

LIVE STREAMING OF WORSHIP

The technical equipment in the Church Sanctuary allows streaming via You Tube on Sunday Mornings.

Anyone wishing to view the service should click on the link, which is emailed to the congregation each week from the church office. The service can also be found by searching on You Tube. Once in 'You Tube' simply type in 'Greenbank Church Morning Service' and select the correct service. Please note that with live streaming there is about a minute's delay before the service is transmitted from the church to people at home. Please be patient if it is a little later than 10.30am before the service starts.

For those who do not have a computer and are unable to attend church there is an option of using their telephone to listen to the service. Simply dial 0141 815 1166 at 10.30am if you wish to listen to the service live; alternatively, you can listen to a recording of the most recent service from the Monday until the Saturday of the following week. When you dial to hear the most recent recording you will firstly hear a message from Jeanne and then some music. Wait until the music stops and then, when asked to do so, press '1' on your telephone keypad.

Dear Friends,

The Season of Advent marks the beginning of the Christian Year as we celebrate on the 1st Sunday in Advent (3rd of December) and the Sundays thereafter. Taken together, they lead us towards Christmas Day. The Season brings to us all the opportunity to anticipate the coming of the Christ-child. It is often a time when many of us are busy and there is much to do. In the midst of the busyness of it all, it is good for us to be still and to reflect on the significance of the Season.

One of the great hymns of the season is an ancient one which anticipates the coming of the presence of God into our world:

O come, O come, Emmanuel, and ransom captive Israel, that mourns in lonely exile here, until the Son of God appear.

Although the words are drawn from another time, I believe they still resonate today. There is an honesty about them that we can identify with as they draw on the reality of the loneliness and sorrow which are part and parcel of human experience. Although this is so, the words do not leave us there. Rather, they speak of a hope and a promise. The hope that God shall come and the promise that this will be so:

Rejoice! Rejoice! Emmanuel shall come to thee, O Israel.

In this Season of Advent, let us join with all who are heirs to the promise of God and await the coming of the Son of God into our world. Where there is loneliness, may the presence of God be known. Where there is sorrow, may the presence of God bring comfort. Where there is darkness, may presence of God bring light. Yours sincerely,



Mince pies used to contain real minced beef The mince pies that we eat now have lots of fruit and spices in them, but 200 years ago they were made from real minced beef.

Candy canes were invented to keep kids quiet in church. In 1670, a German choirmaster (a person who leads a choir) asked a sweet shop to make sweets (in the shape of a shepherd's hook) for the children at his church to keep them quiet during the Christmas festivities.

Christmas used to be banned in Scotland Christmas was banned in Scotland by a minister called John Knox (who believed that only dates written in the bible should be celebrated - Christmas Day was not one of them). Christmas officially became a public holiday 1958 (a public holiday is a day where you do not need to go to work). Instead of Christmas, Scotland had the festival of Hogmanay that they celebrated on New Year's Eve.

In Sweden, they leave a coffee for Santa instead of biscuits and milk. Seeing that Father Christmas gets to eat a lot of sweet things on his journey around the world on Christmas Eve, Swedish children leave him some coffee to give him more energy and to warm him up!

The world record for a Christmas tree is 221 feet The Douglas fir was cut and put on display in 1950, at a shopping mall in Seattle, USA. The tree is as tall as 12 giraffes standing on top of one another! Thankfully, no giraffes had to stand on top of each other to measure the tree - they just used an extra-long measuring tape!

The song "Jingle Bells" was sent into space Christmas carols are a popular tradition, but 'Jingle Bells' is out of this world! It was the first song to be sung in outer space when astronauts aboard the Gemini 6 spacecraft sang the carol in 1965.

The smallest Christmas card ever made is invisible to the human eye. Scientists at the University of Glasgow created this amazing Christmas card. It's so tiny that you have to use a microscope to see it.

SANTA ADVENT CALENDAR



To make:

- 1. Cut Santa's face from white craft paper. Add texture with colored pencil.
- 2. Cut pink cheeks, eyes, and nose from construction paper; glue to the face.
- 3. Cut the hat from red and white craft paper; glue to the face.
- 4. Glue a large cotton ball at the point of the hat.
- 5. Cut a long beard shape from white craft paper.
- 6. Write the dates of the month leading up to Christmas on the beard.
- 7. Hang the calendar and set a bowl of cotton balls and a bottle of glue nearby.
- 8. Every day until Christmas, glue a cotton ball on the date so by Christmas Day Santa has whole bushy beard!

Unless you are drifting around in your superyacht around the International Date Line, the people that live on the Kiritimati atoll in Kiribati are the first to bring in the New Year.
