Dear Friends,

Since early times Lent, which begins on 26th February this year, has been a time of preparation that looks forward to Easter and a time when people give things up, such as chocolate, cakes, sweets or alcohol and sometimes something different like watching television or buying something new to wear. The idea of giving something up is meant to be a way of identifying with Jesus experience in the wilderness for 40 days as he prepared for his public ministry.

Giving things up, when we have plenty of things available to us is a valuable thing to do; it reminds us of what is truly necessary in our lives and it reminds us of the plenty and the choices that we have. However, we could also consider taking up something extra to do for Lent like reading a Christian book, or a book of the bible or attending the Lenten Sunday Night Series - 'Exploring the God Question'. We could also make a point of visiting or calling someone each week that we haven't been in contact with for a while or we could say a new prayer each morning to focus our day and our life on God.

A few weeks ago, in church, I mentioned the daily prayer of Fr Mychal Judge, a Franciscan priest and fire chaplain in New York who was killed by falling debris whilst kneeling to pray with someone who was dying on the street. Perhaps we might make his prayer our daily one during Lent:

Lord take me where you want me to go Let me meet who you want me to meet Tell me what you want me to say And keep me out of your way

Whatever you decide to do, or not do this Lent may it be a grace filled and blessed time.

'EXPLORING THE GOD QUESTION'

This very accessible and easily understandable **'Exploring the God Question'** series, will take place on six Sundays during Lent in the Fraser Hall beginning on Sunday 1 March. It will begin at 6pm and finish at 7.15 pm. The series takes as objective an approach as possible to Science, God and the Search for Truth. The series tests the claim that the existence of God is 'entirely lacking in evidence'. Six half hour DVD programmes bring world renowned contributors from both sides of the science/God debate to unpack the evidence found in the three broad topics of the Cosmos, Life and Evolution and the hidden depths of Mind and Consciousness. Each topic will be split into two and the overall format will be made up of segments of interviews linked by a story teller and interspersed with impressive visuals designed to encourage and support discussion afterwards about the content of the programme. The intended audience for the 'all age' series is people of faith as well as those with no religious faith – indeed anyone who is searching. The Lenten series encourages a thoughtful evidence—based search for truth about God, particularly in the light of what modern science is revealing about

- the origin of the universe
- the development of life on earth
- the sophistication of the human mind and brain

As the mornings and evenings gradually get brighter our spirits start to lift too, and the long days of summer don't seem so far off.

Put a little thank you in your prayers for the small signs of new life all around; and ask that spring brings us a little warmth and sunshine to brighten our days.

I'm sure you have all been praying for everyone in China and beyond who has been affected by the Coronavirus. Please keep in your prayers the loved ones of those who have died, and those who are infected. Ask for strength for those who are enduring quarantine, and are having to quash fears that they and theirs could fall ill, as all they can do is sit and wait. Say thank you for all the staff who are caring for the sick and also that those who search for a vaccine and cure will be successful. Pray too that people will not panic and just lash out at anyone of oriental ethnicity.

Remember our partners in Malawi; ask that the help we can give them improves their lives, and that our teamwork stays strong for many more years.

Communities local and worldwide seem to be breaking apart. Ask that people are receptive to different ideas, and have a willingness to cooperate and to consider alternatives.

Please also keep the people of Australia in your prayers in their ongoing battle against the bushfires, and all the consequences that follow, for humanity, wildlife, and the whole ecosystem.

As ever, pray for Greenbank. Say thank you for Jeanne and all the work that she does; and for our elders, for everything that you see them do, and the many things that you don't. Say thank you for Steven's time with us and ask that both he and we benefit from this. Ask that all the events and activities that we run are well attended; and for people to be prepared to give up a little of their free time to help out, so that the burden doesn't fall on the same people all the time.



LEGACY UPDATE

In the last legacy update in December I let you know that we had appointed a firm to market the north part of our site. That work is well underway, the purpose of which is to establish whether or not there is any commercial interest in developing the site and if there is, what the value of the site might be. We have also been working with organisations to establish what their needs might be in a renovated and extended church building in order to prepare a brief for an architect to come up with designs for us. At the same time a great deal of work has also been done on identifying organisations that provide capital funding for projects like our own. Once all this work is concluded we will be in a position to come to you with a firm recommendation as to how best we should proceed. Information meetings will be held so that you can hear what is planned and ask any questions you want, well before we make any final decision. There is still a good amount of work to be done but we are making steady progress, thanks in large part to the willing help offered by a number of elders.

DO YOU WANT TO DO A SMALL THING THAT COULD HELP THE

ENVIRONMENT? If so, then please read on.

In partnership with the Co-op on Eaglesham Road, Greenbank are entering into a food-share partnership with a view to reducing the amount of food going to landfill. Government estimates suggest that 260, 000 tonnes of food is wasted from the retail sector alone and all large supermarkets have signed up to tackle this issue.

But what can we do at Greenbank? Initially we will take food that cannot be sold that is still edible. Items such as bread, other baked goods, fruit and vegetables and pre-packaged foods which have reached their best before date won't be sold but can still be used.

Best before dates are a guide, unlike use-by dates which will automatically be disposed of. Other items such as tins that are bashed are often disposed of and these will be made available too.

A fridge, and other storage solutions, will be placed in the hall of friendship and all are encouraged to take items that they will be able to make use of. It is intended that this is for the whole community and as soon as we have the facilities in place we would ask that you share the information with other people too - not just those who come to church.

As the project develops we will continue to look at other ways the food can be used or re-distributed to avoid going to landfill. RECYCLING INFORMATION

Items that can and cannot be recycled are listed on the East Renfrewshire web site and also on the Eco-Congregation noticeboard. **Please check** as there have been a few changes since the four wheelie bins collection was introduced.

N.B. Each local authority has its own system so always check the East Renfrewshire list (or your home authority if outside the E.R. boundary).

The following are a few items you may be unsure about:

Recyclable: Empty cleaner bottles including the trigger spray

Washed bleach bottles

Milk bottle tops with the rinsed milk bottle All aerosols/bottles must be empty

Non-Recyclable Shiny / metallic wrapping paper

The pump dispenser on hand-wash bottles (bottle can be recycled)

The advice is **WHEN IN DOUBT LEAVE IT OUT!**

Batteries: recycle at most supermarkets, hardware shops, library etc. **Not at church**

Spectacles recycle at church for use in Third World countries, sometimes enabling children to go to school or

adults to work.

Ink cartridges recycle at church for a charity (more information to follow).

Currently drivers are required to transport 3 passengers to church once every 5 weeks. Presently 20 drivers are on the rota, and their efforts support 12 very appreciative passengers every week. Due to the increased demand for the service, there is currently a waiting list of passengers wishing to use the service, and hence there is a need to recruit more drivers. If you could help by becoming a volunteer driver please contact Mark Allan (0141 638 3916).

In an effort to accommodate the increased number of passengers, I have been investigating the feasibility of the use of a 16 seat minibus, with electric lift, which is available for use on a Sunday morning. The main challenge is to recruit a small group of drivers who would be able and willing to drive the vehicle on a similar rota basis. For insurance purposes, it is also necessary to have a helper with each driver to assist with passenger safety. If you would be able to help, either as a minibus driver (aged under 70) or as a helper, please contact me on the number listed above or speak to me after the Sunday service.

KIRK SESSION – WHAT DO THEY TALK ABOUT?

The Kirk Session met on 3rd February with 54 members attending and they discussed a wide range of issues.

Worship: The Kirk Session noted the very successful Nine Lessons in Carols Service lead by the choir on the 15th December as well as the Family Service and Nativity the following Sunday. In addition the Christmas Eve Christingle Service, Watchnight Service and Christmas Day Service were all warmly appreciated and well supported. The Kirk Session approved the proposal that for this year all Holy Week Services will take place in Greenbank. It was also noted that a series of Sunday Night Lenten Studies focused on, "Exploring the God Question" will commence on Sunday, 1st March.

Outreach: The sale of Christmas cards to raise funds for the Lodging House Mission sold 203 packs of cards in the weeks leading up to Christmas. Greenbank will again provide a team at the Saturday opening of the Lodging House Mission on 18th April. A report was received from the Williamwood House representative noting the many and varied activities over the past few months and the improvements to the fabric of the building. Clarkston Community Choir has restarted its summer session and the summer concert takes place on the 27th May. New members welcome. A report was received from our Age Concern representative which advised that Age Concern was in a good financial position and our representative was a volunteer at one of the three lunch clubs run by Age Concern.

Finance: The Financial Position was updated and it was noted that Offering Income had decreased by 2.7% for the first three weeks of 2020. Proceeds from the fabric element of the annual reappraisal were £8,810 for 183 returns compared to last year's total of £8,067 for 166 returns. Fabric expenditure since the last report totalled £7,904 all of which related to 2019. Since the last report contributions have been received from The Guild, Friendship Café, Mother and Toddler group, Colour Circle, Sunday Club and Ladies Afternoon Badminton Club. External organisations who use our halls continue to generate useful income towards the upkeep of our halls and enquires for new lets are received regularly. The retiring collections were as follows: Erskine House £295, Missionary Fund £234 and Chas £1,321. Monies raised for the Rice challenge totalled £288 and a further £138 was raised for the Emazinyeni Primary School. In addition the Christmas Fair raised £3,258 for church funds.

Fabric: The Property Convenor advised that the annual Portable Appliance Test on electrical items had been carried out and a new boiler had been installed in the Kitchen to replace the faulty one. In addition repairs had been carried out to the external church floodlighting. The manse cooker and a carpet had been replaced and new vinyl laid.

Fellowship: The Kirk Session received a number of reports including one from the Colour Circle which enjoyed Christmas fun with the Toddlers' group. They are preparing for their annual art exhibition which is in aid of CHAS. The group is well attended and has a waiting list for new members. Reports were received from the Tuesday and Thursday evening Badminton clubs which are well attended and active in local competitions. Forthcoming events include the Greenbank Players murder mystery nights on 6th and 7th March and the Kirk Session Coffee Morning on Saturday 21st March.

Youth: The Kirk Session received 11 reports from youth organisations and noted the encouraging numbers attending most of them. Bookbug reports an average attendance of 20 adults and 30 under 5's most weeks and requires one more person to help with the tea rota. Similarly Cosy Café needs a few more volunteers. **If you can help contact the Church Office.**

Legacy: The Kirk Session received an update on the Legacy Project details of which can be found elsewhere in Good Neighbour.

Other Matters: The Kirk Session dealt with a number of administrative matters including the following:

The roll at 31st December 2019 was attested at 726 members. The Kirk Session approved a minute confirming adherence to the Safeguarding requirements of the Church of Scotland. Helen Howard was thanked by the Moderator for her service as Presbytery Elder over the past few years. Christina Bryden confirmed by Kirk Session as our Presbytery Elder for 2020/21 and John Bryden as an additional Presbytery Elder. The Kirk Session was advised that our Student Assistant Minister, Steven Owens, would be the recipient of the Fulton Bequest. The Church Transport Convenor brought to the attention of the Session that more drivers were needed and that there was a waiting list for church transport. A number of alternative options are being explored. On a similar note the Christian Aid Representative advised that there were very few volunteers willing to collect door to door in the Parish during Christian Aid Week and further options are being explored. The Session Clerk advised that in the near future, due to falling Kirk Session numbers it would not be possible to visit all Districts and outlined a number of possible solutions. The Kirk Session agreed to consider this over the coming months.

VOLUNTEER COOK REQUIRED




