LIVE STREAMING OF WORSHIP

The technical equipment in the Church Sanctuary has been changed to allow streaming via You Tube on Sunday Mornings in place of Zoom.

Anyone wishing to view the service should click on the link, which is emailed to the congregation each week from the church office. The service can also be found by searching on You Tube. Once in 'You Tube' simply type in 'Greenbank Church Morning Service' and select the correct service.

Please note that with live streaming there is about a minutes delay before the service is transmitted from the church to people at home. Please be patient if it is a little later than 10.30am before the service starts.

Those attending worship in the Church Sanctuary on Sundays are also asked to note that services are being streamed. The camera being used to transmit images is downstairs, just in front of the balcony area. The cameras will film the pews directly in front of it, the side pews at the front and the chancel area of the church. Members of the congregation who do not wish to be 'caught on camera' are asked to select their seats appropriately.

ACCESSING SUNDAY MORNING WORSHIP LIVE BY TELEPHONE OR AS A RECORDING

For those who do not have a computer and are unable to attend church there is an option of using their telephone to listen to the service. Simply dial 0141 815 1166 at 10.30am if you wish to listen to the service live; alternatively you can listen to a recording of the most recent service from the Monday until the Saturday of the following week. When you dial to hear the most recent recording you will firstly hear a message from Jeanne and then some music. Please wait until the music stops and then, when asked to do so, press 1 on you telephone key pad.

Dear Friends,

By now, many of you will be aware that all Church of Scotland Presbyteries have to provide a plan as to how they will address the required reduction in ministry posts agreed by the 2021 General Assembly. At the Assembly, the Assembly Trustees set out the problem: to live within its means, the Church of Scotland could now afford only 600 ministry posts (parish ministers plus Ministries Development Staff) and maintain 60 vacancies (presently that number is over 200). To achieve this number, presbyteries across Scotland were allocated a number of posts, and instructed to achieve that number by 2025. For Glasgow Presbytery, which presently works with 123 ministries, the allocated number is 84.

The Presbytery Plan Creation Group (PPCG) of Glasgow Presbytery has begun the work that will form a draft Mission Plan for approval by the Presbytery by September 2022 and the Faith Nurture Forum and General Trustees by December 2022. Two letters have been sent to all congregations by Rev. Roy Henderson, Convener of PPCG, with a map showing zones that congregations have been allocated to and a copy of the Principles that will be used to create the plan. These communications have also been sent to all members of Greenbank for whom we have an email address. Anyone who did not receive these communications, and would like to have a printed a copy sent to them, should contact the church office. The communications can also be accessed on Greenbank's website and Facebook page.

We find ourselves at the beginning of an unsought Presbytery Planning Process through which our national church will undergo a period of great change and challenge. Although preliminary contact has been made, meetings between Greenbank's representatives, the other congregations in the zone to which we have been allocated and with PPCG have still to take place. The congregation will be kept updated on all that happens in the coming weeks but, in the meantime, please do not hesitate to email or telephone me with any questions or concerns. Please also pray for all presbyteries in the creation of the plan and the ministries and congregations it will affect.

In his letter to all congregations, the Rev. Roy Henderson said that all congregations in Glasgow Presbytery will face hard choices this year and that no parish or post will be immune. The process will be difficult, but let us pray that the right decisions will be made and the plan will work in ways that enable Christ's ministry to continue in and through the Church of Scotland.

The Very Rev. Dr John Chalmers, when presenting the original proposals to the 2021 General Assembly, said this: "We are well aware that this is not an easy ask. Every one of us is a member or minister serving in parishes that will be affected by this. We know reshaping the Church around this will involve painful decisions. But in the goodness and grace of God we trust."

In all that lies ahead for the church, to which we belong, may our trust in God's grace and goodness define and uphold us.

Thanks also to those who give me knitted strips for me to put together. If anyone has time on their hands, the pattern is below. I crochet four strips together to make a blanket to the size wanted by the charity.

I have just handed over to the Blythswood Charity the latest 9 blankets which brings the total to exactly 500. (Since I started in 2000 that's about 24 per year). I had thought I might stop at 500 but was quickly bored so number 501 is already underway. Please keep the wool coming - any ply, any colour.

Blanket Strip Pattern

Size 10 needles, 55 stitches, garter stitch for 5 feet. Leave the cast off and wool loose in case the strip needs to be adjusted to match another.

COMMUNION, SUNDAY 6TH MARCH

If, like me, you have participated in Communion only at home on Zoom or YouTube since the commencement of the pandemic, you may be unfamiliar with the individual Covid safe little cup which has been used at communion since church was allowed to reopen, and which will again be used at the March communion

Members of our congregation attending at church on Communion on Sunday, 6th March will be invited to pick up a little sealed cup (photographed below) as they enter at the front vestibule or Link Building, as Communion will not be served by members of Kirk Session.

The cup is quite compact, and I have included a £1 coin for scale. The cup is a bit smaller than, but similar in design to, a small UHT milk portion, and is opened in a similar way, by peeling back from the pointed area. There are two layers of plastic film - one above and one below the white communion wafer

Clearly visible is the white communion wafer. To access this, the layer of clear plastic film above it is peeled back. Once the wafer has been removed, the remaining layer of film can then be peeled back, revealing the communion wine.

You may find it helpful to open the cup as soon as you are seated in church, rather than waiting until the time of communion.

WHAT IS LENT?

Lent is an old English word meaning 'lengthen'. Lent is observed in spring, when the days begin to get longer. It is the period of six weeks (40 days not including Sundays) leading up to Easter. In 2022 Lent begins on Wednesday 2nd March and ends on Thursday 14th April. It is followed by Good Friday, Holy Saturday and Easter Day on Sunday. It reminds us of when Jesus went into the desert for 40 days to fast and pray before beginning his work for God that ended three years later with his death on the cross and his rising from death.

During Lent we try to do the same as Jesus did. We pray and think about our relationship with God and about the work we might do for God. For some people it means giving something up that we enjoy. It can be a favourite food or activity that we will miss not having. The day before Lent starts is Shrove Tuesday. This is also known as **Pancake Day**. This day was traditionally the last chance to use up the foods Christians would not be eating during Lent.

Another way to get involved in Lent is to give up your time to do some good for others. There are lots of simple tasks you can do like helping about the house or visiting someone who could do with a bit of company. You will have your own ideas. 
RED NOSE DAY

LEGACY UPDATE

At the Kirk Session a few weeks ago we reminded ourselves that the initial work on what became known as our Legacy Project began away back in December 2014. In the months that followed we visited a number of churches to see what they had done and in almost every case they spoke about the very lengthy journey, sometimes up to ten years, involved in getting their project completed. At the time I think we wondered how it could possibly take that long but now, after over seven years working on our own project, we certainly know the answer to that question! Perhaps if Covid had not intervened we might have been a year or two ahead but the very detailed work of trying to understand and forecast what the needs of a church will be in the future, exploring how we could raise funds, consulting the congregation with plans, marketing the land and finding a suitable buyer, commissioning architects and others to help in the design of what we planned, all these things just take time. We have to remind ourselves that we are building for the next generation and we have to get this right so it was never going to be quick.

However, at last I am able to report that there has been some progress recently and discussions have begun with planners. I will of course keep you posted.

We have also been working hard with the architect and other consultants looking at all the costs associated with the project to ensure that only that which needs to be spent will be spent. We want to be as ready as we can be once planning approval is given but let's remind ourselves what is planned.

You have all seen the images produced by the architect but in essence what is planned is that an extension is built to the south side, the manse side, of the main sanctuary. A new pathway will be created from Mansefield Road that will provide a more level entrance for those who find the current steep incline from Eaglesham Road challenging. The Mansefield Road entrance will lead to a new entrance door into a large welcoming, gathering space that will become the heart of the new facility and leading from there to a multipurpose space, kitchen, church office a large hall and the church itself. Some repairs and refurbishment will also be carried out on the sanctuary. We are building for the next generation and so the new facilities have to be easier and less expensive to run and maintain than the current set of buildings as well as being flexible enough for use throughout the week. As life hopefully returns to some kind of normality, it is important that the church is seen to be alive and serving the community in all kinds of ways.

Pause, however, for a moment. Our focus over the past few years has understandably been on creating the kind of facility described but we need to stop occasionally and remind ourselves that our buildings are only a means to an end. We started this whole project not to create a set of buildings, important as they are. Our purpose is a far greater one: it is to advance Christ's Kingdom in this place. That is our mission, one to which each of us is committed through our membership of the Church and a vision towards which we march, albeit slowly at times, but nevertheless with steadfast purpose and intent. And so, let's keep positive with our eye on that much bigger goal.

YOUR LASTING LEGACY

I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith.

Timothy 4:7

In the February issue of Good Neighbour you may have noticed a short sentence alongside a small picture, which asks the question "Have you remembered the Church in your Will?"

As a retired solicitor with over 40 years' experience in dealing with the administration of clients' estates, I cannot emphasise enough the importance of making a Will to ensure that your estate is distributed in accordance with your wishes after your passing. By not leaving a Will your estate falls to be dealt with under the Laws of Intestate Succession in Scotland and you may be surprised to learn that this may result in your assets and their net worth going to relatives that you may or may not have intended (or even known about) and in some circumstances in very different proportions to what you might have expected. It is always a worthwhile exercise to seek legal advice on how your estate falls to be divided under intestacy (where you haven't left a Will) to galvanise you into making one!

By making or updating a Will it makes us stop and think about our priorities. You will first and foremost want to ensure that your Will provides for your family and friends but, having done so, there is also the opportunity to continue supporting the causes you care about in life by including a legacy or legacies as part of that will-making process. There is often a misconception that only the wealthy leave money to charity, but even a small donation can help make a huge difference. It is a fact that 74% of the UK public support a charity during their lifetime but only 7% include their favourite causes in their Will. The Church of Scotland and each of its congregations are registered Charities. By leaving a legacy to a charity you can reduce any potential Inheritance tax on your estate. Your solicitor can advise you on this.

Leaving such a gift in your Will can be a lasting and powerful expression of your gratitude and thanksgiving towards God and can help secure and transform the Church's future both locally and nationally.

You are invited to consider how a gift in your Will, a legacy, could help your Church here in Greenbank to meet the needs of future generations. You can of course leave a gift to the national Church of Scotland, which will help enable and encourage ministry, mission, social care and service across Scotland and beyond. A gift specifically to Greenbank Parish Church will be used wholly for the purposes of our Church's ministry and will help sustain and encourage our congregation's engagement with the community and its services.

There are different ways in which to leave a legacy in your Will:

- A pecuniary legacy is a gift of a fixed sum of money of your choosing. N.B. such legacies
 get paid out of your estate first in full before the main beneficiaries get their share of
 your estate, so bear this in mind when deciding on the amount of the legacy.
- A specific legacy is a gift of a specific item e.g. property, shares or personal items.
- A residuary legacy is a gift of what is left (or a part/a percentage of what is left) after all other bequests and debts have been paid. This can be more beneficial to charities as the gift will not decrease in value due to inflation. By leaving 10% of the residue of your estate to Charity (which can be split amongst several charities of your choice) those estates on which Inheritance Tax is payable will only pay 36% tax instead of 40% tax but again seek legal advice on how this will impact on the amounts other residuary beneficiaries will receive by doing so.

You can specify a specific purpose that you wish your gift to be used for or you can say it is to be used for general Church purposes.

In essence, making a Will and updating it regularly are the only ways to ensure your wishes are carried out after your death. Your Will is a legal document so it is vital to have it drafted by a legally

qualified person. If you have a solicitor he/she can prepare or update your Will — just a phone call to them to say what you are looking to do will start the process. There are a number of local solicitor firms in the Clarkston, Giffnock and Newton Mearns area who can provide this service and if in doubt the Law Society of Scotland will also provide you with a selection of local solicitors in your area (www.lawscot.org.uk). Pre-pandemic most solicitors would be happy to accommodate a visit to your home if requested and it is hoped that with the gradual easing of Covid restrictions this service can be resumed.

I hope this article has been of interest to some of you even if its effect has been simply to encourage you to understand the benefit of having a Will no matter how basic. If you do choose to remember Greenbank Parish Church in your Will your solicitor will need the following information —

KIRK SESSION - WHAT DO THEY TALK ABOUT?

The Kirk Session has appointed a number of coordinators who are responsible for reporting on the various activities, which take place in our church

The Worship Report provided feedback on the Christmas services with particular mention being made of the very popular early evening Christmas Eve Service and the online nativity service presented by the Sunday Club. Mention was also made of the live streaming of the Sunday morning services on YouTube, the Sundown services on Wednesday evening and the return of Messy Church on Fridays

The Outreach Report referred to the increase in demand for the services of the Foodbank but intimated that donations had also increased. LHM recorded their gratitude to Greenbank for the funds from the sale of cards and for the donations of food and toiletries

The activities of Clarkston Churches Together were referred to, in particular the Pulpit Exchange which occurred during the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity and the online service which was led by Mary Miller on the work of Jane Haining.

The Treasurer's Report referred to, amongst other items, the value of the Legacy Fund at the end of the year (£266,151) the reduction in our offering income and the likely increase in central levies to the Church of Scotland.

The Property Report referred to issues with water ingress in Room D at the back of the stage and difficulties with the church heating which will incur considerable expenditure (e.g. repair of the cast iron pipe under sanctuary at £4075).

The Fellowship Report referred to the activities of the Guild who have a full syllabus planned including a quiz hosted by Jill Liddell and the annual summer outing, Time Out, who continue to meet in Clarkston Tennis Club, the 'Grumpy Old Men' who meet on Wednesday mornings at 10am in Rouken Glen Garden Centre and give a great welcome to new recruits, and Coffee and Chat which has been organised by the Social Events Committee who held their most recent event on Saturday 5th February.

The Youth Report referred to the fact that the Sunday Club were able to carry out many of their usual activities during the Christmas period including the Annual Gift Service, which provided donations for the Queen Elizabeth Children's Hospital Neo-Natal Unit, Church House and SACRO,. The Trailblazers and Sunday Squad held a joint party, which took place on the 12th of December and the online Nativity, which was presented at the Family Service on the 19th of December.

The Legacy Project Group reported to the Kirk Session, see page 9 of the Good Neighbour for a separate Legacy update.

A number of other reports and administrative matters were briefly discussed including the decision to use the Fulton Bequest for those attending worship courses, the appointment of the Presbytery Elder for 2022/23, the attestation of the roll, which now stands at 669, the approval of the Safeguarding Statement, the approval of the Data Protection Policy Statement and the arrangements for the March Communion.

A Kirk Session Review is to be undertaken to look at Elders' duties and how Kirk Session operates in changing times.

The Good Neighbour distributor requested that Session consider the role of district visitors and the way in which the Good Neighbour magazine is distributed to members. She detailed some points for discussion at the next Kirk Session meeting.

Glasgow Presbytery's Plan Creation Group had sent letters and information regarding Presbytery's Mission Plan, which had been circulated to members.

Volunteer Role Description for Chaplaincy Team Volunteer: Prayer Support

At LHM we want to ensure that those who are experiencing homelessness, social isolation or exclusion have a place where they feel that they belong, a community for those who come through the doors. Food provides us with a perfect opportunity to engage with people and allow us a chance to build relationships and trust whilst assessing their needs. We are able to provide support to people in-house for a number of issues they may be facing and those issues that we are not able to deal with internally, we can signpost to and even support a meeting/contact to ensure a smooth transition for the vulnerable person.

The Prayer Supporter Role is a new volunteering opportunity being set up at LHM to increase the Christian presence and support available for the work and people of the Mission. Your role as part of the chaplaincy team would be to provide prayer support in a variety of settings. This role has two main purposes; to support our mission aims through prayer for the events, activities and people of Lodging House Mission, and secondly to provide and oversee the provision of a prayer space for guests of the Lodging House Mission to support their prayer life.

You will be carrying out tasks such as:

- Offer a Christian presence and provide specific prayer support to our staff, volunteers and guests.
- To maintain a welcoming and invitational prayer space for our guests.
- Support and encourage participants in their use of the prayer space and introduce available prayer activities and materials as appropriate as part of a three person team.
- Provide a listening ear and the ability to pray with and for those using the space if required.
- Participate in a regular prayer meeting for the events and people of LHM.
- Support the Chaplain in communication of prayer needs to our supporting churches.

The skills and attributes you should have:

- Kindness, compassion and empathy are three key attributes a friendly face makes people feel welcome and wanted
- An active Christian faith and openness to engage with those of other faiths or none.
- Being enthusiastic about the role you are undertaking
- To have a tolerant and non-judgemental attitude in the face of indifference or hostility
- To be able to work as part of a team as well as on your own
- Be over 18 years of age

How much time would you need to commit

This is something that we can discuss depending on your circumstances and our needs at the time. We would recommend that you commit to one prayer meeting per month as a minimum to build relationships and connect with the team.

Our day centre runs from 8.30am until 3pm. The aim would be for the prayer space to be open to guests between 10 and 2pm. In addition, we would ask that you are able to take a regular slot within that time period. At the moment we are open Monday to Friday but hope to reinstate our weekend provision at some point in the near future.

What support can you expect?

- A taster session to see if this is the place for you.
- An induction session
- The Chaplain will be the point of contact for guidance and pastoral support
- Training as necessary/required

What are the benefits to you?

- Being part of a friendly, dynamic team
- The satisfaction of knowing that you are making a difference in someone's life
- The chance to use and develop existing skills and learn new things
- A learning, missional community in which to live out your faith.



Volunteer Role Description for Front of House Team

At LHM we want to ensure that those who are experiencing homelessness, social isolation or exclusion have a place where they feel that they belong, a community for those who come through the doors. Food provides us with a perfect opportunity to engage with people and allow us a chance to build relationships and trust whilst assessing their needs. We are able to provide support to people in-house for a number of issues they may be facing and those issues that we are not able to deal with internally, we can signpost to and even support a meeting/contact to ensure a smooth transition for the vulnerable person.

Your role front of house is so much more than just taking details for track and trace, you will be the first person they see so it is crucial to set the scene and show a friendly face and be helpful and considerate.

You will be carrying out tasks such as:

- Ask the person to use the machine to take their temperature and sanitise their hands before allowing the person to enter
- Take a name and contact details and record them for track and trace
- Explain how their experience will work to those who are new
- Organise takeout food for people who do not wish to come inside
- Answer calls and pass to the appropriate person or take a message
- Most importantly, be the friendly face they see first and make sure that the experience they have is dignified

The skills and attributes you should have:

- Kindness, compassion and empathy are three key attributes a friendly face makes people feel welcome and wanted
- Being enthusiastic about the role you are undertaking
- To have a tolerant and non-judgemental attitude
- To be able to work as part of a team as well as on your own
- Preferably to be able to input data on a spreadsheet
- Be over 18 years of age

How much time would you need to commit

This is something that we can discuss depending on your circumstances and our needs at the time. We would ask that you commit to one shift a month as a minimum if possible. If not, don't let that be a barrier, let's talk. Our day runs from 8.30am until 3pm. We would ask that you do a minimum of 4 hours within that time period. At the moment we are open Monday to Friday but hope to reinstate our weekend provision at some point in the near future.

What support can you expect?

- A taster session to see if this is the place for you.
- An induction session
- Training to use the spreadsheet and telephone system
- A named person who will be your point of contact, providing you with guidance and support
- Training as necessary/required
