
LIVE STREAMING OF WORSHIP

The technical equipment in the Church Sanctuary allows streaming via You Tube on Sunday Mornings.

Anyone wishing to view the service should click on the link, which is emailed to the congregation each week from the church office. The service can also be found by searching on You Tube. Once in 'You Tube' simply type in 'Greenbank Church Morning Service' and select the correct service. Please note that with live streaming there is about a minutes delay before the service is transmitted from the church to people at home. Please be patient if it is a little later than 10.30am before the service starts.

Those attending worship in the Church Sanctuary on Sundays are also asked to note that services are being streamed. The camera being used to transmit images is downstairs, just in front of the balcony area. The cameras will film the pews directly in front of it, the side pews at the front and the chancel area of the church. Members of the congregation who do not wish to be 'caught on camera' are asked to select their seats appropriately.

ACCESSING SUNDAY WORSHIP LIVE BY TELEPHONE OR AS A RECORDING For those who do not have a computer and are unable to attend church there is an option of using their telephone to listen to the service. Simply dial 0141 815 1166 at 10.30am if you wish to listen to the service live; alternatively you can listen to a recording of the most recent service from the Monday until the Saturday of the following week. When you dial to hear the most recent recording you will firstly hear a message from Jeanne and then some music. Please wait until the music stops and then, when asked to do so, press 1 on you telephone keypad.

Dear Friends

For almost twenty years now, I have used those words at the beginning of my Good Neighbour letter. They have been words truly meant and during the time I have been the Minister of Greenbank I have tried to be a good friend to everyone - albeit more successfully with some than with others.

I became a follower of Jesus in the context of friendship but more importantly my sense of calling, belonging and purpose has persisted because of the friendships of those who share a similar desire to follow the commandments of Jesus Christ. I feel fortunate to have made friends at Greenbank who are younger, older and a similar age to me who have been receiving, giving and above all supportive and encouraging. I also feel fortunate to have a number of friendships in my life that go back decades through which I can call to mind many of my life's events and more importantly friendships that preserve my mind and spirit and keep me grounded.

Jesus tells us "You are my friends if you do what I command you. I do not call you servants any longer, because the servant does not know what the master is doing; but I have called you friends." [John 15:14]. Jesus makes it clear that friendship is reciprocal and accepting His friendship inevitably means that, as Christians, we are called to create healing, loving and caring relationships with one another. Who are your friends? What do they mean to you? What kind of friend are you?

Sadly, I recently had a conversation with a member of another church who told me about a conversation with someone who sat beside her one Sunday. The person said she was seeking another church to worship in because the one she was a member of was cliquey and unfriendly. I am truly sorry about this and dearly hope that this wouldn't be said of Greenbank and that everyone has supportive, caring and encouraging church friends who also give them the opportunity to be a good friend too - such friends are a holy gift.

As he has befriended us, Jesus behoves all of us to befriend one another. To those cliques [imagined or otherwise] that make others feel left out and to those who find themselves sitting in any church thinking it is unfriendly, I offer this reminder. There are people in every church who want to be your friend. They're sitting in front of you, behind you and beside you. They're in church every week and perhaps one of things that are preventing the creation of any new friendships is your reluctance to reach out to your fellow Christians.

Early in the 19th century, a Church Minister called John Fawcett wrote the hymn, "Blest Be the Tie that Binds," to convey his own and his wife's friendship with the people in the church where they chose to serve Jesus for 54 years. John Fawcett wrote "Blest be the tie that binds; our hearts in Christian love; the fellowship of kindred minds; is like to that above. Like John Fawcett, may we all know the blessing of friendship, those close and far away. May we be blessed by the friendships we have and by those we have yet to make. Above all, may we be 'blest by the tie that binds'— the love of God in Jesus Christ who promises to befriend each one of us in every moment and into eternity.

Working in collaboration with East Renfrewshire Council and HeyGirls products, we recently ordered and received a supply of tampons and sanitary towels, free of charge. All of HeyGirls products are ethically sourced and organic. This partnership working is really trying to push the message that these products are available for people to take, no matter how much they need, and whenever they are needed.
