Dear Friends,

In last year's December Good Neighbour I wrote about a Rainbow Tree that was going to be created during Advent in our link building. The tree was made from bare branches that had fallen from larger trees in the manse garden. Everyone was invited to hang a rainbow coloured ribbon on the tree in remembrance of someone. What started out as bare branches soon became an array of coloured ribbons, each one remembering someone special.

The rainbow has become a familiar sight this year in windows across our community and it has become a symbol of hope during the coronavirus crisis. It therefore seems very appropriate that we have a Rainbow Tree again this year. Unfortunately, because of restrictions, it is not possible to put a tree inside the church building, but I thought we could use the very lovely laurel bush in the grounds of the church, beside the Jack McKinlay garden, for this purpose. In Christianity the laurel is said to symbolise the resurrection of Jesus Christ so it seems very appropriate that we use the bush for our Rainbow Tree.

In the weeks leading up to Christmas, everyone is invited to bring a rainbow coloured ribbon and tie it onto the tree to remember a loved one who has died and/or as a symbol of hope for the future. Please wear a mask and maintain a 2 metre distance from others and please feel free to invite your family, friends and neighbours to bring their own ribbon too.

In the week leading up to Christmas the Angels that people have been knitting and crocheting, during the past few weeks, will have a brief Christmas message of hope attached to them and they will be distributed around the Parish for people to find and keep. If you would like to help distribute the Angels they will be at the link building, ready to set out on their journey, on Monday 21st December from 10.30am to 12noon.

As we continue to face the realities of living with the pandemic my wish is that we will hold fast to the promise given to us, and this world, through the birth of Jesus Christ and know the hope and love of God with us, this Christmas and into 2021.

TRIBUTE TO TOM MCMEEKING

Read in Greenbank Church on 1st November 2020

Tom McMeeking, one of our elders, died on the 5th of October 2020.

Tom was born in Clydebank in1938 where his father, also Tom, worked in Singers. As a baby he and his mother, Agnes, known as Cissie, were evacuated to Portpatrick to stay with a relative. After the war the family moved to Croftfoot where Tom attended Croftfoot Primary and King's Park Secondary schools where he was a member of the football, rowing and cricket teams as well as captaining the golf team. It was at school he met his lifelong friend and future best man, Bob Crosbie. He also joined the 95th Boys' Brigade Company at Cathcart Old Parish Church.

Tom met his future wife, Joyce, at her staff dance in 1958 and they were married in Kenmuir Church, Mount Vernon, on 7th January 1963. After their marriage they set up home in Ilford where Tom had secured a job with the National Westminster Bank. It was there that Jane was born before the family moved back to Glasgow in 1967 where Shirley was born. Tom's career with the Royal Bank of Scotland followed, beginning in St Enoch Square and ending in Trongate where he was Branch Manager. After he had retired from the bank several colleagues approached Jane and Shirley and mentioned that Tom had been the best boss they had ever had.

Shortly after their return to Glasgow the family moved to Shawwood Crescent, Newton Mearns and attended Mearnskirk Parish Church where Tom was ordained as an elder in 1971. He participated fully in the life of the church as a District Elder and Bible Class teacher, putting his piano skills to good use accompanying the Bible Class's singing. On moving to Glendoune Road in 1976, Tom and Joyce transferred to Greenbank Church where Tom was admitted to the Kirk Session, became a District Elder, Assistant Treasurer and was involved in the financial side of the Centenary Celebrations in 1984 and the campaign to build the Link building. Tom was also the Kirk Session's Presbytery Elder for a time and Jeanne recalls that he had a knack of making reports of Presbytery meetings sound more interesting than they often were.

After retiring in 1991, Tom lectured briefly at Caledonian University on banking before becoming bookkeeper/finance man in his brother-in-law's building business.

Tom was the epitome of the term "family man". He adored Jane and Shirley and was delighted to welcome with great love and affection first Rolf and shortly afterwards Klaus, into the family. When both couples started married life in Germany, Tom and Joyce continued to be supportive from a distance but were overjoyed when the Mayer's and Billes's decided to return to Scotland. For Jane, Shirley, Klaus and Rolf, Tom always offered a listening ear. He adored his seven grandchildren who all have their own fond and collective memories of him and of the many happy holidays on Bute. He was a generous and supportive Grandpa who was very proud of all their achievements.

When Joyce died four years ago the family were concerned that Tom would give up. However he managed to find meaning in life and was great fun to be around, participating in the Colour Circle in Greenbank and attending several other church groups for coffee and friendship.

Tom lived life in a spirit of generosity and kindness. He was a gentle man and a gentleman who was prepared to give people the benefit of the doubt and was content with what life afforded him. Today we give thanks to God for the life and service of Tom McMeeking and commend Jane, Shirley and the wider family to the love and care of our Lord Jesus Christ.

THANK YOU FROM... The Lodging House Mission

A note of appreciation was presented to Greenbank from the Lodging House Mission for Harvest donations of £350 and for the faithful support of their work.

KIRK SESSION – WHAT DO THEY TALK ABOUT?

The Kirk Session held a virtual on line Zoom meeting on 2nd November with 55 members attending and they received updates on a range of issues.

Worship: The Session noted that Zoom services were continuing each Sunday alongside Sunday morning worship in the church. An appeal was made for volunteers to help with the zoom camera operation in the church and to assist in checking the sound quality in their home on a Sunday morning. A Reflection Service at 7pm each Thursday on Zoom had started and had been well attended.

Attention was again drawn to the Saturday Morning Breakfast Book Club which meets on the first Saturday of each month – see elsewhere in Good Neighbour for the Zoom Link. Messy church had a small but successful Zoom meeting in September and another was planned for Friday 27th November with a Christmas theme.

Outreach: The Glasgow North East Foodbank has resumed normal opening times and there have been continuous food donations and sufficient volunteers to handle them. The Lodging House Mission remains closed but work is continuing with volunteers and other agencies to provide food and toiletries to those in need who have been housed in temporary accommodation. Thanks were expressed for those who donated to the Harvest Appeal. Sample Christmas Cards in aid of the Lodging House Mission are on display in the Fraser hall window next to the link building and can be ordered online.

Finance: The financial position was updated and it was noted that Offering Income had decreased by 4% for the period to 18^{th} October. Due to the high proportion of offerings made by standing order the impact of the coronavirus had been mitigated affecting only weekly freewill and ordinary offering income. Fabric expenditure for the year to date totalled £4,795 and Legacy Group expenditure for the current year was £25,980. Since the last report there have been contributions from 1^{st} Clarkston Brownies of £500 and Clarkston After School Care have contributed £2,275. Lodging House Mission collection amounted to £230 but this excluded donations by members who gave directly online. Lorna Preece's fundraising activities for church funds had also raised £114 to date.

The Treasurer presented the Budget for 2020/21, which was prepared on two different scenarios, a) the Kirk Session and Congregation approved the Legacy Project and b) the Legacy Project was not approved. The Kirk Session approved the Budget.

Fabric: The Property Convenor advised that new taps had been installed in the hall toilets along with some essential plumbing work. The underground drainage work at the manse had been carried out but despite this water continued to seep onto the church path and investigation work was continuing. Some of the LED lights in the floodlights had been replaced so they could be lit up in red for Remembrance Sunday as promoted by Poppy Scotland and work was in hand to repair the floodlights at the rear. The joists supporting the floor, which hold the bell in the church tower, were worn at the edges into the stonework and immediate action had been recommended to support them. An estimate had been obtained for under £500 and the Kirk Session approved this work. The convenor thanked Alex Howie and Bob Bulloch who had painted the railings outside the front of the Church.

Fellowship: The Fellowship Coordinator encouraged Elders to identify district members who would benefit from a Befriender's visit. The Burns Supper would not be taking place in the Church Hall in January but no decision had yet been taken on whether a virtual event could take place. The Guild continue to keep in touch by phone and a group of 24 Greenbankers are involved in East Renfrewshire's exercise initiative – Beat The Street.

Youth: Sunday Club and Jam continue to meet online each week. 1st Clarkston Brownies has been meeting on Zoom & 3rd A Clarkston Brownies and Guides have been meeting outdoors. The Session was advised the Co-op community initiative had raised nearly £1,000 for SNAP Youth Club.

Church Reopening: The Session Clerk reported that the Church Officer had resumed part time working and the Link Building was now open 9am-1pm, Monday to Friday for deliveries and collections. The Reopening Committee had met in late September and unanimously decided to keep the halls closed at this time and review the position at the end of November although it was unlikely any change in the position would be made before January at the earliest. Organisations had been advised of this in early October. The only exception was for Clarkston After School Care, which was permitted to continue.

Legacy: The Kirk Session received an update on the Legacy Project, details of which are elsewhere in Good Neighbour.

Christmas Services: The Moderator advised that she proposed to have a Christmas Eve Zoom Watchnight Message from the church with no congregation present and a Christmas Day Service at 10.30am with a congregation present and on Zoom. The Moderator also reported that Christmas angels were currently being knitted by various people connected to Greenbank. Each awill bear a Christmas message. The idea will be to leave them in various places in the community for people to find in the week leading up to Christmas.

Other Matters: The Kirk Session dealt with a number of administrative matters including the following:

The Gift service will take place on 6th December and arrangements for leaving gifts in the link building were advised. It was confirmed that the Sunday Morning Duty Rota would continue in the present format into 2021 and an appeal was made for younger volunteers. Thanks were expressed to existing volunteers.

After two years of no price increases, Life and Work will increase by 20p per issue to £3 per issue. 
Sunday collections continue outside the Link building of Greenbank every Sunday between 12noon and 1pm.




YOUNG PEOPLE'S PAGE



THINGS TO MAKE AND DO THIS ADVENT

MULLED WINE

It is customary at the Watchnight Service to enjoy a mince pie and some mulled wine in the church halls. As this year it will not possible, here is the recipe for mulled wine that we usually use. Adjust the amounts for smaller quantities, obviously and don't forget the mince pie!

100g caster sugar

1 cinnamon stick

4 cloves

1 nutmeg

Thinly sliced oranges

2 bottles red wine

1 pint of water

Boil the water with the sugar and spices for five minutes.

Add the sliced orange and leave for 15 minutes.

Stir in the wine and heat slowly without boiling.

Serve very hot.

(If you want use ready-made mulled wine, it can be improved by the addition of a little sugar, sliced orange and a cinnamon stick.)

CHRISTMAS TREE DECORATIONS

What you'll need:

- 1.) Paper plates
- 2.) Green paint,
- 3.) Pom poms, stars, glitter for decoration
- 4.) Scissors
- 5.) Glue
- 6.) Cardboard strip

Cut paper plates into 3 different sized slices. Paint them green.

Stick them onto the card board strip, starting with the biggest at the bottom and

overlapping them with the smallest at the top. Decorate them with pom poms, glitter and top it off with a star.

You can then thread them and hang them on your tree or stick them onto card and write your Christmas message.

ULTIMATE EASY GINGERBREAD

Prep: 20 minutes Cook:15 minutes plus 1 hour chilling

Ingredients

100g salted butter3 tbsp golden syrup100g dark muscovado sugar½ tsp bicarbonate of soda1 tbsp ground ginger1 tsp ground cinnamon

225g plain flour 50g icing sugar

Method:

- 1.) Heat the butter, syrup and sugar in a small pan until melted, stirring occasionally. Leave to cool.
- 2.) Mix the bicarb, ginger, cinnamon and flour in a bowl. Pour in the buttery syrup mixture and stir to form a dough.
- 3.) Put the dough on a sheet of baking parchment, and roll the dough out to ½cm. Place another sheet on top. Put on a baking tray to keep it flat and chill in the fridge for 1 hour.
- 4.) Heat the oven to 190C/170C fan/gas 5. Line a large baking tray with more baking parchment. Remove the dough from the fridge and cut out shapes using a cookie cutter.
 - We made some with smaller stars cut out of the centre to thread ribbon through and hang from a Christmas
- 5.) Place the shapes, spread apart, on the lined baking sheet, and bake for 10-12 minutes. Leave to cool completely on the baking sheet.
- 6.) Mix the icing sugar with 1-2 tbsp water not too thin or it will run. Decorate the cooled biscuits with the icing using a piping bag with a thin nozzle.

BUSHIDO

Our students are continuing to keep up their training via Zoom and are progressing at a great rate. Our Club is part of one of the largest Associations in Scotland - Bushido Karate Association which is part of the Scottish Governing Body which is a member of the World Karate Federation so we are in good hands as regards direction during the pandemic.

If you have heard our classes on a Saturday morning you may have heard many Kiai.

Kiai (気合?) (pronounced key-eye) is a Japanese term used in in Martial Arts which basically means "concentrated spirit".

A karate master can take out an opponent with their kiai alone (or so the teachings say). Knowing when to use a kiai, and how to properly execute and apply it are just as important as knowing the proper way to kick or punch. It is a technique just the same as a kick or punch, but just not as physical.

A kiai is done by quickly exhaling, and at the same time making a one-syllable sound. "I", "HI" and "EE" would be good sounds to use for a kiai.

The noise from a kiai involves the abdominal muscles and diaphragm and should not be sounded merely from the throat.

When done properly, the kiai does three things:

- 1. It empties air from the lungs.
- 2. It should startle your opponent.
- 3. Prime yourself for combat. It should "psych" you up.

Finally, Bushido Karate Club would like to wish all our friends at Greenbank Church a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year and we look forward to meeting up again.
