LIVE STREAMING OF WORSHIP

The technical equipment in the Church Sanctuary allows streaming via You Tube on Sunday Mornings.

Anyone wishing to view the service should click on the link, which is emailed to the congregation each week from the church office. The service can also be found by searching on You Tube. Once in 'You Tube' simply type in 'Greenbank Church Morning Service' and select the correct service.

Please note that with live streaming there is about a minutes delay before the service is transmitted from the church to people at home. Please be patient if it is a little later than 10.30am before the service starts.

Those attending worship in the Church Sanctuary on Sundays are also asked to note that services are being streamed. The camera being used to transmit images is downstairs, just in front of the balcony area. The cameras will film the pews directly in front of it, the side pews at the front and the chancel area of the church. Members of the congregation who do not wish to be 'caught on camera' are asked to select their seats appropriately.

ACCESSING SUNDAY WORSHIP LIVE BY TELEPHONE OR AS A RECORDING

For those who do not have a computer and are unable to attend church there is an option of using their telephone to listen to the service. Simply dial 0141 815 1166 at 10.30am if you wish to listen to the service live; alternatively you can listen to a recording of the most recent service from the Monday until the Saturday of the following week. When you dial to hear the most recent recording you will firstly hear a message from Jeanne and then some music. Please wait until the music stops and then, when asked to do so, press 1 on you telephone keypad.

Dear Friends,

Last week I joined the Presbytery pilgrimage to Lindisfarne, the Holy Island given by King Oswald of Lindisfarne to the Irish monk St Aidan so that he could establish a monastery there in 635 AD. Aidan received his religious training on Iona and the Lindisfarne monastery that he established became a renowned centre of religious education. St Cuthbert was born

the same year in which Aidan founded the monastery on Lindisfarne.

Cuthbert's life changed when he was about 17 years old as he gazed into a night sky when he saw a light descend to Earth and then return, escorting, he believed, a human soul to heaven. The date was August 31st 651AD - the night that Aidan died. This was Cuthbert's moment of decision and after his novice training and service as a monk at Melrose Abbey, Cuthbert returned to Lindisfarne to be the prior there. By all account Cuthbert was an outgoing, cheerful and compassionate. He died in 689AD and was subsequently highly acclaimed and the subject of an enormously popular following.

A narrow road was built to Lindisfarne in 1954 but until then long vertical poles marking a 3-mile crossing place were the only indication of the safest way to reach the island. Over the years many thousands of pilgrims have followed those poles across the seabed. They have walked in the footsteps of their Christian ancestors listening to the unusual singing all around them, from the thousands of seals who lie basking on sandbars between Lindisfarne and the mainland.

Thus, I found myself silently walking to Lindisfarne last week across the sand and mud, listening to nature and reflecting on the many thousands of Christians who had walked this route before me. Without the poles guiding the way it would have been very difficult. The sight of a wellington boot stuck in quicksand, presumably unable to be retrieved its owner, amidst the mud and deep pools of water seemed very symbolic of my own faith journey. Just as I needed those poles to guide me safely across the seabed I reflected on how I had needed God to not only safely guide me through many of life's circumstances but also how this quidance had most often come through those who had walked in faith before me and with me.

The tradition of canonizing saints like Aidan and Cuthbert from Lindisfarne has a long church history but it is rooted in the experience of people who recognized the Christ like qualities of those who made the love of God real to them in special ways. Such people are often hidden among the ordinary and the foolish; the gentle and the disturbing; the forgotten and the unforgettable and may even at times appear in an occasional glance in the mirror. How we remember those who came before us in faith; the biblical characters, the saints of the church, the ordinary men and woman, both known and unknown to us, make us and our church what we are today and what we will be in the future.

So, may God continue to guide all of us on the journey that we have embarked on, as a church and as individuals, in the name and for the sake of Jesus Christ, that those to come may remember us as beloved ancestors in faith.

Saying Goodbye (part of the Mariposa Trust) are delighted to be coming to Scotland in September with four baby loss remembrance and support services (part of a Nationwide chain of events).

The Mariposa Trust's core objective is to support people who have lost babies at any stage of pregnancy, at birth, or in infancy. It was founded in 2012, by Zoe and Andy Clark-Coates, who saw a critical lack of support for people like them, who had gone through baby loss. With over 258,000 babies being lost yearly in the UK alone, the charity needed to be able to offer not only a comprehensive package of befriending and support but also national baby loss remembrance services (called Saying Goodbye Services), for people to join together and remember the children they had lost. 6 years on, over 130 services have taken place at Cathedrals and Minsters across the UK, US, and France, and 2022 will see 20 services across England, Wales, Scotland and Ireland.

So who is the service for?

Anyone who has either personally lost a baby at any stage of pregnancy, at birth, or in early years, or who has been affected by family members or friends' loss. Whether the loss was recent or 80 years ago, everyone is welcome to attend. We have also extended the services, and gladly welcome anyone who is grieving the fact that they haven't had children. This may be due to circumstance, infertility, or for other reasons - but all are welcome. Babies and children are also invited to come with their families, as the Saying Goodbye service is truly a family event for all.

We know that as 1 in 4 women suffer miscarriage and baby loss, you will have contact with a significant number of people who have either personally suffered baby loss, or who have a partner or family member that has, so we wanted to ask if you would help promote the service.

The Belt System

The Dan (Black Belt) progression continues from 1st Dan (Shodan, or 'beginning Dan') to the higher Dan grades where the highest Dan Grade in our Association is 7th Dan.

Why do people do Karate? Karate training will improve your stamina, strength, speed and flexibility. The intensity of the training will improve your overall fitness and body awareness and strengthen and develop almost every muscle in your body. Karate is a great activity for improving your mental health.

AUTUMN'S ON ITS WAY

Did you have a good summer? There is still a month to go before autumn arrives according to the calendar but we will soon begin to recognise the signs that it is on its way like the carpet of bright red leaves in this photo in Eaglesham. So, have you ever wondered how bright green can change to bright orange, yellow or red? Here's how!

ng produced by the leaf. They help the leaf collect food. The three pigments that colour leaves are reds and pinks). How strong the colour is depends a lot on the weather. Cold nights destroy the

green pigment so the leaf fades to yellow. but if temperatures stay above freezing, there is more red pigment increases and the leaves take on a red colour. They also become more red if the weather is dry and sunny.

Trees look lovely with all their leaves on them but in autumn as you can see from the photo they fall off. When trees shed their leaves, it helps keep the moisture in their branches and trunk, instead of drying out and dying. A tree without leaves is really asleep and needs less energy to stay alive. Leafless trees are also better able to stand winter storms as strong winds can move through the branches more easily.

So, think back to summer weather. How red do you think the autumn leaves will be this year?

NORTHERN LIGHTS SEASON

Did you know that September/October is the best time to see an Aurora Borealis? The best conditions to view the lights are when the sky is dark and clear of any clouds. Cloud cover blocks the view of the light. The best chance of viewing one is as far away from man-made light as possible in areas away from towns and cities, facing towards the north. The northern lights are most active March/April and September/October and the further north you are the better but this photo was taken in the middle of August over the town of Dunbar, which is a wee bit less north than Clarkston.



STRANGE BUT TRUE

Did you know nothing whatsoever happened in British history between 3 and 13 September 1752? It all happened because of a change in the way the calendar was calculated.

The Gregorian calendar

The Gregorian calendar is the one most used nowadays. It is named after Pope Gregory XIII who introduced it in 1582. It has a leap year every four years (or more precisely, 97 leap years every 400 years). This means that the year matches closely with what is called the astronomical year which is 365.24219 days so that it is just one day out every 3,300 years. (How on earth did they work that out?)

The Julian Calendar

Up until 1753, the calendar we used in Britain was the Julian Calendar. It was based on the time it takes for the Earth to rotate around the Sun, and so was less accurate than the Gregorian Calendar. The Julian Calendar was 365.25 days long, which was a wee bit too long, and so over time the calendar fell out of line with the seasons.

All change!

In 1752 Britain decided to correct this by not using the Julian calendar any longer and adopting the Gregorian

calendar. By doing so, **3rd September instantly became 14th September** - and as a result, nothing whatsoever happened in British history between 3 and 13 September 1752! Imagine how disappointed someone would have been if they had had a birthday between those dates that year!
