Dear Friends,

In past years we would have gathered together for Holy Week and Easter day services in the church. As this is not entirely possible, our services in the next few weeks will be a combination of Zoom and physical services in the church. I am delighted to say that the young people of JAM will be leading Wednesday's Holy Week service and on Maundy Thursday everyone is invited to come together, virtually in the church, and on Zoom from home, to remember the events of the upper room on the night before Jesus died. Those who join from home are asked to bring their own bread and wine for Maundy Thursday communion. Clarkston Churches Together has prepared a walk which can take place at any time during Good Friday. A small act of worship will be posted at each churches site. Our Easter Sunday service will take the form of a combined physical and online service. Further details of all these acts of worship are contained elsewhere in Good Neighbour.

The story of Easter morning as told by John's gospel tells of the darkness that remained as resurrection began. John's Easter story begins with the words, 'Early on the first day of the week, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene came to the tomb and saw that the stone had been removed.' The mention of darkness is a part of John's approach to show that the Resurrection took place in the darkness that lingered before the morning. God didn't wait for the sun to rise to bring hope. God didn't wait for the grief to pass before bringing new life. God's resurrection power was at work even when it couldn't yet be seen.

Our Holy week and Easter commemorations come at the end of what has been a very tough year for many people. Although the vaccine programme brings hope for the future, there are still hard times to come as people face the effects of a Pandemic that has wreaked havoc throughout the world. Amidst this, may we discover the strength and the hope to believe that God still accompanies us through the darkness of these days; that faith is still possible; that understanding will come and that the voice of our risen Lord still keeps calling out to each one of us by name. Let us trust that nothing will ever separate us from the God who continues to reveal through the life, death and resurrection of His Son, an everlasting love for us and this world. So may we continue to walk together living and loving into the sure and certain hope that Christ is Risen. He is Risen indeed!

ASCENSION DAY TO PENTECOST SUNDAY: THURSDAY 13 MAY - SUNDAY 23 MAY

So much of how we went about 'doing Church' has been denied us throughout the course of the pandemic, and who knows if perhaps some of our tried and tested practices may be lost to us forever. The upside is that we've been forced back into that which cannot be restricted, curtailed or locked down; the timeless disciplines of our faith, which remain available to us throughout every circumstance, the life of prayer and the contemplation of Scripture.

I believe that Thy Kingdom Come works because it is established on the twin pillars of prayer and Scripture. Now approaching its sixth season, it has become a genuinely significant part of the global and ecumenical calendar with Christians from across the wonderful diversity of the Church Universal coming together to pray. Running from Ascension Day to Pentecost Sunday, Thursday 13 to Sunday 23 May, it will unite people from over 170 countries and given what we have all been through, that coming together will never been more important: https://www.thykingdomcome.global/

Having engaged in Thy Kingdom Come since its inception, I would personally be thrilled to see individuals and congregations from across the Church of Scotland getting thoroughly involved this time around. It's about praying for our churches, our communities and our countries. It calls on us to pray for those who as yet know little or nothing of Christ and so is decidedly evangelistic in tone as well as ecumenical.

Sometime in the summer last year, when it appeared that the virus was on the retreat, people began to use the phrase 'build back better'. Little did we know then that the second wave would be equally as devastating as the first. However, by May 2021 the roll-out of the various vaccines should be well under way such that many of us, and certainly the most vulnerable among us, will be feeling much safer.

Building back better might well be what we're thinking about in May, and with the culmination of Thy Kingdom Come 2021 on Pentecost Sunday coinciding with our own General Assembly, I can think of nothing better than that we give ourselves to adoration, confession, thanksgiving and supplication.



LEGACY FUND - CONGREGATIONAL PLEDGES



Thank you to all those who have managed to contribute so far towards our Legacy Fund.

In the last month, thirteen more members have pledged, bringing the total to £245,975 from 251 members as at 10th

March. At present our congregational roll totals 696 members.

We are nearly half way to our target of £500,000.

LEGACY UPDATE

The pace of work on our Legacy Project has picked up quite a bit over the past few months as we head towards submitting our planning application. This update keeps you posted on where we are.

A series of meetings are taking place with the architect, as the plans are refined. The Legacy Project Group, supplemented by a group of people from different aspects of Greenbank's many activities, are offering their practical views and suggestions. We want to do everything we can to ensure that we end up with facilities that work well for us. Further meetings will take place before plans are finalised and cost estimates updated.

We have been in discussion with East Renfrewshire's Planning department over the past few months and anticipate submitting our planning application by the beginning of May. By the time you read this, the Care Home developer will have submitted their application. Our respective design teams are working together to integrate the proposed landscaping, the way the boundary between our site and the care home would be defined and any access arrangements between the two sites.

Earlier in March we delivered a letter and a leaflet to over one hundred of our neighbours to let them know what was being planned. As a "good neighbour' we wanted them to hear from us direct about the plans we have and to invite them to be in touch to ask any questions about the work. Around the same time we also attended a meeting of the Community Council, together with the care home developer, to outline the nature of the development and answer questions. It was a good opportunity to underline the community benefits we see emerging from the finished work. On the one hand, the funds from the sale price allow us to ensure that we are sustainable as a church well into the future and on the other hand the care home will provide a much needed facility for local residents. This unique and mutually beneficial relationship between a church and a care home provider was readily seen by those at the meeting. It was certainly very positively received a few days later when we met with our MSP and a councillor for our Ward both of whom expressed some enthusiasm for the development and offered whatever help they could.

We have started to alert organisations to the need to clear the halls of any equipment or material they store there by the end of May. This is of course subject to the current Covid restrictions allowing folk to enter the premises. Anyone who has any personal possessions in the sanctuary would also want to retrieve them when allowed to do so. We are currently exploring various options for alternative accommodation during the construction period.

LODGING HOUSE MISSION

Tribute to Stephen Mitchell



Stephen Mitchell was the manager at Lodging House Mission. In mid-January, Stephen contracted covid-19, and sadly passed away on 7 February, aged 60.

For over thirty years, Stephen worked tirelessly to help those most in need, firstly through his work at the Wayside Day Centre (later known as The Marie Trust) and then at the Lodging House Mission, where he became manager in 2018.

Through his work, he created a caring environment for the city's homeless men and women, helping them with everything from welfare benefits to food and emotional support. He was known to go above and beyond to make anyone with whom he came into to contact feel welcome.

Stephen's private funeral service took place on 17 February. Those who knew him paid their respects by observing a 2 minute silence at 12 noon that day. LHM hopes to hold a memorial service for him when circumstances permit.

He is remembered as a caring gentleman with a very strong faith, and is survived by his wife Eileen and four children.

Hi Guys,

Twinkle, twinkle little star, how I wonder what you are.

The 5th of April is Dark Sky week. Dark Sky Week was started so people could see the night sky and all the stars without the effects of light pollution. Light pollution is artificial light, which brightens the sky and makes it difficult to see the stars. Stars come in groups called constellations. They can make a shape of an animal, or an object. The Great Bear, Orion or The Plough are the easiest to spot. However, you can't always see all the stars. It often depends on the time of year or where you live. If you live in Australia you see different stars than if you stay in Scotland. There are about 9,000 stars in the sky at night, though you'll only be able to see half of them as the other half are at the other side of the world. The Sun is our closest star at a mere 100 million miles away. The next closest star, Proxoma Centauri, is 4.24 light-years away, a light-year being 5.88 trillion miles! Every star you see in the night sky is bigger and brighter than the sun and are different colours depending on their temperature.



The hottest stars are blue, followed by white, yellow, orange, red, and the coolest stars are brown. Oh and Stars don't twinkle. They seem to twinkle, but most of the stars shine with a steady light. The movement of air gets slightly bent as it travels from a distant star through the atmosphere down to us on the ground. This makes the star seem to twinkle. So next time you sing *Twinkle, Twinkle Little Star*, you'll know what they are. See you next month.

Heartfelt Thanks from the Lodging House Mission

I am writing to acknowlege and thank you and the congregation of Greenbank Parish Church for your generous monthly donation of foodstuffs delivered on 17th and 27th February to assist us in our work with homeless, vulnerable and socially excluded persons at the Lodging House Mission here in Glasgow. We appreciate your patience and apologise to Diane in particular for the inconvenience that our temporary closue caused at the end of January.

Following temporary closure due to the untimely death of our manager Stephen (who had faithfully served the homeless community across Glasgow for over thirty years). LHM resumed its limited services on 15th February.

In line with 2021 Government 'stay at home' guidance, our day centre remains closed to the public, in order to prevent social gathering. Our volunteers will remain at home during this time. A limited number of our staff team have worked hard to continue to meet our mission commitments and support those who are experiencing homelessness, who may be vulnerable or are experiencing isolation at this time. Through loocal and National Government temporary accommodation is available during this 'stay at home' order for all who require it.

We will continue the work Stephen has sustained throughout the pandemic making available emergency food parcels, essential toiletries packs and supply emergency clothing through our partner agencies, to assist those living in hostels, hotels and Bed and Breakfast accommodation in the city. We will continue to supply lunch and other provisions as required to the Glasgow Overnight Welcome Centre and our Chaplainacy phone line (07864 705 668) remains available for support, prayer and bereavment conversations.

We know none of this would be possible if it were not for the support and prayers of congregations such as yourselves, so please accept our heartfelt thanks. May God Bless you as you have blessed the least of these brothers and sisters of Christ. (Matthew 25: 40)
