

#### LIVE STREAMING OF WORSHIP

The technical equipment in the Church Sanctuary has been changed to allow streaming via You Tube on Sunday Mornings in place of Zoom.

Anyone wishing to view the service should click on the link which is emailed to the congregation each week from the church office. The service can also be found by searching on You Tube. Once in 'You Tube' simply type in 'Greenbank Church Morning Service' and select the correct service.

Please note that with live streaming there is about a minutes delay before the service is transmitted from the church to people at home. Please be patient if it is a little later than 10.30am before the service starts.

Those attending worship in the Church Sanctuary on Sundays are also asked to note that services are being streamed. The camera being used to transmit images is downstairs, just in front of the balcony area. The cameras will film the pews directly in front of it, the side pews at the front and the chancel area of the church. Members of the congregation who do not wish to be 'caught on camera' are asked to select their seats appropriately.

Dear Friends.

I will never forget trying to get our Zoom Watchnight Service to work last Christmas Eve when technology failed in the church. I ended up running back to the Manse just before midnight to lead the service from there. Last year we celebrated a Christmas unfamiliar to us, as we, mostly through the courtesy of Zoom, worshipped together and were unable to meet personally with family and friends. Thankfully this Christmas, it seems like the easing of restrictions and the successful vaccine programme are going to make it possible for us to meet together once again.

In the last few weeks, It has been wonderful to see so many of you return to worship in the church on Sunday mornings and I hope that you, and many more, will feel able to come along to the worship services that are planned for these Christmas weeks.

Beginning on Wednesday 1st December, and on each subsequent Wednesday evening, Zoom Sundown Services, lasting about 10-15 minutes, will take us through a series of reflection on the season of Advent. The first Sunday worship service in December will be our Christmas Gift service on the 5th of December. Afterwards the gifts that everyone brings will be given to Church House, Sacro, and to the neonatal maturity unit at the Queen Elizabeth University Hospital so they receive them in time for Christmas.

At a time of year that may take its toll on lives in ways that are difficult for many, and most particularly for those grieving the loss of loved ones, we will also set aside 'Time to Remember' on the evening of 5th December at 6.30pm. This act of worship will offer a way to bring losses and sorrows before God and offer support to one another in the days leading up to Christmas.

The following Sunday, during morning worship, the church choir will present the Lessons and Carols Service on 12<sup>th</sup> December and the young people of the Sunday Club and JAM will present the Nativity on 19<sup>th</sup> December. Staying with the Nativity theme, and restrictions permitting, characters from the Nativity story—shepherds, sheep, cows, angels, Mary and Joseph, wise men [or women!] whatever you can think of — are warmly invited to the Children's Christmas Eve Service with Christingles at 6.30pm. There will also be a Watchnight Service at 11.30pm and a Christmas Day Service at 10.30am in the church. As Christmas Day falls on a Saturday this year, our Boxing Day worship at 10.30am will take the form of a favourite Christmas Carol service. So, if there is any carol you wish to sing, or listen to, please let Peter know so that he can include it in the service!

Christmas will still feel different for many this year, but as some of the familiar ways of worshipping are reintroduced maybe the message of love, that lies at the heart of all we do and say as a church, will stand out even more clearly and remind us of the hope contained in the simple story of a baby's birth in a draughty stable 2000 years ago. The cold and the darkness endured by so many people in the last 20 months underlines the importance of knowing and sharing the hope and love of God.

However, you choose to worship this month may you gladly embrace this hope and love offered to you in the babe of Bethlehem and share it generously and faithfully with those around you this Christmas and always.

#### TRIBUTE TO CHRIS ADAM

[Read in church on Sunday, 7<sup>th</sup> November]

It was with a sense of deep shock that we learned of the sudden death of one of our elders, Chris Adam, on 23rd August 2021 at the age of 67.

Christopher Henry Adam was born in Johnstone on the 8<sup>th</sup> September 1953, and spent his childhood years living at 8 Moray Gardens, Clarkston with his parents Nora and David, and his younger sister, Fiona.

Chris was educated at Netherlee Primary School, where he first met his lifelong friend, David Hunter. Chris continued his education at Williamwood High School, and completed it at the University of Strathclyde, where he graduated as a Civil Engineer.

After graduation, Chris joined Fugro in 1975, and spent three years there. He rejoined in 1979 and worked there until 2001. Thereafter he joined Jacobs (formerly Baptie) until his retirement in 2015. In his professional life he was author or co-author of 4 publications, and he was a Member of the Institution of Civil Engineers; a Chartered Engineer; a Member of the British Geotechnical Society; and Chairman of the Scottish Geotechnical group.

Chris's sporting passions were football, hillwalking, cycling and skiing, and it was at Bearsden Ski Club that he first met his wife, Diane, in 1980. Romance blossomed and Chris and Diane were married in Soulos Wester Church, just outside Crieff, in 1981. They were happily married for 40 years.

They set up home in Burnside, where their first son Jonathan was born and after moving to Carmunnock their family was completed with the arrival of twins, Graeme and Andrew. It is fair to say that Chris felt daunted by the arrival of twins, but he was the most wonderful Dad to his three sons, ably and happily supporting them into adulthood. The family later moved to their present home in Newton Mearns, a very loving home where many happy memories were made.

Chris's involvement with Greenbank Parish Church began when he was baptised there shortly after he was born. He attended Sunday School, and had a long history of service with the 223<sup>rd</sup> Boys' Brigade Company. He was a member of Company section staff and chairman of the Ex-members association of the 223<sup>rd</sup> BB Company until his death.

Chris was ordained as an elder in Greenbank in 2010, and faithfully visited the members in his district in Eaglesham. He actively contributed to all of the work of the Kirk Session. He was a duty team leader; a very accomplished member of the choir; a volunteer for the youth club and driver for the church transport service. He used his love of cycling to support the Lodging House Mission by participating in the sponsored cycle and he regularly read the lesson at Sunday worship. For the past few years, and since its inception, Chris was an enthusiastic member of the Legacy Group where he made invaluable contributions in applying for funding and formulating communication strategies, amongst many other things.

A sociable and hospitable man, Chris enjoyed entertaining in his home, where his love of music played a big part. The sound quality of the music was very important to Chris, and he enjoyed listening to his varied collection of vinyl through his Linn speaker system.

Chris travelled extensively for business and for pleasure, and in the workplace he was renowned for his encyclopaedic knowledge of ground conditions in Glasgow. His best travelling was done with family, and many happy holidays were spent in the sun in The Algarve, or skiing in The Rockies, Austria, the Cairngorms and the Alps. A memorable holiday for the family was to South Africa to mark the occasion of Chris and Diane's 30<sup>th</sup> wedding anniversary. They made happy memories there, with a safari and a hike or cable car ride up Table Mountain.

A keen cyclist, Chris enjoyed regular cycling outings with his 'cycling gang'. Originating in a spin class, this group had grown in number from 4 to 20, and many happy trips were made together, particularly in the last 18 months.

Chris Adam was many things to many people. He was a loving husband to Diane and devoted Dad to his three sons. He was a caring son to his parents, and a proud uncle to his niece and nephew. He was held in high esteem by those he worked with and loved and respected by those who knew him as a friend.

Chris was a quiet, unassuming, caring, humble man whose strong faith and sense of 'doing the right thing' were an inspiration to many, and as a church we are indebted to Chris for the many ways in which he served here.

We will hold Chris in our hearts forever, and he will not be forgotten. Today we give thanks for the life and service of Chris Adam, and we commend Diane, Jonathan, Graeme, Andrew, and the wider family to the love of our Lord Jesus Christ.

I found another recipe recently. A recipe that doesn't cost a fortune and one we don't have to keep for special occasions but can make every day of the year:

The Recipe for Happiness 2 cups of patience 1 heart, full of love 2 handfuls of generosity Plenty of faith 1 handful of understanding Dash of laughter Generous sprinkle of kindness

Combine patience, love and generosity with understanding. Add a dash of laughter and sprinkle generously with kindness. Add plenty of faith and mix well. Spread over a period of a lifetime and serve everyone you meet.



#### **COP 26 REPORT**

I want to thank Rev. Jeanne and the church for allowing me the time away from my normal duties at the church over the two week period of the recent COP 26 events in the city in order to represent my PC (USA) Presbyterians for Earth Care group as the head of our three person delegation. This was particularly important since our denomination determined that none of the paid staff would be granted permission to travel to Glasgow for the event due to the carbon footprint entailed in such air travel as well as the issues around access of delegations from poor countries due to the Covid




pandemic. So I would like to take this opportunity to share some of my learnings, experience and reflections:

The report of the U.N. scientific panel released in August of this year was compiled by 234 authors from 65 countries. The top scientist giving the report pulled no punches as he and others laid bare the realities they have been carefully researching for many years. There is no way back from some of the changes that have been made to the biosphere since basically the 1970s but more broadly over the last 100 years. These changes are more dramatic than any in thousands of years; unprecedented in hundreds of thousands of years.

And they are unequivocal: Humans are the main cause if these changes.

In spite of this scientific consensus, my general reaction to the final pact as agreed to by the 196 gathered nations is cautiously hopeful even though it isn't the bold document we in the religious sector were hoping for. It was clear in the end, that the only holdouts were China and India (and maybe Iran and Saudi Arabia). Granted, these include two of the largest emitters of greenhouse gasses, but they still went along, (albeit with reservations and modifications) to the final wording on the commitment to "phase down, use of unabated coal and to eliminate inefficient fossil fuel subsidies" as well as so many other elements which we in the ecumenical Christian sector, as well as others, had advocated.

As the U.S. special envoy on climate change, John Kerry put it, "Mother Nature does not differentiate as to where the CO2 originates." We had over 30



populace to an increasing willingness to accept the changes in lifestyle and energy production necessary to reduce our emissions and slow (and even reverse) climate change. Once the populations are convinced, and consumer habits begin to shift, the businesses and politicians will follow.

Perhaps the most hopeful signal about the future possibilities for progress was the pact announced by the U.S. and China during the second week of the COP 26 and the information that over 38 Trillion USD of investments have been pulled out of fossil fuels since 2009 making it more and more difficult for that industry to receive financing for new projects.

In addition, the Glasgow pact established the topic of "loss and damage" as a legitimate and separate category for funding. This is especially important for the small island nations and coastal communities where there is a proven direct link between the build-up of greenhouse gasses (from industrialised nations) and the destructiveness of storms. 50% of greenhouse gasses are produced by 1% of the wealthiest nations while the poorest and most vulnerable countries produce only 6%. The recognition of this historic debt resulted in a level of solidarity heretofore unseen amongst the wealthy and poor nations, resulting in this section of the pact. Although the religious community had hoped for more specifics around mechanisms for distributing funds to address the loss and damage cited, there will at least be a dialogue this may result in these specifics in the coming COP27 and beyond.

At the moment, there are specifics around the funding of what is called the Santiago Network that will provide these vulnerable nations with funding and expertise for documentation around all aspects of mitigation, adaptation and loss

My most memorable experience was perhaps the Climate Action march on November 7<sup>th</sup> where over 100,000 people from various segments of British society and the global representation to the COP26 from over 200 nations, joined together, despite the nastiest

weather of the two week event after standing in the rain and cold for over an hour, for a three mile demonstration of our insistence that the politicians make the decisions that will save us from catastrophic climate change. Amidst this group were representatives of the various faith traditions and a quite significant ecumenical delegation numbering in the hundreds. One moment in particular stands out, as the *Laudato Si* group (the catholic contingent promoting Pope Francis' document about our call to care for "our common home") were singing chants from Taize, another group was singing the famous Holly Near protest song "Singing for our lives" with the opening line: "we are a gentle, angry people . . ." and a third group chanting "What do we want? Climate Justice! When do we want it? Now!" Then, there was the rainbow that appeared above a green field just as we were leaving the park where the march had begun.

I am aware that "climate anxiety" is a very real thing. Many in our church and community are grappling with grief, loss, guilt and a desire to take concerted action around this issue. I am

hopeful that in the coming weeks we will be able to convene a "climate café" to discuss your concerns and hopes and perhaps find ways to work and serve together and to treat this climate crisis with the urgency it deserves.

In a separate event, held in the US at the New York Avenue Presbyterian Church in NYC, the Texas climate scientist and Christian, Dr Katharine Hoyhoe, addressed the gathered group and spoke about something she refers to as a "shadow" of guilt, fear and isolation that impedes effective action. Speaking to the question of what is the most important thing we can do related to this shadow she says:



"Where do we start? It's counterintuitive, she said, but it's not with plug-in cars or solar panels or plant-based diets. Those are good things to do." Havhoe said. "But do the one thing most of us aren't doing: talking about it ... We don't think it matters, and we don't think there is anything positive we can do to change it."
