

Our minister, Jeanne, is retiring in October. The last Sunday service she will preach will be on Sunday 1st October, which is also our Harvest Thanksgiving service. This date marks the 20th Anniversary of Jeanne's Ordination and Induction as Greenbank's minister. We would encourage you to come to church if you can on this special day. We are sure Jeanne would appreciate you being there.

There will be a short Farewell Social held in the church soon after the morning service, followed by a Sandwich Lunch in the church halls.

LIVE STREAMING OF WORSHIP

The technical equipment in the Church Sanctuary allows streaming via You Tube on Sunday Mornings.

Anyone wishing to view the service should click on the link, which is emailed to the congregation each week from the church office. The service can also be found by searching on You Tube. Once in 'You Tube' simply type in 'Greenbank Church Morning Service' and select the correct service. Please note that with live streaming there is about a minutes delay before the service is transmitted from the church to people at home. Please be patient if it is a little later than 10.30am before the service starts.

Those attending worship in the Church Sanctuary on Sundays are also asked to note that services are being streamed. The camera being used to transmit images is downstairs, just in front of the balcony area. The cameras will film the pews directly in front of it, the side pews at the front and the chancel area of the church. Members of the congregation who do not wish to be 'caught on camera' are asked to select their seats appropriately.

ACCESSING SUNDAY WORSHIP LIVE BY TELEPHONE OR AS A RECORDING For those who do not have a computer and are unable to attend church there is an option of using their telephone to listen to the service. Simply dial 0141 815 1166 at 10.30am if you wish to listen to the service live; alternatively you can listen to a recording of the most recent service from the Monday until the Saturday of the following week. When you dial to hear the most recent recording you will firstly hear a message from Jeanne and then some music. Please wait until the music stops and then, when asked to do so, press 1 on you telephone keypad.

Tuesday 12th September and, as is the custom, anyone from our congregation, who would like to attend

this meeting, is invited to come along to Burnside Blairbeth Church for 7pm. You won't have to stay for

the whole meeting just very first part of it.

Meantime, as I continue to be your Minister for the next few weeks, let us trust that God will continue to

guide each one of us according to his plan, come what may, and let us commit ourselves and each other

into his loving care.

9TH SEPTEMBER IS TEDDY BEAR DAY



Do you have a teddy bear? These soft, cuddly toys were first made 121 years ago in 1902. They were called after a President of the USA called Theodore Roosevelt whose first name was shortened to Teddy. He became connected to bears when he was out hunting and refused to shoot a bear that had been especially chosen for him to kill as he thought it was unfair. Teddy's bear became famous when a drawing of the event with a small, cute bear was printed in in a newspaper. An American, called Morris Michton, made a small, cute bear and put it in his shop window and called it 'Teddy's Bear'. The bear was a huge success and soon he was making more of them which led to him creating the Ideal Toy Company.

At the same time, a German company, called Steiff, also produced a stuffed bear. These Steiff bears have become very famous and collectable, although lots of toy manufacturers also now make teddy bears as they are a very popular toy.



HOW TO DRY APPLES



Autumn is the season in the UK when apples ripen on trees. Dried apples are great as snacks and in lunch boxes.

Use ripe eating or cooking apples. Peel, core and cut into 6mm (1/5in) rings. Drop these into 2 litres (31/2 pints) water mixed with a tablespoon salt to prevent browning. Shake well and thread on to sticks, which can be supported on trays before being placed in an oven of no more than 60°C/140°F/Gas Mark 1/4. At a steady heat the apples should take four to six hours to dry out. They are ready when their texture is similar to chamois leather. When the fruit has dried, leave it at room temperature overnight, then store in an airtight container.

News and Updates

LEGACY PROJECT

It was this time last year that we received planning permission for the work we wanted to do at Greenbank. You will recall that at that time, the care home's application for their development was not approved and that prompted an appeal being submitted to the Reporter in Edinburgh. On 5 May 2023 we received the fantastic news from the Scottish Government Planning and Environmental Appeals Division to confirm the appeal for the care home development had been successful. This is the news we had hoped for and allowed us to press on with the Legacy Project.

Over the summer, the Legacy Project Group continued to meet to refine the designs for the extension to the church and to finalise the contractual arrangements for the sale of the land to the care home developer. That work continues with the aim as always to provide a sustainable future for the congregation. Our long term goal is to leave a lasting legacy for the next generation.

It is difficult to be too precise about timings, however, the projected timeline is noted below as presented to the congregation at our Annual Stated Meeting on 21 June 2023:

LEGACY PROJECT - PROJECTED TIMELINE

PHASE 1 - EXTENSION & EXTERNAL WORKS

- Detailed design June-Oct 2023
- Building warrant application Dec 2023
- Construction information and tendering Dec 2023- May 2024
- Completion of land sale and contractor appointment May 2024
- Start of construction July 2024
- Completion and Handover May 2025

PHASE 2 - SANCTUARY

- Start of construction June 2025
- Completion & handover April 2026

Since the congregation approved the plan to proceed in November 2020 costs have of course continued to rise. Inflation in construction costs has been particularly steep and so the Session decided that the best way forward was to proceed in two phases as you can see from the projected timetable.

The Legacy Project Group continue to apply for grants for the legacy project. Overall grants totalling £72,000 have now been awarded and £46,000 of this sum has been received to date.

Working in collaboration with East Renfrewshire Council and HeyGirls products, we recently ordered and received a supply of tampons and sanitary towels, free of charge. All of HeyGirls products are ethically sourced and organic. This partnership working is really trying to push the message that these products are available for people to take, no matter how much they need, and whenever they are needed.

It is our hope that Greenbank Church will also be registered on the MyPeriodApp, which allows users to find locations in their community which provide free period products.

The items are currently located in the Ladies Toilets and on a shelf in the corridor beside the Fraser Hall.

HIROSHIMA-NAGASAKI UNITE PEACE ART PROJECT

78 years ago, on 9th August 1945, an atomic bomb was dropped on Nagasaki, Japan. Soon after, Japan agreed to unconditional surrender, and the 2nd world war ended on 2nd September 1945.



On the evening of Tuesday, 15th August, Greenbank was proud and delighted to host a very special event. This was a concert to mark the beginning of a peace art festival. The performers at the concert were Gen Akashi, a Japanese 11-string guitarist, professor and composer; and Ayako Hidetani, a Japanese literature recitalist. The concert was devised by them, and it is their future vision to convey the message of peace through the arts, and to find alternative ways of conveying negative memories, like those of the horror of the atomic bombings, through the arts.

The couple were visiting Scotland briefly, and had held a similar concert in St Andrews. Greenbank was approached by Rev Dr Donald MacEwan, the son of one of our members, and chaplain to the University of St Andrews, to enquire if we would be willing to host a concert. We jumped at this opportunity.

I can only describe the atmosphere created by the concert in the church sanctuary as calm, reflective, and extremely peaceful, enhanced by the sunlight streaming through the central stained glass window in the chancel. A wonderful selection of music, some of it familiar, was played for us by Gen Akashi on the 11 string guitar. What a joy and privilege it was to listen to the same piece of music by J.S. Bach which had been played by a cellist at the time of the dismantling of the Berlin Wall. It is the hope of Gen and Ayako that music and the arts will help to transcend differences, and to heal division.

The sound produced had an amazing resonance, clarity and tone, and I could have listened to it for a long time. It was very moving and relaxing. At times Ayako Hidetani gave a spoken recital while Gen played the guitar. To hear the Japanese spoken word was very special. Ayako described how, in Japanese, kotodama is the spirit of the word, and how through this, which is like a prayer, we can achieve peace, harmony and balance in the world.

This couple is developing a signing choir in Japan, with the aim of sharing music between hearing and non-hearing people - the members of the choir who are signing are hearing people. Their hope is that we can all go beyond our differences and come together in the wholeness of love.

This was a wonderful evening, another gem of an event held at Greenbank, where those present were treated to beautiful spoken recitals and to music of the highest standard.

All proceeds raised, £250 in total, were donated to Ukrainians, where war, sadly, continues to rage.

Thanks to all who stewarded and provided teas and coffees at this event.

We are extremely grateful to Gen and Ayako for coming to Greenbank and giving such an enjoyable and meaningful concert. You can hear some of Gen Akashi's other performances of guitar music on YouTube.
