LIVE STREAMING OF WORSHIP

The technical equipment in the Church Sanctuary allows streaming via You Tube on Sunday Mornings.

Anyone wishing to view the service should click on the link, which is emailed to the congregation each week from the church office. The service can also be found by searching on You Tube. Once in 'You Tube' simply type in 'Greenbank Church Morning Service' and select the correct service.

Please note that with live streaming there is about a minutes delay before the service is transmitted from the church to people at home. Please be patient if it is a little later than 10.30am before the service starts.

Those attending worship in the Church Sanctuary on Sundays are also asked to note that services are being streamed. The camera being used to transmit images is downstairs, just in front of the balcony area. The cameras will film the pews directly in front of it, the side pews at the front and the chancel area of the church. Members of the congregation who do not wish to be 'caught on camera' are asked to select their seats appropriately.

ACCESSING SUNDAY WORSHIP LIVE BY TELEPHONE OR AS A RECORDING

For those who do not have a computer and are unable to attend church there is an option of using their telephone to listen to the service. Simply dial 0141 815 1166 at 10.30am if you wish to listen to the service live; alternatively you can listen to a recording of the most recent service from the Monday until the Saturday of the following week. When you dial to hear the most recent recording you will firstly hear a message from Jeanne and then some music. Please wait until the music stops and then, when asked to do so, press 1 on you telephone keypad.

Dear Friends,

By the time this magazine is printed and distributed we will have started the season of Advent – often known as the season of waiting. We all know what it is like to wait but not all waiting is the same. Waiting for a train or a bus entails an inactive waiting; waiting for a diagnosis incurs anxiety and worry; waiting for a holiday is happy and exciting; waiting to see loved ones is often filled with longing and anticipation. Advent, however, ushers into our awareness another kind of waiting, a kind of holy, expectant waiting for the promise of Jesus our Saviour, who has come but who also waits to be born in people's hearts and spirits.

In John's Gospel we are told: "The Light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it." I wonder what those words mean to you? On the first Christmas, Mary and Joseph might not have fully understood the significance of their baby's birth but with hindsight, we do. We know the hope which his life, death and resurrection brought to a waiting world. We have read the Christmas stories of faith about those who waited before us and we can draw on our own experiences of waiting for Christ's Christmas light to shine into the darkness of our lives and the life of this world.

This year has been a difficult one for our church both locally and nationally. Yet, amidst the challenges of a Presbytery plan that will inevitably bring change to local ministry and still another time of waiting for our Legacy Project to move forward, these waiting times have also provided us with the opportunity to exercise our faith and prove ourselves adaptable, flexible, resilient and hopeful.

I believe, as many of you do too, that God is leading Greenbank into a new time of life and ministry. My Christmas request, therefore, is to ask that you do not give up on the church. With this in mind, I invite you not to underestimate the value of your worshipping presence online or in-person, nor to undervalue the difference your work, prayers, witness and giving can make.

This Advent may we embrace the words of the Psalmist who cried out thousands of years as he patiently placed all waiting times into the loving hand of God;

Show us your ways, LORD, Teach us your paths. Guide us in your truth and teach us, For you are God our Saviour, And our hope is in you all day long. (Psalm 25)

THE LEGEND OF THE CHRISTMAS ROSE



MARSHMALLOW PENGUINS

- 200g bag marshmallows
- o 200g dark chocolate
- o handful yellow and orange smarties
- edible candy eyes (from the cake decorating section of the supermarket)



- 1. Line a baking tray or plate with grease proof or baking paper check that it will fit in your fridge first.
- 2. Break up the dark chocolate and place it in a microwave safe bowl. Melt the chocolate in the microwave in 30 second bursts, stirring between each one to ensure it melts evenly. Be careful not to overheat or burn the chocolate, heat only until just melted and smooth.
- 3. Carefully dip a marshmallow sideways in the chocolate and cover half of it. (The part without the chocolate is for the penguin's tummy.)
- 4. Now take another marshmallow and cover all of it in chocolate. Put it on top of the other one.
- 5. Repeat with the remaining marshmallows until you have created as many penguins as you need.
- 6. Put the tray in the fridge until the chocolate has completely hardened 10-15 minutes should do it.
- 7. Get an adult to cut the smarties in half with a sharp knife.
- 8. When the chocolate has set, re-melt the bowl of dark chocolate if needed.
- 9. Using a little of the dark chocolate, stick candy eyes and a smartie 'beak' onto each penguin.
- 10. Return to the fridge to set.

News and Updates

Dear Member,

As per the minister's email of 15th September, East Renfrewshire Council's Planning Applications Committee approved the church's planning application. However, the care home planning application on the church's north site was rejected.

The care home developer has carefully scrutinised the decision notice from the Council and their planning consultants have advised them to proceed with an appeal. That appeal process is now being set in motion. The appeal will be examined by a representative of the Scottish Government and is no longer in the hands of East Renfrewshire Council.

Unfortunately, there will be a further delay until the appeals process is completed. It is estimated this process could be completed at any time between April and September 2023, although our experience to date makes September the most likely date. If the appeal is successful, the land sale could then be completed.

Turning now to our own successful planning application, the Kirk Session has decided to await the outcome of the care home appeal before proceeding with any work in our plan. The current sanctuary and halls will remain as is at present with only the essential maintenance being undertaken. The reason for this is to ensure no funds are committed until we are certain of the sale of the land and the subsequent proceeds being received. If the appeal was unsuccessful, we do not wish to have spent funds already gratefully received from your donations/pledges if a different course of action is potentially required.

During this delay period, the Legacy Project Group will reassess the need for space and the community need and we may also look at gathering community feedback on the requirements post pandemic. The aim as always is to provide a sustainable future for the congregation and although frustrating, this further delay will not detract from our long term goal of leaving a lasting legacy to the next generation.
