

Dear Friends,

As Covid restrictions ease and everyone is encouraged to come back to Greenbank, when the time is right for them, it has been so wonderful to see so many of you return to worship on Sunday mornings. Although the necessity to book a seat has now gone, we still have to remain vigilant to control the virus as we cautiously move forward. Therefore, everyone attending worship, will have to provide their name on entry for test and protect purposes and to wear a mask and remain seated to sing during worship. One day, all restrictions will ease but, meantime, even if our meeting together is not quite the same as it once was, I am truly thankful we can now gather in person and be in one another's company again.

With Covid restrictions easing, we are aiming to move away from the Sunday morning Zoom services, which have been such a blessing to us over the last 18 months, to live streaming. This will enable everyone to join the service from home at 10.30am. Although the opportunity to speak to one another will

no longer be possible, the live streaming will allow everyone at home to see, hear and participate in Sunday morning services as they happen. Moving to the live streaming will also make it possible for everyone at home to hear Peter play the Organ and Clavinova and to hear the congregation singing — something that hasn't been possible with Zoom. The church choir hopes to return on Sunday mornings soon too — so everyone at home will hear them too! When the live streaming equipment is in place, Jane from the office will email everyone a link for use on Sunday mornings.

At the beginning of September, a time for tea, coffee and fellowship in the Fraser Hall is being reintroduced after Sunday morning services. In order that we might play our own small part in caring for the environment, everyone is invited to bring their own cup for this purpose. Another opportunity for a time of fellowship is taking place at our "Bits and Bobs Sale" on Saturday 4th September from 10am to 12noon. Once again, if you wish to, you can bring your own cup. Please don't worry if you forget because we still have a small supply of disposable, environmentally friendly, cups to use up.

By this time, we had hoped that the sale of our site including the church halls, would have been finalised, however, due to COVID restrictions, East Renfrewshire Council has had to adapt to ways of working that have resulted in planning permissions taking much longer than they used to. While we wait, rather than have our halls lie empty and, given the easing of Covid restrictions, we are preparing to reopen them. Some groups have chosen to return to the halls until the sale is completed.

As we move forward, never forgetting the sadness and tragedy of the loss to life and livelihoods in the past eighteen months, these are days of tentative and cautious steps, and not days of returning to the way of life many of us yearn for again. I am conscious that some are still wary about returning to Greenbank just yet. Rest assured that you continue to be very much missed and I hope that circumstances may soon allow you to come back. So may God guide and bless you, and us all, gently and carefully, caringly and patiently in our journey of faith together with Jesus Christ.

TRIBUTE TO CAPTAIN ARTHUR T. YOUNG MBE

Arthur Young, one of our elders, died on 14th April 2021.

Arthur was born in Wishaw in 1923 where he spent a happy childhood with his father Arthur, mother Mary, older brother, Knibb, and younger sister, Elizabeth. His father was a marine engineer in the Merchant Navy and Arthur followed him and his older brother into the Merchant Navy and began working with Clan Line when he was 16 at the beginning of the Second World War. He had a distinguished war record, being present at Dunkirk and the Normandy landings as well as serving on convoys in the Atlantic and Mediterranean. Although he had witnessed the horrors of war as a young man, like many of his generation, he was modest about his service and any reference he made to the war was always focused on the camaraderie of the people around him.

Arthur met his wife Helen, who was a teacher, on a double date with his brother and they married in August 1950. Their first home was in Greenock and in 1955 Arthur came ashore and took up a position with the Clyde Pilotage.

They moved to Greenwood Road in Clarkston in 1957 when Arthur became an Assistant Harbour Master with the Clyde Port Authority. He became the Harbour Master in 1971 and retired in 1982. After his retirement he continued to work for the International Association of Ports and Harbours as a consultant and travelled to Australia and America before finally retiring in 1985. Arthur was also a highly distinguished and greatly admired member of the Honourable Company of Master Mariners. He was an outstanding Honorary Secretary of the Clyde Outport from 1976 to 1982 and made a huge contribution to its work.

Although Arthur and Helen spent a lot of time travelling, many of their holidays were spent in Crovie in Aberdeenshire which was like a second home and a favourite place to holiday with the children David, John, Allan and Susan and later grandchildren, Eilidh and Euan. They were always very active holidays with Arthur taking them out in boats and teaching them a healthy respect for the sea.

Arthur was very much the peacemaker at home and a calming influence. He was a strict but fair dad who instilled in his children a healthy respect for themselves and others. He missed Helen terribly when she died but his dog Zeta was a good companion to him at that difficult time, and he continued his association with Giffnock Bowling Club where he had been a member for many years.

Arthur was member of Greenbank Parish Church where he participated fully in the life of the church and was ordained as an elder in 1972. He served as a District Elder in the Broom area, was a member of the Fabric Committee and was a past Chairman of the Congregational Board. He loved to sing, and with his powerful and distinctive voice, was a valued member of the church choir for many years.

Arthur Young was good company, socially conscious, well-travelled and knowledgeable with a great sense of humour. He was a typical Ship's Captain who spoke his mind bluntly and confidently. He was a man of firm conviction about what was right and what was wrong.

Today we give thanks to God for the life and service of Arthur Young and commend John, Allan, Susan and the wider family to the love and care of our Lord Jesus Christ.

TRIBUTE TO DONALD SHARPLES

Donald Sharples, one of our elders, died on 12th July 2021.

Donald, the youngest of five boys, was born in 1937 to Harry and Janet Sharples. After a happy childhood in Possilpark, he began his trade training as a Template Maker, which he interrupted to complete National Service in the Tank Regiment. After National Service he worked for thirty years at Babcock and Wilcox in Renfrew. After leaving Babcock he enjoyed a very different career working for the Prudential Assurance until his retirement.

In 1958 Donald met his wife Marion at the Dennistoun Palais and four years later they began their long and happy marriage together. After Gary and Claire were born, they moved to Clarkston in 1968 and formed many long standing family friendships in Hillend Crescent before moving to Woodbank Crescent.

Although Donald was a quiet and reserved man, he smiled a lot and was a generous, kind and caring husband and father who loved children. He was a great family man and role model for his children. He always loved and supported Gary and Claire in whatever they chose to do and he was immensely proud of both his children and his three grandsons, David, Stephen and Joel.

He was an eager DIY-er, an endless inventor of games, a master builder of forts and when on holiday in Millport or the East coast of Scotland, a sandcastle-maker extraordinaire. Donald was gifted at drawing, designing and building and loved spending time in the beautiful and productive garden he created and maintained.

Donald didn't talk much about his Christian faith, however his character and the way he lived his life, spoke loudly about the depth and genuineness of his relationship with Christ. Marion and he attended church regularly and he was ordained as an Elder in Greenbank in 1996. He served as a District Elder and was in charge of the distribution of Good Neighbour for many years. LEGACY UPDATE

This September edition of the Good Neighbour always marks for me the end of the summer and for a second year it has been quite a different summer due to the restrictions we have all lived with for some time. At least the weather was good for large spells and there was plenty of sport to watch for those who like that. As we begin to turn our thoughts to the autumn I wanted to bring you up to date on our Legacy Project.

Over the last few months the Legacy Project Group has been active in different areas. Work on defining the extent of the fabric repairs that will be necessary in the sanctuary continued and further applications for capital funding were submitted with research being carried out into other possible funders. Unfortunately we were unsuccessful in an application to Historic Environment Scotland for help with repairs to the sanctuary but they did offer some advice on how a future application could be strengthened and we have been following that up. In my April update I had said that we had started to alert organisations to the need to clear the halls of any equipment or material they store. Thanks to work by many of the organisations, the halls have now been cleared out.

Looking ahead, the key issue is the outcome of the two planning applications, our application for renovating and extending the current sanctuary and the developer's application for the care home. The success of the care home developer's application is of course particularly important as the proceeds from the sale of the land will allow us to carry out the renovation and extension of the sanctuary that you have seen in various leaflets and so we have been doing what we can to support their application. In practical terms this has meant working with them to emphasise the community wide benefits that will come from the development of the complete site. Not only will we benefit from the provision of much needed local care home places but we will also create excellent state of the art facilities for the church and community. Facilities that will allow us to continue all the activities that take place during normal times within the church but will also, and importantly, enable us to respond to new opportunities and community needs as they emerge.

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH OF OUR NEW ASSISTANT MINISTER, THE REV. FRED D. MILLIGAN, JR.

The oldest of five children, Fred was raised on a small family farm in north-central Arkansas in the United States, and was nurtured in his Christian faith in the Cumberland Presbyterian congregation established by his Scots-Irish ancestors in the early 1800's. He traces his family roots to county Down in Ulster, Northern Ireland, but hopes to discover connections with the Milligan/ken/gen clan that first formed in the borderlands region of Scotland.

In spite of (or perhaps because of) this rural upbringing, Fred early on felt a call to serve congregations in the midst of the ethnic, cultural and theological diversity of urban settings. This call to cross-cultural ministry eventually led Fred to seek and receive a fellowship to study Spanish for three months in Guadalajara, Mexico. This interest eventually led him to serve the Inter-denominational, English language Santiago Community Church in Santiago, Chile where he completed two terms (six years) of ministry in December of 2020.



Prior to that, Fred was both an installed as well as Interim/transitional Pastor of several Presbyterian congregations in the U.S. as well as holding positions as a congregational consultant on the national staffs of both the Presbyterian Church (USA) and the Evangelical Lutheran Church of America. He also served an ecumenical campus ministry on the Chicago campus of the University of Illinois.

Fred is currently a member of the Philadelphia Presbytery of the Presbyterian Church (USA) and is serving with us at the Greenbank Parish Church with their permission as he discerns the possibility of a call to transfer to the Church of Scotland and seek a longer term position. This would allow him to continue to serve within a Presbyterian and English language context while also being close to his fiancée, who lives in Brussels, Belgium and serves as an official with the European Commission.

In terms of his education, Fred holds a Bachelor of Arts degree in psychology with a double minor in music and bible from Bethel University in Mackenzie, TN. He received his Masters in Divinity from Vanderbilt University Divinity School and a Master of Arts in theological ethics from the University of Chicago Divinity School. Fred believes his theological training and past ministry in ecumenical and cross-cultural and transitional settings, as well as being a "cradle" Presbyterian, were the ideal preparation for serving our congregation during this important moment in the history of the Greenbank Parish Church.

Fred has an extensive and long-lived interest and involvement in church-based environmental groups and is particularly excited to be credentialed to represent the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) as a member of their delegation to the Twenty-sixth Conversation of Partners (COP 26) being held in Glasgow the first two weeks of November. He looks forward to accompanying us as we seek to deepen our understanding of the resources our faith may provide us as we confront the current climate crisis and seek to more faithfully address our calling to be stewards of the earth entrusted to our care.

Fred's hobbies include international travel, hiking, singing, cycling, collecting camping equipment, reading, dancing (especially the Argentine Tango), swimming, and all types of racquet sports. As he is moving all of his furnishings from Chile, he is seeking an unfurnished apartment or house with at least two bedrooms, for hosting the many friends and family who promise to visit, should anyone know of such in the Clarkston area.

REPORT ON GENERAL ASSEMBLY 2021

The General Assembly of our church is always an impressive event. In many ways, however, this year's was exceptional as Commissioners voted electronically from all over the world in what was a significant technical achievement. There were presentations or deliverances on a wide range of issues including the Safeguarding Committee and the Pension Trustees. Particularly interesting was the Ecumenical Relations Committee which noted the establishment of the Scottish Church Leaders Forum, approved the Saint Andrew Declaration between the Church of Scotland and the Scottish Episcopal Church and agreed the participation of the Church of Scotland in the Scottish Christian Forum which would be recognised as the national ecumenical body in Scotland.

Also interesting was the report of the Special Commission on the Effectiveness of the Presbyterian Form of Church Government. It noted that: 'the system itself had become increasingly unsuited for a smaller, marginalised Church which did not fit mission for the 21st century. There was an increasing lack of

financial resource and, more importantly, human resource to make it work.' However it was possible to argue that our church was not dying. It was reforming. The Assembly noted —

The Five Marks of Mission:

- i. To proclaim the Good News of the Kingdom
- ii. To teach, baptise and nurture new believers
- iii. To respond to human need by loving service
- iv. To seek to transform unjust structures of society, to challenge violence of every kind and pursue peace and reconciliation
- v. To strive to safeguard the integrity of creation and sustain and renew the life of the earth.

Nevertheless, the tension between the need for strong leadership in our church and the desire for local autonomy, between 121 George Street in Edinburgh and the individual churches, was acknowledged. The Commission considered that the effectiveness of Presbyterianism, as manifested in the Church of Scotland has, for many years, been compromised by a lack of connection between and among local, regional and national organisations. It distinguished between the role of the local church, the regional church i.e. the Presbytery and the National Church. In examining the purpose of the local church it emphasised the need for training for ministers, elders and others involved in leadership. It also emphasised mission, but mission, in its more accessible incarnation, in the caring for the sad, the lonely, the hungry, the thirsty, the naked and the sick. In examining the purpose of the regional church it said that the Presbytery is the gathered life of the Church of Scotland in a particular area but recognised that there was a perception that Presbyteries were too distant and remote from the majority of elders and congregational members. In examining the purpose of the National Church there was an acknowledgement of the need for significant change. There were questions over the size of the General Assembly, the week-long General Assembly format and its Parliamentary style of discussion. There was a tension between the sovereign authority of the General Assembly and the executive responsibilities of those appointed to be Trustees that needed to be addressed. There was a case for one Trustee being nominated from each of the new Presbyteries as well as the Trustees being appointed for their particular skill set. With devolution of responsibilities to the Presbyteries there was clearly the need to maintain national standards while recognising the local dimension.

The need for such change was acknowledged by the Assembly in 2019. The Radical Action Plan accepted by the Assembly introduced a new organisational structure, which was implemented in January 2020. Its composition is as follows:

- •The Faith Nurture Forum, which embraces new ways of supporting all of the various ministries within the Church; and new ways of ensuring continuity and change in worship, mission and discipleship.
- •The Faith Impact Forum which embraces engagement in the national, political and social issues affecting Scotland and the world today; and working internationally to share the gospel.
- •The Social Care Council (CrossReach) which embraces the offering of services in Christ's name to further the caring work of the Church to people in need.
- •The Central Services Committee which is responsible for managing the Church offices and its Service Departments.

The Crisis Facing our Church

Fundamentally the church is living well beyond her means.

- •The total membership of the church at the national level is less than 300,000 (297,435). In 2015 it was 363,000, Glasgow is the biggest presbytery with 26,000.
- •44% of worshippers are aged between 65 and 84 (Glasgow 36%).
- •The median church has a congregation of 194.
- •The median attendance on a Sunday is 55.
- •The median church is led by 15 elders (at the national level there are 12000 male elders and 15000 female elders).
- •There is considerable difficulty in the recruitment of ministers and up to 60% are due to retire in the next 10 years.

So what is being done to address the situation and how will it affect Greenbank?

Substantial progress was made in 2020 in pursuing cost savings. A 30% target reduction in expenditure was achieved within the National Office but the Trustees had still to draw £11m from reserves to support the work of the Church. Having been tasked with reducing its costs, "121" have reached their target of over £6m and capped the number of staff they will employ. The future of the George Street building is under consideration with only necessary maintenance being carried out. A decision on disposal of the building will take place when the current depressed situation of commercial property improves. Consideration is also being given to the future of the Assembly buildings.

Presbyteries

The number of Presbyteries will be reduced. The Presbytery will have a vital role to play in the future of the church Presbytery planning and management of future numbers of charges and associated ministry posts are of critical importance to the future of the Church but their number will be substantially reduced to a maximum of 12.

At the local level the pandemic has affected finances in reducing income from offerings and from church lets. As a result in October 2020 the Assembly approved a reduction in congregational contributions of 18%. This reduction ends this coming year. (In reality for us the reduction for Greenbank was around 12%.) The Ministries and Mission contribution from churches will be revised with more transparency on how the contribution is being spent.

The work of the Faith Nurture Forum caused most discussion. The Forum announced that the number of ministries the church could finance would reduce from over 700 at present to 600 by the end of 2025. Each new Presbytery has been allocated a set number of ministries. The decision on how these will be

allocated within a Presbytery is a Presbytery decision. Amongst the factors involved in that process will be "the right spaces in the right places" (i.e. buildings, their condition and location) and the effect of weighting given to Areas of Priority Treatment. Much discussion was on the impact on ministers and trainee ministers. A moratorium on filling current vacancies has been called.

The above is a distillation of over 25 hours of Zoom viewing. There were many other matters that were discussed that merit attention and can be found on the Church of Scotland website. We were impressed by the presentations and speeches. We admired the forbearance and kindness of the Moderator in coping with the technology, the amendments and amendments on amendments. We were in awe of the tech team who brought together commissioners and guests from all over Scotland and the world into one space. It was fascinating insight into the National Church and its future and we would recommend being a Commissioner if you are offered the chance.

This presents Scottish churches with a unique opportunity to make their voices heard.

The Church of Scotland is committed to Net Zero carbon emissions by 2030 and Eco-Congregation Scotland is currently supporting and informing members about how to get involved in COP26 and is also looking beyond the summit to consider community potential towards Net Zero carbon emissions and the need for a just and green recovery from coronavirus that addresses the climate emergency.

ECO CONGREGATION REPORT

Climate Justice for Churches

Climate Sunday, 5th September

It has been decided by CTBI [Churches Together in Britain & Ireland] that 5th September will be "Climate Sunday" which leaves scope for CCT to take part in this initiative also. It was suggested that David Coleman's liturgy could perhaps be included.

Climate Fringe Week, 18th - 26th September

"Stop Climate Chaos Scotland" is having a Climate Fringe Week, 18th-26th September and is encouraging groups to run activities, events and actions at that time (https://climatefringe.org/week/). CCT is considering organising an event locally during this week.

COP26 Event, 3rd October

Presbytery was planning a COP26 event at Sherbrooke Mosspark Church on Sunday 3rd October, with a suggested start time at the moment of 6.30pm. It was proposed that CCT would attend and could also publicise nearer the time.

Ecumenical Service (7th November) and Outdoor event, 30th October

During the Conference, on Sunday 7th November, an Ecumenical Service for delegates has been planned in Glasgow Cathedral, which would be live-streamed; there may also be an event outdoors (a march, pilgrimage or rally is being considered) on the preceding Saturday (30th October).

Proposed Glasgow Churches Together massed open air service on Glasgow Green, 7th November

A Glasgow Churches Together massed open air service on Glasgow Green on 7th November to which all COP26 delegates (and media) would be invited was discussed. The service would be themed about environmental protection. This was seen as a chance to increase pressure on the delegates and raise the profile of the church at the same time. The proposer of the idea explained that this would potentially have the added benefit of making the Church and Eco Congregation more relevant and interesting as well. Due to the anticipated size of the event it was emphasised that planning would have to begin soon.

Exhibition materials will be sourced and displayed. This will be another opportunity for people to make donations towards the work of Refuweegees.

Capacitai

Eleanor Maxwell a member of St Jospeh's and who is trained to lead this form of prayer, has offered to run a course for CCT for 4 weeks starting on the 22nd October on Saturday morning and Wednesday afternoons. The Capacitar sessions aim to Nurture and Heal through Body Prayer. Originally designed to help those who have experienced trauma, it was felt that it would be helpful to offer this given the Covid Pandemic we have all just lived through. The suggestion was made that each session take place in a different church building. Dates to be confirmed.

Another superb Olympic Games came to a close for Team GB, with British athletes having finished the Games with a grand total of 65 medals made up of 22 gold, 21 silver and 22 bronze. The Tokyo medals are a little different from past years. They have been made out of old mobile phones donated by the public. People from all over Japan donated 6.2 million of them over a period of two years to produce 32kg of gold, 3.5 tonnes of silver and 2.2 tonnes of bronze to make the Olympic and Paralympic medals. Now that is recycling on a grand scale!

> The Olympics is an event on grand scale. According to the list of athletes on the Olympic website, 11,656 athletes participated in this year's Games, from Katrine Aalerud (a Norwegian cyclist) to Sylwia Zyzanska (a Polish archer). They come from 206 nations and regions, including the IOC Refugee Olympic Team, made up of 29 athletes who have been displaced from their home nations because of conflict or natural disaster, to compete in 33 different sports and 339 medal events. Four new sports were introduced at these Olympics - skateboarding, surfing, sport climbing and BMX freestyle. You might even have tried skateboarding or BMX or watched them in Rouken Glen Park.



OLYMPIC PARTY RINGS

Ingredients

225g plain flour
25g cornflour
125g butter, cut into small cubes
100g caster sugar
1 medium egg
1 tsp vanilla extract
300g royal icing sugar
Food colouring gel



Method

- 1. Place the plain flour, cornflour and butter bowl and make into breadcrumb consistency. Add the sugar, egg and vanilla extract and mix until combined. Gently knead into a disc. Wrap in clingfilm and chill for 20-30 minutes.
- 2. Heat the oven to 180°C/fan 160°C/gas mark 4. Lightly dust your work surface with flour, then roll out the dough until it's about the thickness of a £1 coin. Using a 7cm circle cutter, cut as many circles as you can from the dough. Using a smaller circle 3cm cutter, cut a small circle from the centre of each biscuit. Work the scraps into a ball, reroll and cut some more biscuits.
- 3. Transfer the biscuits to a baking tray lined with greaseproof paper. Bake in the oven for 10 minutes until they're pale golden. Transfer to a cooling rack and leave to cool completely.
- 4. Split the icing into four small bowls with 75g in each bowl. Add 1 tbsp water to each and mix until you have a smooth, runny icing. Colour each bowl of icing with a different colour. Dip each biscuit in a base colour and place on a cooling rack over some greaseproof paper to catch any excess icing. Using a spoon, immediately drizzle the biscuit with an alternate colour in horizontal lines, then use a toothpick to feather the icing, dragging the lines vertically until the icing feathers. Repeat until all the biscuits are all covered. You can vary the base and drizzle colour as you like. Leave to set for 30 minutes before serving or store in an airtight container for 3-4 days.

KIRK SESSION – WHAT DO THEY TALK ABOUT?

The Kirk Session held a virtual on line Zoom meeting on 1st June with 49 members attending and they received updates on a range of issues.

Worship: The Kirk Session noted that from 27th June there would be activities for children at the morning service over the summer months. Messy Church was hoping to hold an outdoor event in June before the schools stopped.

Outreach: The Kirk Session received an update on the Kwenderana Project. There are a number of initiatives under way including the sale of shawls and blankets, trying to continue the school fees project, and finding ways to encourage the take up of the Covid Vaccination programme in Malawi. Attention was drawn to the "Caring for Creation"studies in preparation for the COP 26 Climate Change Conference in November. Glasgow North East Foodbank has seen a increase in activity recently and donations of food and cash are continuing to come in. The Lodging House Mission is grateful for the weekly donations from Greenbank and the rotas on a Sunday for donations and midweek for delivery are continuing.

Finance: The Financial Position was updated and it was noted that Offering Income had decreased by 5.3% for the period to 16thth May. Due to the high proportion of offerings made by standing order the impact of the coronavirus had been mitigated affecting only weekly freewill and ordinary offering income. Other income was received from a Legacy, Clarkston After School Care and funeral donations. Fabric expenditure for the year to date totalled £3,200.

Fabric: The Property Convenor advised that the fortnightly grounds maintenance contract had started for the summer.

Fellowship: The Kirk Session noted that The Guild and Timeout hoped to resume meeting in the autumn. Chat rooms which follow Sunday service continue to be a good way to share news and get to know one another better.

Youth: The Sunday Club reported on the year's activities and reports were also received from the 2nd Clarkston Rainbows and 1st A Brownies.

Legacy: The Kirk Session received an update on the Legacy Project details which can be found on page 8.

Church and Church Halls: The Clerk advised that due to easing of restrictions the balcony in the church was now open on a Sunday morning. The Session approved the Church and Halls reopening committee becoming the Halls and Events Management Committee to allow the management of the halls to continue pending the sale.

General Assembly: An interesting and informative report was given by the Deputy Session Clerk and the Publicity Convenor who had attended the May General Assembly virtually. It was noted that the previous Presbytery Plan was now null and void and that a new one would be put in place by December 2022.

Other Matters: The Kirk Session dealt with a number of administrative matters including the following:-

The retiring Offerings for 21/22 were approved. The Editor of Good Neighbour and Good Neighbour distributors had advised they were stepping down from their roles and were thanked for their many years of service by the Moderator.

From meeting held on 22nd June 2021on Zoom

Prayer

It was confirmed that prayer would continue for our friends around the world, our congregations, churches, our friends in Malawi and for the continuation of the supply of vaccines. Additionally prayer was requested for our friends in Ekwendeni who have lost loved ones due to the pandemic and also to pray for people coming back to the church. In the Ekwendeni community a Sunday would be set aside to pray for friends in Scotland.

Blankets and Baby Hats

As yet no blankets appeared to have been sold, however donations of money had been made which were soon to be banked. A way would then have to be found to send this money to Malawi. Clothes and bedding were also requested by the Ekwendeni Group member.

There was no update on baby hats at this time.

Financial Situation

At present there were funds totalling £3256.94 in the bank. Accounts had already been forwarded to the committee and a copy of these would be sent to the Treasurer of each of the churches for church records.

Updates from the Ekwendeni Group

Christmas Parties

It was reported that the children's Christmas party, for which money had been sent by the Kwenderana Committee, had taken place however a party for the elderly had not been held as the money sent was used instead to purchase maize and food for them.

The Blind School's Bore Hole and a School Hall

It was also reported that the Blind School's bore hole needed to be repaired. The possibility of building a school hall was also being investigated. The hall would be attached to the head master's room and would enable teachers to have meetings.

Andrew's Mill

Andrew's Mill was working well and now had two employees.

The 2022 Trip

It was reported that it would be confirmed later in the year whether the 2022 trip would take place. There may be a way to raise further funds for the building of the classrooms.

The Committee was thanked for all that was being done for our friends in Malawi.

Requests made by the Kwenderana Committee

A member of the Kwenderana Committee requested the recording of a 3 to 5 minute talk by a member of the Ekwendeni Group that could then be shown to our congregations. This request was met with a positive response. The Kwenderana Committee also requested that other members of the Ekwendeni Group participate in a future zoom meeting.

Next Meeting

The next meeting would take place on 21st September at 7.30pm.

Addendum to Minutes

After the Ekwendeni Group member left the meeting it was agreed that at the current time clothes and bedding should not be sent over.

A decision was made to forward £375 immediately to replace the Blind School bore hole and next month £1800 would be forwarded for school fees.
