

LIVE STREAMING OF WORSHIP

The technical equipment in the Church Sanctuary has been changed to allow streaming via You Tube on Sunday Mornings in place of Zoom.

Anyone wishing to view the service should click on the link, which is emailed to the congregation each week from the church office. The service can also be found by searching on You Tube. Once in 'You Tube' simply type in 'Greenbank Church Morning Service' and select the correct service.

Please note that with live streaming there is about a minutes delay before the service is transmitted from the church to people at home. Please be patient if it is a little later than 10.30am before the service starts.

Those attending worship in the Church Sanctuary on Sundays are also asked to note that services are being streamed. The camera being used to transmit images is downstairs, just in front of the balcony area. The cameras will film the pews directly in front of it, the side pews at the front and the chancel area of the church. Members of the congregation who do not wish to be 'caught on camera' are asked to select their seats appropriately.

ACCESSING SUNDAY WORSHIP LIVE BY TELEPHONE OR AS A RECORDING

For those who do not have a computer and are unable to attend church there is an option of using their telephone to listen to the service. Simply dial 0141 815 1166 at 10.30am if you wish to listen to the service live; alternatively you can listen to a recording of the most recent service from the Monday until the Saturday of the following week. When you dial to hear the most recent recording you will firstly hear a message from Jeanne and then some music. Please wait until the music stops and then, when asked to do so, press 1 on you telephone keypad.

Dear Friends,

At the beginning of May, I met with an oral history PhD student working on a placement at the Alasdair Gray Archive. He was in the process of recording memories of objects, people and places involved in Alasdair's life and work and had identified the Greenbank mural as an important piece to focus on as part of a forthcoming podcast series. He wanted to visit the mural and bring along a friend of Alasdair's called Gordon Lennox who was originally involved in the commission of the mural so that he could talk about the process of the painting in situ and record his thoughts and memories. It was a fascinating visit. The archivist hopes to make a digital handout that we can print and share with the congregation and visitors too.

As he told the story, at one-point Gordon Lennox pointed to the black raven high in the tree above the heads of Orpah, Naomi and Ruth and said that Alasdair had placed it there as a symbol of death depicting the sorrow of the three women bereaved of any provider. Gordon Lennox also said that the people portraying the characters of the story were close friends and family of Alasdair Gray and that the Minister marrying Ruth and Moab was Mr Fulton, the Minister to whom the mural was dedicated. He also spoke about Alasdair Gray's upbringing and the Christian understanding he brought to the painting of the mural. For the first time, I saw the rainbow depicted in the mural as bridging the three women's sorrow and signifying God's promise at work within their lives as they moved on to play their part in God's unending story of love.

I was struck by the way the archive visit opened my eyes to viewing the Alasdair Gray mural differently. I spoke about this a few days later, with the members of the Saturday Book club, whilst reflecting on our reading of 'Why did Jesus, Moses, the Buddha and Mohammed Cross the Road" by author Brian D McLaren. This book suggests that Christians should open their eyes to the tendency they have of putting themselves and other religions into two camps: them and us.

Sadly, Christians have a long history of not knowing what to do with them. Over the centuries, those referred to as 'them' have changed. 'Them' go to a different school, come from another country, speak a foreign language, have a different skin tone ... I am sure you can add some examples of your own. The author of the book we've been reading asks how we might discover, live, teach and practice a Christian identity that is both tolerant and benevolent towards others and to consider how we use and join the words "them" and "us"? So, who is 'them' for you?

I am reminded of the little poem by Edwin Markham called 'Outwitted' which says:

"He drew a circle that shut me out -Heretic, rebel, a thing to flout. But Love and I had the wit to win: We drew a circle that took him in!"

God's love is always working in and through people in ways we can never anticipate. In a world where division and conflict abound, may God give us grace to open our eyes and see that there is no 'them' existing beyond the circle of love.

TRIBUTE TO JOHN CROMBIE

Read in Greenbank Parish Church on Sunday, 8th May, 2022

One of our elders, John Crombie, died on the 28th February this year. Today we pay tribute to John, and acknowledge John's life and the service he gave to this church as an elder.

John was born on 21st August 1934. John, who had an older brother, Jim, spent his childhood years in Govan and in the Paisley Road West area of the city, where he was raised by his parents, Jim and Christina.

John's parents were members of White Memorial Church, and John attended the Lifebuoys and Boys' Brigade there.

John was educated at Lorne Street Primary School, and later at Bellahouston Academy. His first job when he left school was with American Express, however his employment with that company was interrupted by a period of National Service in Egypt. After National Service, John returned to American Express, and then moved on to work for various airlines, and in the general travel business. John finished his career in 1999, when he was the Business Travel Manager for Honeywell Controls, responsible for making their travel arrangements.

John met Joyce in 1960, and they were married in Greenbank Church in September 1963. Their first home was in Manchester, where their sons, Alan and David, were born. Their daughter, Gillian, was born after their return to Scotland, to a house in Stamperland Drive. A further house move took the family home to Busby Road in Clarkston. Latterly, Joyce and John downsized to a flat in Buchanan Drive, Newton Mearns.

Whilst living in Stamperland, the family attended Stamperland Church, and it was there that John was ordained as an elder in 1975. John was admitted to the Kirk Session of Greenbank Church in 1986, and he received his 30 year-long service certificate in 2005. John attended Kirk Session meetings diligently, and he was a driver in the Church Transport Service for around 20 years.

Throughout his working life, John had many opportunities to travel, and his destinations included the East Coast of America, South America, and the Far East. One memorable occasion was when he took an inaugural flight on Concorde, from London to Bahrain, and surprised his brother, Jim, who lived there. John arrived, unannounced, and phoned Jim, asking him simply if he fancied meeting up for lunch.

John and Joyce travelled a lot in retirement, and one special trip was to the West Coast of America. John also had a great love of going on trips to the North of Scotland. Because he was so well travelled, John had a wonderful knowledge of geography. He was a formidable opponent in Trivial Pursuit, and his family always hoped that he wouldn't get the geography questions when playing against him!

John joined Clarkston Bowling Club in 1980, and became Club President in 2004. He was also a member of West of Scotland Indoor Bowling. Bowls was a sport which John enjoyed playing very much. He enjoyed most sports, especially rugby, which he played at school. He was a great reader of anything to do with travel or military history, and was often to be found relaxing in a corner reading a book.

But above all else in his life, John's affections were always firmly focussed on his family: Alan and Karen, and their family Sara, Emma, Vicki, and little Aila; David and Claire, and grandsons, Ewan and Rory; and John enjoyed many visits with Joyce to Hertfordshire to visit Gillian and Brandon, and his grandsons, Gareth and Andrew. Family meant everything to John, and he always made time for them. He was always interested to know how they were, and what they were doing.

John Crombie was a quiet, peaceful, kind, good natured and well respected gentleman, who kept his own counsel. John will be missed, not least by his family, who have many good memories of happy family times spent together. We will hold John in our hearts forever, and he will not be forgotten. Today we give thanks for the life and service of John Crombie, and we commend Joyce, Alan, David, Gillian, and the wider family, to the love of our Lord Jesus Christ.

News and Updates

CHURCH TRANSPORT SERVICE VOLUNTEER DRIVERS AND CHAPERONES REQUIRED

After over two years of rest, caused by the pandemic, the Church Transport Service is returning - but in a different way. We have very much missed those who relied on our transport service to allow them to attend church, and we look forward to them joining us for worship, in person, again.

In the past, a wonderful team of loyal drivers provided transport in their own cars, and this type of arrangement may feature again in the future. We are extremely grateful to all of the drivers who provided this service. But for the time being, the plan is to make use of a minibus provided by Age Concern Eastwood to transport our passengers. Rotas will be required, and the aim is to run this fortnightly in the first instance **commencing on Sunday, 22nd May** and see how we get on.

In order for this to work and for it to be sustainable, we require volunteer drivers and chaperones, please - we have only one driver and one chaperone at the moment!

To satisfy insurance requirements, drivers must be **under the age of 70** and have the **required driving permissions on their driving licence** to allow them to drive a vehicle of this type.

Drivers will follow a route, and operate the ease of access rising platform at the rear of the bus. The platform provides an alternative means of accessing the minibus should the stair access at the front door prove unsuitable for the passenger. Volunteer drivers will undergo a brief driving assessment by Age Concern Eastwood, and will also receive training in the operation of the rising platform.

All that is required of chaperones is a smile, a friendly disposition, and a caring, calm attitude. Chaperones will welcome passengers onto the bus; accompany them on the rising platform, if it is used; provide wheelchair access, if required, to/from bus/church/home; and provide guidance to the driver when the bus is being manoeuvred.

The capacity of the minibus is currently limited to 9 people, comprising 7 passengers, the driver, and chaperone, and other covid hygiene guidelines are recommended by Age Concern Eastwood for bus users.

Please consider offering your services for this vital aspect of our worship and fellowship. We are sure that there will be lots of new friendships forged and older ones rekindled as we travel together in the bus on our journey of faith. We are all ageing, and may appreciate the church transport service ourselves one day, so let's make this work well by becoming involved.

KIRK SESSION: WHAT DO THEY TALK ABOUT?

Kirk Session met on Monday, 25th April 2022.

Devotions: The meeting, as always, commenced with a short act of worship led by an elder. It is hoped that all elders will consider participating in this.

Tribute: Members of Kirk Session stood in silence and paid tribute to **John Crombie**, one of our elders, who died on **28**th **February**. A tribute to John was read in Church on 8th May, and is included elsewhere in this edition of Good Neighbour.

Reports from the Worship, Outreach, Stewardship, Fellowship, and Youth coordinators were presented. As services in both Williamwood House and Clarkston House care homes are resuming, it was noted that volunteers to participate in these services are required from Greenbank. Preparations for our Community picnic to mark Her Majesty The Queen's Platinum Jubilee are in hand. Repairs to our very old church heating pipework continue, although the church heating itself is now working well. Our treasurer gave a sobering update regarding increases in our energy costs of an additional 388% for gas and 220% for electricity which would amount to an additional £15,000 per annum. The Church Transport coordinator advised that arrangements were evolving which may allow church transport to start again using the Age Concern Eastwood minibus, to which Greenbank has access, at no cost to us. Volunteer drivers (aged under 70) are required. More information to follow when confirmed.

As part of the **Presbytery Mission Plan** update, Kirk Session approved the inclusion of St Aidan's Scottish Episcopal Church in our church cluster, and learned that Greenbank had been cited to a special meeting of Glasgow Presbytery on May 3rd, when zones would be formally agreed.

Legacy: Kirk Session received an update from the Legacy Project Group. It was noted that there had been several meetings with the Planning Department at East Renfrewshire Council, and that further information on the new Community benefits offered by our proposed project, requested by the council, had been provided to them. There is a hope that our application may be considered at a meeting of the Planning Department in June.

June Communion: Peter Liddell, Deputy Session Clerk, explained the arrangements for the June Communion. There will be a return to the use of cut bread and poured wine served in disposable cups; there will be less formality in elders' dress; fewer elders will serve communion; members will sit only in alternate pews, allowing elders to serve the elements by walking in the empty alternate rows, and removing the need for the elements to be passed from member to member; there will be no Preparatory Service.

Greenbank's Safeguarding Coordinator, **Graeme Rae**, gave an update on current requirements and training which is available. Kirk Session learned that **Jane Livingston** is stepping down as **Worship Coordinator**, and that **Colin McAughtrie** has stepped down as **Health and Safety Coordinator**. Jane and Colin were thanked for their valuable contributions to the work of the church. New coordinators for these areas are required.

Kirk Session received an update from the treasurer on a meeting which had taken place with Dave Kendall, Chief Officer of the Church of Scotland, following Sunday worship on Sunday, 10th April. At the meeting, representatives of Kirk Session expressed concern at our high, unsustainable level of Ministries and Missions contributions, given the current economic climate, whilst acknowledging our continued commitment to supporting poorer churches. A response from the Chief Officer is awaited.

Kirk Session received an update on the **Kirk Session Review** which is being conducted by a group of elders. This group is contacting other churches to establish how their Kirk Sessions operate, and to look for different and improved ways of doing things. A questionnaire for elders is also being considered, to help inform good practice and to help enable elders. As part of this review, a proposal was also put forward to revise district visiting, in light of the fact that there are districts without elders, and elders with more than one district. Discussion on this continues.

Kirk Session learned that the closing service of Stamperland Church will take place on Sunday, 26th June, and gave approval for the congregation of Greenbank to attend Stamperland for worship on that day as a gesture of support, subject to approval by Glasgow Presbytery. Further details of this are included elsewhere in this edition of Good Neighbour.

Our minister Jeanne will attend the General Assembly from Saturday, 21st May until Thursday, 26th May.

GAIL'S STORY

Hiya, My name is Gail and I am a recovering alcoholic from the west end of Glasgow.

I had a good upbringing and a good family home but I never felt comfortable in my own skin. I used to drink and take drugs to take me away from my own head. I believe I suffered mental health long before my addiction took hold. I have three beautiful children who have been with me through everything.

I lost my brother to cancer when he was 22 and I couldn't cope with the grief and I started drinking alone. It was causing problems when I was drunk. I was always the one to start fights at parties and in the end I stopped getting invited.

After my relationship broke down, due to my drinking, things got worse. I was partying more and I would take anything offered just so I didn't have to feel the hurt and face the reality that my life was spiralling out of control. Then my best friend passed away and I knew I had to change, but then I couldn't stop. I was in and out of hospital. I was self-harming and my mental health was at breaking point.

My mum and dad tried everything to keep me sober, and I kept going back to the drink until one day my care manager came and removed my kids into care. She took them to my mum's and I knew I had hit rock bottom

So I'd spent 10 weeks begging for help until a bed became available at Rainbow House. I was so scared but looking back it was the best decision I ever made. I learnt about my addiction and what I suffered from and I was supported by the best team of staff and volunteers so that when I



completed the programme at Rainbow I knew I just wanted to get back. The volunteers helped others and I wanted to be in the same position. It was then I went to Whiteinch Move On where I continued to get support for my anxiety and my housing. The boys started staying overnight and when I got offered a flat near both services, it was the start of my volunteer journey. I love volunteering at Rainbow and I gives me structure to my days. I've learnt so much since I started there. I found out that I'm good at organising, office admin, as well as peer support groups and now I help with the new volunteer training programme.

My kids are now back in my full time care. We have a lovely home and I love getting up in the morning and going to Rainbow. I have been volunteering for about 15 months, and I will be 2 years abstinent in May.

"Gail is one of the many women who came through our services in 2020/21. Our services strive to make recovery accessible for women as we see so many barriers to them being able to choose residential services. Barriers could be caring for their children, family caring commitments or lack of self-worth.

Our female volunteers are an asset to our Glasgow Recovery Services. They help us show services are safe places. They are positive role models that women being supported can relate to. It's a privilege for us to work alongside volunteers and see them develop. We have seen Gail take the opportunity to do our training course and gain experience in a social care setting. She is now co-facilitating the Volunteer Training while continuing to be a a dedicated volunteer with us."

Finally, a word of thanks to all who have supported the Legacy Project over this past year in any way, including lending professional expertise; pledging funds; raising money; or assisting with clearing and tidying. Looking forward, please continue to pray for our Legacy Project.

Timothy was asked if he had questions and he asked how we were feeling about the war in Ukraine. He expressed concerned and the conversations continued about the dreadful situation and the concern of both people in Scotland and in Malawi.

Timothy was asked about the maize mill and he said it is still operation but they felt if they have a second one they could work in tandem, also if one needed repaired they would still have one in working order. The profits from the maize mill have not been as good as they once were.

Timothy advised that he has had a request from Netherlee Primary School to allow their children to write to the children in Ekwendeni.
