LIVE STREAMING OF WORSHIP

The technical equipment in the Church Sanctuary allows streaming via You Tube on Sunday Mornings.

Anyone wishing to view the service should click on the link, which is emailed to the congregation each week from the church office. The service can also be found by searching on You Tube. Once in 'You Tube' simply type in 'Greenbank Church Morning Service' and select the correct service. Please note that with live streaming there is about a minute's delay before the service is transmitted from the church to people at home. Please be patient if it is a little later than 10.30am before the service starts.

For those who do not have a computer and are unable to attend church there is an option of using their telephone to listen to the service. Simply dial 0141 815 1166 at 10.30am if you wish to listen to the service live; alternatively, you can listen to a recording of the most recent service from the Monday until the Saturday of the following week. When you dial to hear the most recent recording you will firstly hear a message from Jeanne and then some music. Wait until the music stops and then, when asked to do so, press 1 on you telephone keypad.

Dear Friends,

As we enter into the process of Vacancy, I thought it might be helpful to let you know who will be leading our Sunday morning services. As you know, the Rev Dr John L McPake has been appointed as our Interim Moderator, and has written about this at the start of this magazine.

During a vacancy, the Interim Moderator leads certain services, however, most Sunday services are led by a Locum Minister. A Locum Minister is appointed by Presbytery, following approval by the congregation's Kirk Session. On Sunday 8th October, our Kirk Session approved that the Rev Ruth Halley B Ed, BD (Hons) PGCE be appointed as our Locum Minister. Although Ruth led our worship on Sunday 22nd October, due to family commitments (in Australia!) she can't take up the post of Locum until Sunday 17th December.

Until then, we are fortunate that John McPake has arranged to have our services conducted by other ministers. John will lead our worship for the Sacrament of Holy Communion on Sunday 5th November, and will be Moderator of our Kirk Session meetings during the vacancy period.

Helen Howard Session Clerk May I take the opportunity to introduce myself as the Interim Moderator appointed by the Presbytery of Glasgow at its meeting on 10th October, following the intimation by Rev Jeanne Roddick of her intention to retire with effect from 21st October 2023.

An Interim Moderator is appointed by the Presbytery in any situation where it is anticipated that a Kirk Session will be without a minister for a period and your impending Vacancy is one such situation. A Vacancy is declared by the Presbytery in a situation where a ministry has come to close following, for example, a retiral.

The retiral of Rev. Jeanne Roddick as your minister after a long and full ministry is an occasion to be marked and celebrated, as I know you have done. Indeed, there is much to mark and to celebrate and it is good that you have taken the opportunity to do so. We give thanks to God for her ministry now that it draws to a close and will continue to remember it with gratitude.

A situation, in which something that has been in place for a long time comes to an end, can be discomforting and unsettling. On such an occasion we turn to God and seek the renewed presence of our Lord Jesus Christ and the promised guidance of the Spirit. We cannot anticipate what the future holds but we know that, in all things, we are in the hands of the God who has made us and who watches over and sustains us. Our prayer is that God will lead us into the future and that, in God's good time, we shall discover all that is prepared for us.

Pray for our Interim Moderator, Rev Dr John McPake, as he helps us on our way to find a new minister, and ask that we are all patient and understanding with each other. We should certainly be used to having patience as we have watched our Legacy Project inch forward over recent years.

REMEMBERING

This November we do not have to look very far to see war. A lot of what is shown on the news is very upsetting as we see soldiers, families and children killed and injured in the Ukraine and the Middle East. Poppies remind us of how terrible war is but time after time their message is ignored or forgotten.

Many people choose to wear a poppy in November for Remembrance Day to show respect for the people who died fighting in the First World War and the wars that followed it but there are other coloured poppies too - purple, black and white - that have different meanings.

The red poppy is the most famous symbol used to commemorate those who sacrificed their lives in World War One and the wars that followed. Wearing a poppy was inspired by the fields of poppies that grew where many of the battles were fought. The red poppy belongs to the Royal British Legion - a charity created by veterans of World War One. They say that the red poppy represents remembrance and hope.

The purple poppy is often worn to remember animals that have been victims of war. Animals like horses, dogs and pigeons were often drafted into the war effort, and those that wear the purple poppy feel their service should be seen as equal to that of human service.

The Black Poppy Rose commemorates the contributions of black, African and Caribbean communities to the war effort - as servicemen and servicewomen, and as civilians.

Some people, though, feel that the red poppy glorifies war and conflict. Instead, they might choose to wear a white poppy. The white poppy is handed out by a charity called Peace Pledge Union, which promotes peace. They say that the white poppy commemorates people who died in conflict, but focuses on achieving peace and challenging the way we look at war.

Whatever colour of poppy we wear this November, let's all work towards peace in our world.

BONFIRE NIGHT

Bonfire Night can great fun with all the bangs, explosions of light in the skies and maybe even food to enjoy. Sadly, every year on Bonfire Night there are hundreds of accidents across the UK, and lots of them happen to children. Fireworks can be very dangerous and that's why safety is the most important thing when it comes to having a display. The Royal Society for the Prevention of Accidents (RoSPA) say only adults should deal with fireworks and that children should watch from a safe distance.

The one firework which children often get to hold is a Sparkler. It is great fun to make patterns of light in the air by whirling it around but they have to be treated with great care because they can get incredibly hot! Some sparklers can reach temperatures of 1000-1600 Celsius - that's around 15 times hotter than the boiling point of water!

If you are tempted to stand nearer to get a good view of a rocket, remember they can reach speeds of 150 miles per hour (mph) when they are set off. Did you know that the reason why you can see a firework explode before you can hear the bang, is because light travels much faster than sound. Sound travels at a speed of 761 mph, but light travels at a whopping 671,000,000 mph - so you may see it before you hear it! Listen out for it this year – at a safe distance!

If you do play with a sparkler remember:

- Never put them in your pocket
- Never pick one up off the floor
- Make sure an adult is always present
- Light them one at a time
- Wear gloves
- Hold them at arm's length
- When it goes out, put the hot end in a bucket of water, otherwise it could still burn you.

Have fun and stay safe, everyone.

MY LIFE IN JAPAN



Hi there everyone,

My name is Erin, and I am a member of Greenbank. I used to volunteer at various events over the years so maybe some of you may recognise my name. (No hard feelings if you don't.) However, a lot of things have changed since I was last at Greenbank, and I am going to talk about that for you now.

I am currently living in Japan and I have been for just over one year. Deciding to leave the comfort of Clarkston was not an easy decision. I was born and raised in the same house for twenty-two years, so the thought of leaving all my friends and family behind was frightening. My decision to move came during the Covid-19 pandemic. I had realised how valuable time was after losing three years of it to lockdowns. I wanted to experience a new way of life and learn about a culture and history that is very different to the one I grew up with.

Japan had always interested me. I had a love for the traditional art and the natural landscapes I saw in documentaries always seemed so beautiful, so I decided that's where I wanted to go. I wouldn't have made it here without the constant support from back home, that is what I am truly grateful for. As of now, I am teaching English to Japanese people of all ages. The job itself can be challenging at times, but I get to meet new people every day and it allows me to explore more of the country that I have grown to love. Of course there have been some difficulties: the Japanese economy is not the strongest these days and it can cause a lot of hinderance, but I am really enjoying my time here and hope to stay a little longer.

This country has so much to offer in terms of art, culture, history, landscapes and of course culinary interest. The food here in Japan is some of the best food I've ever eaten, and I think I will struggle to adapt to the lack of it when I decide to leave. Throughout my time here I have learned so much about the world and of course myself. Becoming independent was not easy as I had always lived life with the help of my parents. (I still do in all honesty.) I had to start all over and make new friends. I had to learn how to network properly and being a little socially awkward made it a bit of a challenge, but I have found life-long friends here and I don't think I'll ever forget my Japanese experience.

Recently, I have been thinking about starting a blog of some kind to share my experiences. I have found a love for writing and sharing stories and I think it may help other people who are maybe looking to take the leap and move abroad or even just considering it.
