Those attending worship in the Church Sanctuary on Sundays are also asked to note that services are being streamed. The camera being used to transmit images is downstairs, just in front of the balcony area. The cameras will film the pews directly in front of it, the side pews at the front and the chancel area of the church. Members of the congregation who do not wish to be 'caught on camera' are asked to select their seats appropriately.

ACCESSING SUNDAY WORSHIP LIVE BY TELEPHONE OR AS A RECORDING

For those who do not have a computer and are unable to attend church there is an option of using their telephone to listen to the service. Simply dial 0141 815 1166 at 10.30am if you wish to listen to the service live; alternatively you can listen to a recording of the most recent service from the Monday until the Saturday of the following week. When you dial to hear the most recent recording you will firstly hear a message from Jeanne and then some music. Please wait until the music stops and then, when asked to do so, press 1 on you telephone keypad.

Day in September

When we lose from our accustomed world Something that had been part of the map

By which we thought we might manage
To find a way along what seems like
An increasingly difficult path,
We know there is little point
In dwelling too long on the inevitability
That dictates that everything ends;
Yet knowing the way a story concludes
Doesn't make the actual ending
Any easier, nor transform to any extent
The way in which the playwright
Writes the concluding act, the final lines.

Our picture of the world we inhabit Is made up of the daily and the familiar, Of places that form the background Of our ordinary lives, always present, Like certain people we assume Will not really have to leave us, And then suddenly are no longer there, And we notice their loss, as if the lights Have been suddenly dimmed, Or a clock that was ticking Has fallen silent, its hands Stopping at an arbitrary And unremarkable time: A moment when most of us Were doing nothing special, Before we were told that something We knew must happen, has happened.

It is at such times that reaching The end of the final act, the point At which the stage curtain must fall, We realise what it is that we miss In the normal way we lead our lives; And we look for things that are permanent, And not glibly imitated, nor for sale: Duty and kindness, old-fashioned virtues That we should never have dreamed We did not need, but without which The play in which we all are actors Will not end well; we see these qualities, And understand, with sudden shock, How much we need one another, How much we want to do better With our bruised and suffering world, How much we want love, not selfishness, To be the note to which the orchestra tunes, The note taken up by the chorus, and sung Loud enough to drown out all the other noise.

Prayer Diary

The days, the months and the seasons pay no heed to the events which shape our world. They roll onwards relentlessly, following the rhythms set down for them at the very beginning of time. In our lifetimes we experience events which feel huge - we feel that things will never be the same again. Yet the natural world moves on, and sooner or later, our own equilibrium is restored.

Last month saw the death of a monarch who has been part of the majority of people's lives for as long as they have been alive. We all know how strange it feels when we lose someone close to us, and we turn round and expect them to be there. The next while is going to be as strange as that for us, even though we didn't actually know her. I know you will have had the Queen's family in your prayers these last few weeks, and please also remember others who are grieving, whether they have lost someone to illness, through violence, or an accident.

Please also give thanks for the service which Her Majesty gave throughout her life, and for the sense of duty she had, right up to the end of her life. And pray for the new King, as he steps into her footsteps, and ask that God gives him the strength and wisdom he needs.

Ask also that our new Prime Minister will find ways to help people as they struggle with the cost of living; and for all the businesses whose costs have soared beyond all belief.

Hold in your hearts the people of Pakistan, whose lives have been so devastated by the extensive flooding which has wiped out the life they've known. Just one more example of how our planets interlocking cycles have been disrupted.

And of course keep in your hearts everyone embroiled in conflicts the world over. No matter who is right or wrong. Every death brings grief to family and friends.

JUST A LUMP OF ROCK?

When King Charles III is crowned, much like his mother Queen Elizabeth II was 70 years ago, the stone will play an important part in his coronation. The Stone - also known as the Stone of Scone or the Coronation Stone - was once a sacred symbol in the crowning of Scottish kings King Edward I of England stole the stone from the Scots In 1296 during the First Scottish War of Independence. Edward 'Longshanks' then had it built into a new throne at Westminster. The stone was then used for coronations of English and United Kingdom kings and queens

So why was it important? According to legend t is actually the biblical Stone of Jacob from the Book of Genesis, which, according to the Old Testament, was what Jacob used as a pillow when he had his famous vision of a stairway leading to heaven, which became known as Jacob's Ladder. People thought it was a holy object which made a new king or queen, when they sat on it, ruler in the eyes of God.

The legend says the stone came all the way from Egypt to Ireland and was then captured by the Scots and taken to Iona which was a centre of Scottish Christianity. It was then moved to Scone, near Perth where Scottish kings were crowned. After Edward stole it, it ended up in Westminster Abbey in London. In 1950 the stone was stolen back by some Scottish students. It was returned to Westminster in 1952, although some people think that the stone taken back was a fake and that the original still resides in Scotland.

The was finally officially returned to Scotland a quarter of a century ago, on St Andrew's Day in November 1996, to Edinburgh Castle. However, it will now make a brief return to London for the coronation of King Charles III, in line with an agreement with the people of Scotland. Who would have thought a lump of rock could be so important?



It's starting to get a bit darker at night and in the mornings as Autumn arrives. All the leaves are turning red and golden and you should be able to find conkers on the trees, which is always good fun. When we were little we used to put a hole through the centre of them and thread them onto string! Maybe you have tried that too.

This month in Sunday Club and JAM we're going to hear stories from Luke 17&18, including 'the mustard seed' and 'Zacchaeus in the sycamore tree '.

On the first Sunday in October, it will be our Harvest Thanksgiving service, and we'll be thanking God for all of our food. We're also asked to bring donations of food to church for the Lodging House Mission so they can use them to make meals for homeless people.





WHO NEEDS A MOBILE!



Chimpanzees are not only one of our closest relatives, they're also one of the most intelligent - and just like us, it seems they enjoy staying in touch with friends but in a pretty unique way.

Scientists from the University of St Andrews have found that the animals drum out messages to one another on tree roots. In fact, they each have their own "signature drumming style". The chimps use this as a sort of 'social media' - with the rhythms allowing them to send information over long distances, revealing who they are, where they are and what they are doing! The chimps were also sneaky because they could disguise their location by changing the drum beat.

The chimps mostly use their feet, but also their hands to make the sound, which carries more than a kilometre through the dense rainforest. Each chimpanzee had its own style of drumming - with some preferring straightforward rock beats while others grooved to more jazzlike rhythms!


