Amidst this uncertain and scary time our usual pattern of Sunday worship and other gatherings has been put on hold but that does not mean that Greenbank is no longer functioning as a church. Worshipping together as a church will continue each Sunday, albeit in a different format. Details of how to participate are given on page 1. A printed copy of the service can be emailed to you on request. Although distribution might be difficult, if you can do this safely and within the limits of government guidelines, please free to share copies of the service with those unable to connect into the services each Sunday.

I have asked our elders to be in touch with everyone in their districts to check if help is needed. Please let your elder or me know if there is any way we can help at this time, even if this is simply a weekly phone call to check in. It is important that you and others know that the church is there offering hope in the face of fear. The current crisis affords each one of us an opportunity to live out our faith by actions of love and kindness to others.

There is a wider community effort being made to assist anyone who needs help at this time. We have linked in with Voluntary Actions East Renfrewshire and a local list of volunteers has been collated. We have leafleted most of the people in our Parish giving them our church contact details; telling them that they do not need to be a member of the church to contact us for help and letting them know that that even in isolation, they are not alone.

ALASDAIR GRAY

Artist, Alasdair Gray died on the 29th December last year. He studied at <u>Glasgow School of Art</u> from 1952 to 1957. As well as his book illustrations, he painted portraits and <u>murals</u>, including one at the <u>Òran Mór</u> venue and one at <u>Hillhead subway station</u>. His artwork has been widely exhibited and is in several important collections. We are lucky enough to have one of his murals at Greenbank. Alasdair painted the murals of the story of Ruth on the walls in the transept. It was painted as a memorial to the late Reverend Fulton and dedicated to him at a service on the 8th of April 1973. The mural had still not been completed by 1977 when the church approached the Glasgow School of Art to recommend someone to finish the task. In the end it was completed by a friend of a member of Session, but not until 1979, nine years after Rev. Fulton's death.



Vanilla Cupcakes

For the cupcake mixture

120g butter softened 120g caster sugar

1 egg

1 tsp vanilla extract

120g self-raising flour

For the buttercream icing

140g butter,softened 275g icing sugar 1-2 tbsp milk A few drops of food colouring (optional)

Method

1. Heat oven to 180C/160C fan/ gas 4 and line a 12-hole muffin tin with paper cases.

Cream the butter and sugar together in a bowl until pale. Beat the eggs in a separate bowl and mix into the butter mixture along with the vanilla extract.

- 2. Fold in the flour, adding a little milk until the mixture is of a dropping consistency. Spoon the mixture into the paper cases until they are three quarters full.
- 3. Bake in the oven for 10-15 minutes, or until golden-brown on top and a skewer inserted into one of the cakes comes out clean. Set aside to cool for 5-10 minutes. Then place on a wire
- 4. For the buttercream icing, beat the butter until soft. Add half the icing sugar and beat until smooth.
- 5. Add the remaining icing sugar with 1 tbsp milk, adding more milk if necessary, until the mixture is smooth and creamy. Add food colouring (optional) and mix well.
- 6. Spoon the buttercream into a piping bag and add a nozzle of your choice. Pipe in a swirl motion and then enjoy!

Pizza with Homemade Tomato Sauce

Ingredients
300g strong white bread
flour, plus extra for dusting

tsp instant yeast 1 tbsp olive oil

For the tomato sauce

1 tbsp olive oil 2 garlic cloves, crushed 200ml passata For the topping 8 mozzarella pearls, halved small bunch fresh basil



Method

- 1. Tip the flour into a bowl, then stir in the yeast and 1 tsp salt. Make a well in the centre and pour in 200ml warm water (make sure it's not too hot) along with the oil. Stir together with a wooden spoon until you have a soft, fairly wet dough.
- 2. Tip the dough out onto a lightly floured surface and knead for 5 mins until smooth. Cover with a tea towel and set aside for an hour or so or until the dough has puffed up and doubled in size. You can also leave the rough, unkneaded dough in the bowl, cover with a tea towel and leave in the fridge overnight and the dough will continue to prove on its own.
- 3. Meanwhile, make the tomato sauce. Put the oil in a small pan and fry the garlic briefly (don't let it brown), then add the passata and simmer everything until the sauce thickens a little. Leave to cool.
- 4. Once the dough has risen, knead it quickly in the bowl to knock it back, then tip out onto a lightly floured surface and cut into two balls. Roll out each ball into a large teardrop that is very thin and about 25cm across (teardrop shapes fit baking sheets more easily than rounds)
- 5. Heat oven to 240C/220C fan/ gas 9 with a large <u>baking sheet</u> inside. Lift one of the bases onto another floured baking sheet. Smooth the sauce over the base with the back of a spoon, scatter over half the mozzarella, drizzle with olive oil and season. Put the pizza, still on its baking sheet, on top of the hot sheet in the oven and bake for 8-10 mins until crisp.



Hi Folks,

Coronavirus! The thing everyone is talking about. The word that has struck more fear, terror and panic into hearts and minds than the name Voldemort did to Harry Potter fans! It has brought more financial instability than Brexit, caused the cancellation of more flights than the ash from the Eyjafjallajokull volcano and cut off more cities and countries than Troy! At Communion last month, Jeanne announced that the Church of Scotland had issued guidelines to help stop the spread of the virus. Drinking from the common cup was out as was shaking hands. That was just the start of it. Initially people, myself included, didn't take it seriously enough. Now, the Coronavirus has spread like wild fire throughout the globe. Cities are in quarantine. Borders are closed. People are being advised to work from home and if they venture out, to stay a safe distance from anyone they meet. Shops are empty and panic buying is as much of an epidemic as the virus itself. Precautions and recommendations have been made and, hopefully, if we take these we can minimise the spread of this disease.

Although statistics tell us that of those who catch the virus only 2% are likely to have serious effects, our concern is for our frail, elderly, young and those with underlying health problems, who have increased risk. Panic and a sense of inevitability are setting in. Where we once were sceptical, in fact almost blasé, reality has dawned. There seems to be no way to avoid it and it looks like safety measures are going to be with us for the foreseeable future. The clouds on the horizon are dark and not many of them have silver linings. But people are coming together, neighbours are now looking out for each other, supporting each other and a sense of community is building. Forums have started with people offering their help to others with no thought of personal gain, just with the aim of supporting those in need. Isolation is a very lonely place so the phrase "phone a friend" is now even more relevant. Keeping in touch with friends and family is even more important at this time. But the biggest part you can play is just by being particular about your own personal hygiene. It was over 75 years ago that the slogan



"coughs and sneezes spread diseases" was coined by the Ministry of Health. We constantly drum it into our kids to wash their hands. It seems a shame that all these years later we didn't learn the lesson. Sneeze into a hanky, cover your mouth when coughing and take care to wash your hands. While this may not cure the virus, it will certainly go a long way in curtailing its spread. If we show each other respect, if we are polite, courteous, and show just basic manners we can spread the love, not the virus, and the world will be a healthier and happier place in which to live.

LODGING HOUSE MISSION

On 16th March, the LHM took the sad and distressing decision to close. This was a temporary measure, and was due to several reasons relating to the impact of coronavirus: a member of staff and a volunteer had the virus or had virus symptoms; the cook was vulnerable due to recent illness and was sent home; many volunteers had called off or were asked not to come in; and there were several other issues affecting the health and safety of the remaining staff, volunteers and LHM service users.

The service users were advised of other free food facilities in Glasgow, and it is hoped that LHM will reopen again as soon as possible.

This was a really difficult decision, but the safety of the remaining staff, volunteers and service users had to be considered.

At the time of writing the Glasgow Winter Night Shelter will continue to operate until the end of March as planned.
