Dear Friends,

Of all the months of the year November is the one that seems to contain most acts of remembrance. For the church remembrance has a special place in life and worship. Thus it is very fitting, that this month will begin with us gathering together in church and at home on the 1st of November to remember Jesus words, 'Do this in remembrance of me' – words which remind us that our faith is rooted in the history of what God has done for us and this world through the life, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. The 1st of November is also All Saints day - a day when the church traditionally remembers all those who have kept faith alive and active down through the ages as they followed Jesus Christ.

A few days later, it will be fireworks night, which isn't a Christian festival, but a reminder of an unsuccessful plot against Parliament that reflected the religious conflicts of the time. Afterwards people lit bonfires around London to celebrate the survival of King James I and so the 5th November Act was later created as an annual day of remembrance and thanksgiving.

On the 11th November men, women and children who made sacrifices for freedom will be remembered all over our country, not as statistics, but as people who were just like us with the same hopes, dreams, and fears. This year our Remembrance Sunday service on the 8th November will be different from what we are used to, as the enormity of the COVID19 pandemic remains with us and we abide by government regulations, but whether we come to church or stay at home, we will still remember, give thanks and reflect on how we might build a peaceful and hopeful future in honour of the past.

The final day of the month is St Andrew's Day, Scotland's official national day and since 2006 an official bank holiday. According to John's Gospel, when he met Jesus, Andrew immediately went to his brother Simon Peter and told him "We have found the Messiah, the Christ". Andrew then took his brother to meet Jesus. The rest, as they say, is history!

Of course, this month of remembering is not about encouraging us to live in the past but a way of helping us to be mindful of history so we might learn from the love sacrifice and faith of those who have gone before us and find ways to follow their example and introduce others to Jesus Christ. So may we all remember, remember, in this November and to paraphrase the words of Andrew Scobie's well-known hymn – "May we look forward in faith, knowing God gives us life each day. Go onward with Christ, believing his Spirit guides our way."

News and Updates

ED LINES

Hi Folks,

This year marked the 75th Anniversary of V.E. Day on the 8th of May and V.J. day on the 15th of August, seventy-five years after the country first came together to celebrate the end of war. It was a celebration that was tinged with sadness at the many lives, on all sides, that were needlessly lost. We also celebrated, with pride, the actions and deeds of the many brave men and woman who fought for, worked for, and supported their country and its citizens, above and beyond the call of duty. Seventy five years on, two of our war time heroes have again come to the fore.

Captain Thomas Moore, popularly known as "Captain Tom", a former British Army officer, raised money for charities by doing a sponsored walk after a hip operation. He completed his walk just before his 100th birthday and then kept on going, raising over £32m for NHS charities. He was knighted for his efforts.

Dame Vera Lynn was the Forces' Sweetheart whose songs helped raise morale in World War II. The singer was best known for performing hits such as "White Cliffs of Dover" to troops on the front line in countries including India and Egypt. This year, on the anniversary of V.E day, her song "We'll Meet Again" rang out in the streets. It was particularly poignant as the whole country was in the middle of lockdown. Once again Dame Vera raised morale and gave us hope.

These two heroes fought for us and thought, of us 75 years ago. These two heroes continue to fight and continue to think of us today; two of many. Today we are embroiled in our own fight: a fight against poverty and cruelty, a fight against illness and disease. We owe it to the heroes of the past, who performed heroic acts and deeds, with no thought of themselves, to continue the fight to become the heroes of the future. We need to fight for and support one another through our present trials and tribulations. We won't forget what they have done for us. We should remember them with respect and gratitude. We should look to them for inspiration. We should never forget their bravery and tenacity. We should never forget.

St ANDREWS DAY

The 30th of November is St Andrew's Day. St Andrew, the patron saint of Scotland .He is also the patron saint of Romania, Greece, Russia, Ukraine and Poland.

Patron saints are chosen to be special protectors or guardians over things. Busy man!!!

NOVEMBER

November is the 11th month of the year but the name comes from the Roman word Novum which means 9. On the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month we have Remembrance Day. People hold a two minutes silence to remember all the men and woman who fought for their country throughout history. We wear a Poppy as a symbol of remembrance, because they brought life, hope, colour and reassurance to those still fighting.

HOW TO MAKE A POPPY

- 1. Take 12 sheets of 15cm X 15cm squares of red tissue paper Lay them evenly on top of each other and fold them up with a zig-zag fold.
- 2. Take a green pipe cleaner and wrap it twice around the middle of the zig-zag folded tissue paper. Twist the pipe cleaner to secure it to the tissue paper.
- 3. On each side of the zig-zag folded tissue paper, peel upwards each layer of tissue paper to form each petal. Once you have peeled upwards each layer it will form a flower.
 - Using your fingers to move the tissue paper petals make a space in the middle of the flower where you can stick down a large black pom-pom using super tacky glue. Leave to dry.



- 4. Attach another pipe cleaner to the bottom of the first pipe cleaner wrapped around the tissue paper to make a long stem. Wrap another pipe cleaner around this one to make it nice and sturdy.
- 5. Repeat steps 1-6 to make a row of poppies.

- You'll notice more signs and 2 metre markers to remind players to keep their distance. We ask that you wait patiently for your turn at the Beat Box and give players space if there are others waiting for their turn at the Box.
- Do not share or touch each other's cards or fobs.


SUNDAY CLUB EXTRA

GREENBANK TALES FROM THE PAST

223's 1954 CAMP

Picture this. It is July 1954 and we are on a night train, from Glasgow to London. This is the 223rd BB (5 Officers and 36 boys) at the start of their journey to Jersey for their summer camp. I remember this because I was one of these boys. The train continued through the night and, while passing through Watford, its sleepy passengers were awakened by a Reveille call. Yes, the 223rd had a bugle band in these days too! Once off the train and after some breakfast, there was an exhausting day seeing some of London's sites, and this was followed by an even more exhausting night travelling first to Southampton by train, and then a seven hour journey by the steamer "Isle of Jersey" to the island's main port St Hellier.

Our accommodation was a Community Hall in the quaint little town of Gorey, close to its castle and harbour. Here, we settled into a daily routine, which included self-catering, cleaning, exploring the area, sea-bathing, fishing and sightseeing. The officers and boys were divided into squads, and each squad took it in daily turns to remain in camp as "orderlies". We awoke in the morning to the sound of the duty bugler playing "Reveille", mealtimes were signified by the same bugler and his rendering of "Come to the cookhouse door" and at bedtime the "Last Post" was sounded. This camp was for me a unique and enriching experience, which opened my eyes to many aspects of life that were new to me. For example, I will never forget the Community Hall keeper's many stories of the occupation of Jersey by the German forces during World War 2, and his demonstration of a small crystal radio set, which he used to keep himself informed of the Allied Forces progress through the BBC World Service.

EMERALD ANNIVERSARY


