LIVE STREAMING OF WORSHIP

The technical equipment in the Church Sanctuary has been changed to allow streaming via You Tube on Sunday Mornings in place of Zoom.

Anyone wishing to view the service should click on the link which is emailed to the congregation each week from the church office. The service can also be found by searching on You Tube. Once in 'You Tube' simply type in 'Greenbank Church Morning Service' and select the correct service.

Please note that with live streaming there is about a minutes delay before the service is transmitted from the church to people at home. Please be patient if it is a little later than 10.30am before the service starts.

Those attending worship in the Church Sanctuary on Sundays are also asked to note that services are being streamed. The camera being used to transmit images is downstairs, just in front of the balcony area. The cameras will film the pews directly in front of it, the side pews at the front and the chancel area of the church. Members of the congregation who do not wish to be 'caught on camera' are asked to select their seats appropriately.

ACCESSING SUNDAY MORNING WORSHIP LIVE BY TELEPHONE OR AS A RECORDING

For those who do not have a computer and are unable to attend church there is an option of using their telephone to listen to the service. Simply dial 0141 815 1166 at 10.30am if you wish to listen to the service live; alternatively you can listen to a recording of the most recent service from the Monday until the Saturday of the following week. When you dial to hear the most recent recording you will firstly hear a message from Jeanne and then some music. Please wait until the music stops and then, when asked to do so, press 1 on you telephone key pad.

Prayer Diary

"I like to think
That, long ago
There fell to earth

I've always felt when I'm tidying up the back garden for the winter, that the top of the garden is a good bit colder than it is further down. As the recent snow disappeared overnight, the fact that my back grass was still covered in large white patches, made me think that I don't imagine it. The first part of the winter was fairly mild, and there's plenty to keep us occupied in the run-up to the festive season, but these early months of the year can feel bleak and cold, maybe more so just now when our activities are still curtailed. Please remember everyone who is alone in these short, dark days, and anyone who finds themselves living on the streets.

Remember also all the businesses who hoped that the busy Christmas period would revive their fortunes, only to be faced with further restrictions, and people staying at home.

Ask, as we have been doing for a long time now, that if we cannot eradicate the virus, we can at least learn how to bring it under control enough for us to live without lurching from one crisis to another.

Ask that the coming year will be a year of progress in many ways - in health, in poverty, in equality, in the climate emergency, and just for a bit of normality.

Keep the people of Afghanistan in your prayers as they struggle to find food and warmth. Remember all the places in the world, home and abroad, where people struggle to keep a roof over their heads and food in their bellies.

Please keep Greenbank in your prayers too. Ask that we will soon be able to gather without masks and spaces; that people will feel safe and want to come back; that the children from the Sunday Club will feel able to return and fill the front pews.

"Whenever electric storms hit your home or family life, look at the storm which hit Calvary. Allow it to be the yardstick for the circumstances confronting your storm.

The sky will clear, you will experience the deathly silence of loneliness, or despair, hopelessness, indifference to continuing in this struggle for life and then.....after that silence, that space of time we need to come to, we shall come to see colours again. Brilliant colours; a rainbow through the rain? It beckons us to continue to lift up our heads, to look at that miracle of nature, that promise of Almighty God in Genesis 9:13-16. Presently the sun will shine again for you too."

I came across a poem recently by Christian poet Anne Weems called 'Balloons Belong in Church' which I shared at the Sundown Service a few weeks ago. You may have already read this poem but, if you haven't, here it is. It's a long poem but I think it is well worth the time it takes to read and reflect on its words

'BALLOONS BELONG IN CHURCH'

I took to church one morning a happy four-year-old child Holding a bright blue string to which was attached a much loved orange balloon with pink stripes. . . Certainly a thing of beauty. And if not forever at least a joy for a very important now. When later the child met me at the door, Clutching blue string, orange and pink bobbing behind her, She didn't have to tell me something had gone wrong.

"What's the matter?"
She wouldn't tell me.
"I bet they loved your balloon."
Out it came then, mocking the teacher's voice,
"We don't bring balloons to church."
Then that little four-year-old, her lip a little trembly, asked,
"Why aren't balloons allowed in church? I thought God would like balloons."

I celebrate seashells and elephants and lions that roar.
I celebrate roasted marshmallows and chocolate cake and fresh fish.
I celebrate aromas: bread baking, mincemeat, lemons...

I celebrate hearing: waves pounding, the rain's rhythm, soft voices...
I celebrate touching: toes in the sand, a kitten's fur, another person...

I celebrate tears for the mistreated, the hurt, the lonely...

I celebrate the community that cares . . . the church . . .

I celebrate the times when we in the church made it . . .

When we held to our warm and well-fed bodies a cold and lonely world
I celebrate the times when the Church is the church
When we are Christians
When we are living, loving, contributing.

The Scripture says there's a time to laugh and a time to weep. It's not hard to see the reasons for crying in a world where hatred is so manifest. So celebrate!

Bring your balloons and your butterflies, your bouquets of flowers . . .

Bring the torches and hold them high!

Dance your dances, paint your feelings, sing your songs, whistle, laugh.

Life is a celebration, an affirmation of God's love.

Life is distributing more balloons.

For God so loved the world . . .

Surely that's a cause for Joy.

Surely we should celebrate it!

Good news! That he should love us that much.

Where did we ever get the idea that balloons don't belong in the church?

In the days and months ahead, in the big moments and in the small quiet moments, may you all find reason to rejoice in God's unconditional and overflowing love.

This hawthorn tree was chosen as the U.K.'s "Tree of the Year". It is the only tree on the beach at Kippford in Dumfries & Galloway in the south of Scotland. As you can see, it is bent over because it has stood up to the force of the wind for many years but the tree is strong and has survived.

It is as well that trees are strong because they do so much for us. We could not exist as we do if there were no trees. A mature leafy tree produces as much oxygen in a season as 10 people inhale in a year. What many people don't realise is the forest also acts as a giant filter that cleans the air we breathe.

Trees can either store harmful pollutants or actually change the pollutant into less harmful forms. They can help stop land being washed away by seas and rivers. To produce its food, a tree takes in and locks away carbon dioxide in the wood, roots and leaves which is a very good thing as carbon dioxide is a contributor to global warming. However, trees are in trouble and the reason is human beings who cut them down in huge numbers to make money and don't care about the damage they are doing. Governments, scientists and people who care about the environment are trying to change this but we can each do our little bit to help by planting a tree. You could plant one in your garden (but check how big it will grow first). There are also places where you can arrange for a larger tree to be planted for you. You could do it as a family or get one as a present for yourself. After all trees look after us so we should look after them.

WINTER OLYMPICS 2022



This is Bing Dwen, the mascot of the2022 Winter Olympic Games being held in China this month. as you can see he is based on China's most famous and very rare animal, the Giant

From 4–20 February 2022, the best winter athletes will gather in Beijing, the Chinese capital, as well as Zhangjiakou to compete for 109 gold medals.

Events will be held in 15 disciplines across seven sports at the Beijing 2022 Games in biathlon, bobsleigh (including skeleton), curling, ice hockey, luge, skating (including figure skating, short track and speed skating) and skiing (alpine skiing, cross country, freestyle, nordic combined, ski jumpoing and snowboard.

There are 109 sets of medals to be awarded, seven more than there were at PyeongChang 2018. New events will be contested in bobsleigh, short track, freestyle skiing, ski jumping, and snowboard.

VALENTINE DECORATIONS

Doesn't the house look bare once you take the Christmas decorations down. Why not try a valentine's one?




You will need: Rainbow coloured paper or card, scissors, Pritt stick or PVA glue, coloured ribbon, pegs.

- 1. Cut the coloured paper into 3cm wide strips. Use whatever colour you like but different colours of strips are pretty. You need two of each colour and length.
- 2. Now you need to cut the rainbow of paper strips into different lengths. The first strip should be the 30cm. The next strips need to be 3cm shorter each time eg 27cm, 24cm, 21com and so on.
- 3. On one of the shortest strips, dab a little glue on the ends and press together to form a tear shape. Dab glue onto the ends of the next size and form the tear shape this time around the first one. Repeat until you've used up all that that set of strips. Use pegs to keep strips together while they dry. Do the same with the second set of strips.
- 5. Cut a length of ribbon to about 30cm and fold in half to create a loop. Apply some glue on one side of each of the teardrops and sandwich the ribbon in-between. Press the teardrop shapes together until they look like a heart and peg together to dry.

I am writing to acknowledge and thank the congregation of Greenbank Church for your ongoing and generous donations of foodstuff and toiletries delivered in support of our Winter Appeal. Your donations will greatly assist us in our work with people experiencing homelessness, vulnerability and social exclusion at the Lodging House Mission here in Glasgow.

As the colder months arrive we are now providing Winter Warming Packs of hats, scarves and gloves. We are open on a restricted basis and where possible our aim is provide a table service breakfast and lunch on weekdays. As always at LHM, we seek to make a positive difference to the lives of those we support. Our nutritious food is often the gateway to engagement and relationship building, allowing our team to offer interventions for those with multiple complex needs who often have chaotic lifestyles.
