed articles and TV programmes listing things like the top ten greatest moments in sport, the top ten news stories, and all kinds of similar things looking back and giving people the opportunity to review what they had done in the past year.

So what did you do in 2019? Maybe it was a year of milestones. Maybe you moved on to the next stage of life. Maybe you got married or maybe you welcomed a child or grandchild into the world. Or maybe 2019 was a hard year. Maybe it was the year a loved one died, a year of family conflict, the year when you made some bad decisions. Maybe it was a year you'd like to forget!

No one yet knows what will happen or what they will do in the remaining eleven months of 2020 but no matter what happens, in good times and bad, perhaps we might all travel with this reminder: that while the days ahead may sometimes be challenging, the love of God in Jesus Christ will offer us healing when we hurt, strength in every struggle, the delight of new discoveries, the peace that passes understanding, the hope that lifts spirit and the faith that inspires. The love of God in Jesus Christ will lead us on the way, on the paths we follow, the causes we embrace, the joys we celebrate, the experiences we have, the truths we tell, the church we create and bring us closer to the meaning of all our tomorrows.

In 2020, so may the words of the ancient 3500 year old but ever young Aaronic blessing surround you and "The Lord bless and keep you! The Lord let His face shine upon you, and be gracious to you! The Lord look upon you kindly and give you peace!"

GREENBANK'S LENTEN SUNDAY NIGHTS 2020 from 1 MARCH 2020

'Exploring the God Question'Many people consider taking on something new for Lent. In order to do that this year, perhaps y

Many people consider taking on something new for Lent. In order to do that this year, perhaps you might consider participating in Greenbank's Lenten Sunday Night series which will focus on the **'Exploring the God Question'** material and will offer participants the opportunity to learn more about the wide range of evidence about God's existence and the world we live in.

This very accessible and easily understandable 'Exploring the God Question' series is intended for people of all ages and will take place on the six Sundays during Lent in the Fraser Hall beginning on Sunday 1st March. It will begin at 6pm and finish at 7.15 pm.

Atheists, agnostics and those who believe in the existence of God tend to agree that our existence is truly remarkable. Is that a consequence of being winners in a cosmic lottery or a creator's intention? That ultimately is the 'God Question' addressed in a series produced in Scotland for a worldwide audience. 'Exploring the God Question' takes as objective an approach as possible to Science, God and the Search for Truth. The series tests the claim that the existence of God is 'entirely lacking in evidence'. Six half hour DVD programmes bring world renowned contributors from both sides of the science/God debate to unpack the evidence found in the three broad topics of the Cosmos, Life and Evolution and the hidden depths of Mind and Consciousness. Each topic will be split into two and the overall format will be made up of segments of interviews linked by a story teller and interspersed with impressive visuals designed to encourage and support discussion afterwards about the content of the programme.

The intended audience for the 'all age' series is people of faith as well as those with no religious faith – indeed anyone who is searching. Participants are likely to have an interest in truth rather than choosing to maintain a position without testing its validity. The Lenten series will encourage a thoughtful evidence–based search for truth about God, particularly in the light of what modern science is revealing about

- the origin of the universe
- the development of life on earth
- the sophistication of the human mind and brain

THINKING OF GIVING SOME ONE YOU LOVE A GIFT FOR VALENTINE'S DAY? TRY VALENTINE PEPPERMINT CREAMS

Ingredients

500g (1lb 2oz) icing sugar, sifted; 1 egg white, stiffly whipped; 1-2tsp lemon juice; a few drops of peppermint oil to taste.

To decorate: Melted chocolate



Method

Mix together the icing sugar, egg white, lemon juice and peppermint oil until you have the texture of pastry. Knead well so that the mixture is smooth, then roll out on a work surface lightly dusted with icing sugar to a thickness of 1cm (½in).

Cut out rounds with a $2\frac{1}{2}$ -4cm (1- $1\frac{1}{2}$ in) cutter – or for fun, try different shaped cutters such as stars, hearts and moons. Pop them on a piece of greaseproof paper and decorate. Leave to harden for 12 hours or overnight.

Hi Folks,

A few weeks ago, Jeanne delivered a sermon in which she quoted the lyrics from John Lennon and Yoko Ono's song "Merry Christmas War is Over." You might read some of it in her pastoral letter. I felt it gave out a very strong message for the year ahead. But I have a slightly different question for you: not "What have you done?" but "Have you made a difference?"

I recall some of the stories I've mentioned previously: one about my sister-in- law making friends with a lady in hospital, another about a friend helping someone bring their washing in when it was raining and a third about the gentleman in the congregation moving bins out of the way on pavements. Each of these stories demonstrates how easy it is to make a difference, without even knowing it: it could be giving support to a young person through a difficult time, or giving a word of encouragement just when it was needed, or holding somebody's hand when they are scared or alone or just giving a smile or a greeting to a stranger we meet on our road. We may not realise we are making a difference, we may not know what differences we have made, we may never know. But if we keep living our lives in the way Jesus wants, then we will continue to make differences, large and small, not just today or tomorrow but in the days, weeks, months and years that lie ahead.




SATURDAY OPENING


